Nordic Combined Season Highlight

- 3 days, 3 competitions, 1 winner
- 200 World Cup points for the overall winner

Competition Format

- 30.01.2020 Provisional Competition Round
- 31.01.2020 Ind. Gundersen: 1 jump, 5 km
- 01.02.2020 Ind. Gundersen: 1 jump, 10 km
- 02.02.2020 Ind. Gundersen: 1 jump, 15 km
- After the first day, the number of competitors will be reduced to 50, after the second day only the Top 40 ranked athletes of the TRIPLE standings are allowed to start in the final event.
- The athletes take their results (in form of minus points) with them from day to day.
- The first athlete to reach the finish line on Day 3 is the overall winner.

Winner's List

- “Mr. Seefeld” Eric Frenzel (GER) won the first four editions of the TRIPLE and achieved a total of 13 World Cup victories in Seefeld since 2010.
- In 2018, Akito Watabe (JPN) took his first TRIPLE win in the fifth edition of the event.
- In 2019, the TRIPLE moved to Chaux-Neuve (FRA) and it was Mario Seidl (AUT) who claimed the trophy for himself.



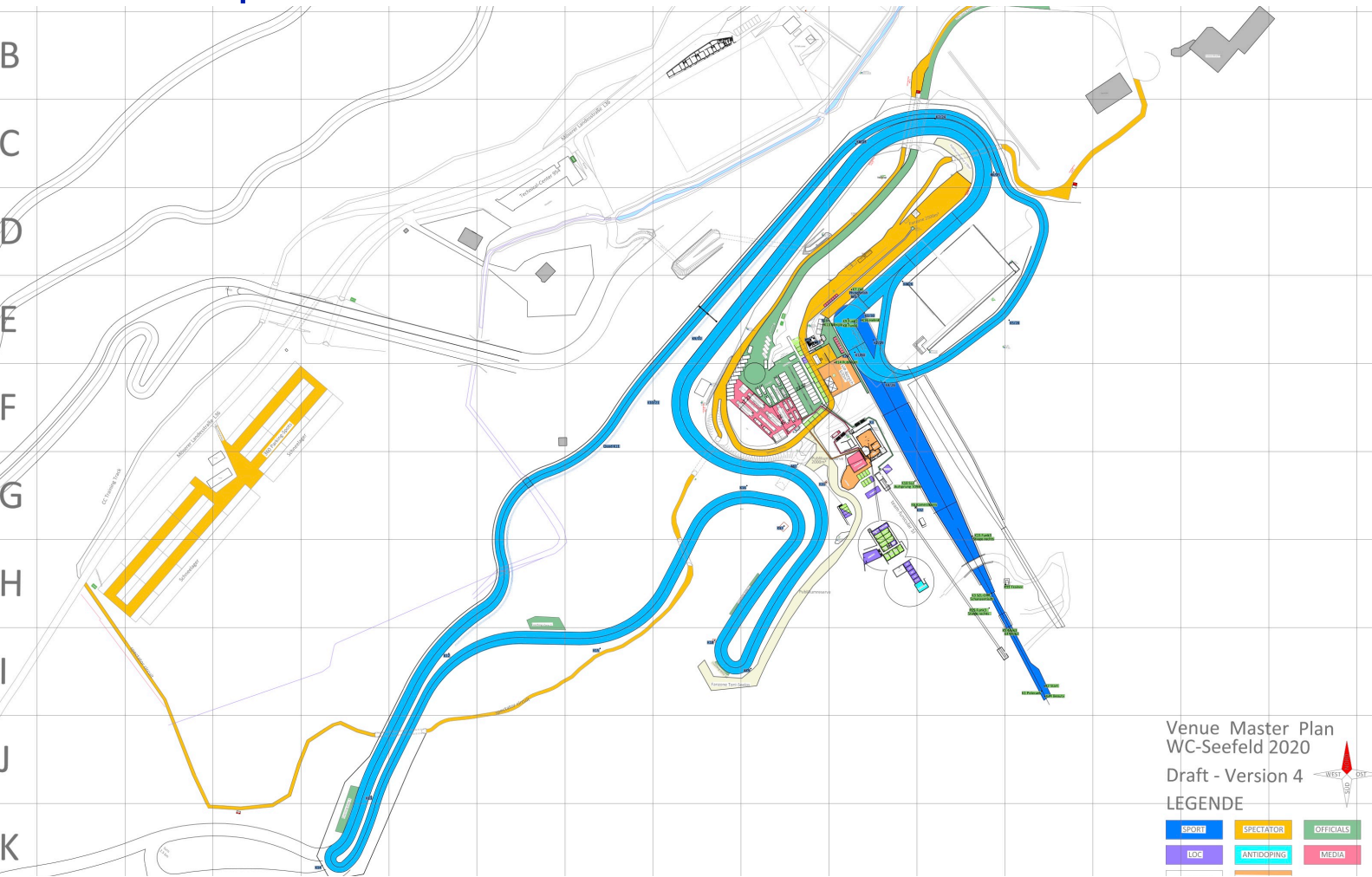
Host Venue

- Seefeld (AUT) returns to TRIPLE hosting duties after the event was moved to Chaux-Neuve (FRA) for a year.

