

Audi FIS Alpine Ski World Cup 2025/26 – Women's Giant Slalom Kronplatz stat sheet

Previous GS race (Kranjska Gora) stats

- **Camille Rast (SUI/Head)** won the last Giant Slalom race, in **Kranjska Gora**, by 0.20s ahead of **Julia Schieb (AUT/Rossignol)**, with **Paula Moltzan (USA/Rossignol)** in third. This was **Rast's** first win in 58 GS starts, and made her the 20th Swiss woman to reach double figure podiums across all disciplines. She now has 11 podiums. It was also the slimmest winning margin of the 15 women's GS races held in **Kranjska Gora** to date.
- **Camille Rast's (SUI/Head)** win completed her first back-to-back Giant Slalom podiums (after her 2nd in **Semmering**). The win was also **Rast's** fourth in a run of five consecutive podiums she made across GS and Slalom races this season. In the 13 GS and SL races held since the start of the season, **Rast** is the only skier to have made five consecutive podiums (3 SL and 2 GS), but the streak ended with her 4th in SL in **Flachau**. The last Swiss woman before **Rast** to make the podium in at least five consecutive GS and SL races was **Vreni Schneider (SUI)** when she made 11 consecutive podiums (7 SL, 4 GS) across 1993/94 and 1994/95.
- **Camille Rast (SUI/Head)** won both the Slalom and Giant Slalom races in **Kranjska Gora**. The last woman to win consecutive SL and GS races at the same venue was **Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic)** who won both races in **Lienz** in 2023/24. The last Swiss woman before **Rast** to do this was **Sonja Nef (SUI)** in 2000/01 in **Are**.
- **Julia Scheib's (AUT/Rossignol)** 2nd in **Kranjska Gora** was her third consecutive Giant Slalom podium this season – a first for **Scheib** - following wins in **Semmering** and **Tremblant**. **Scheib** is the only skier to have made the podium in five out of six GS races so far this season, with **Alice Robinson (NZL/Salomon)** the next best on three. The last Austrian woman to make three consecutive GS podiums was **Eva-Maria Brem (AUT)** in 2015/16.
- **Paula Moltzan's (USA/Rossignol)** 3rd in **Kranjska Gora** was her third Giant Slalom podium in 51 GS starts, having picked up her first GS podium (3rd) in **Kronplatz** in 2024/25, followed by 2nd in **Soelden** this season. **Moltzan** is the only **USA** athlete *besides* **Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic)** to have made more than one GS podium since