Venue Key Facts:

- The ski jumping rounds are held on the HS 109 Toni Seelos jumping hill.
- The cross-country races take place on a 2.5 km lap at the Casino Arena Seefeld (may be subject to weather related changes).
- Distances: 2 laps of 2.5 km on Day 1, 4 laps of 2.5 km on Day 2 and 6 laps of 2.5 km on Day 3.

Result after Day 1



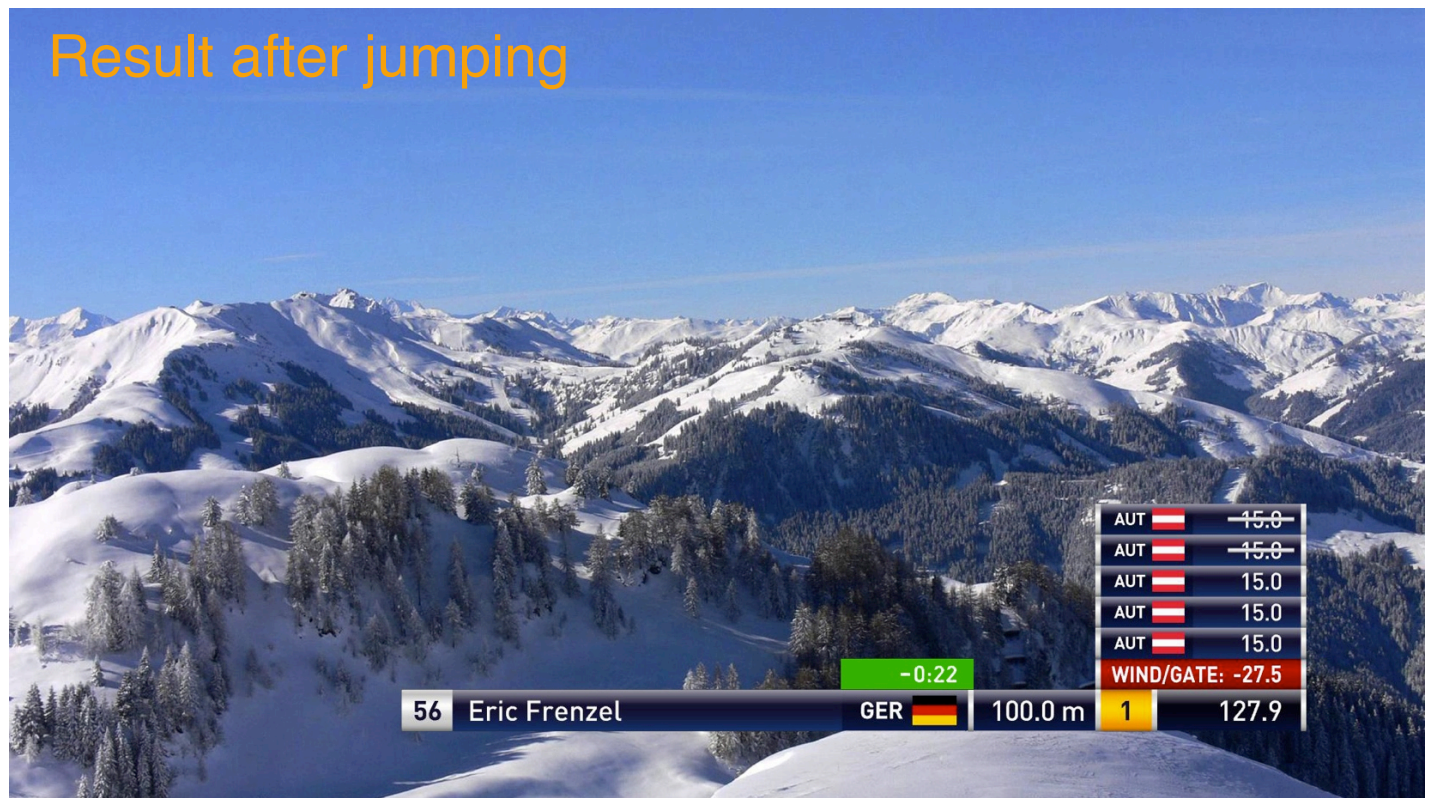
The column „points“ indicates the results of Day 1, converted into minus points for the jumping event at the beginning of Day 2

Ski Jumping Competition, Day 2



The white box above the name indicated the current TRIPLE rank
The minus points are directly calculated into the ski jumping score

Result after jumping



The score shown after the jump is the final score. The minus points from the previous day are already deducted. In case the athlete takes the lead, the box above his name will turn green (as shown above). The digits in the box indicate the time advantage he has on the current second-placed athlete for the race.

Points and Prize Money

World Cup Points

- The World Cup points on Day 1 and Day 2 will be 50 % of the normal amount: 1st place: 50 pts
- The World Cup points on Day 3 will be double of the normal amount: 1st place: 200 pts

Prize Money

- On Day 1 and Day 2: 50% of the normal Prize Money
- On Day 3: Double Prize Money
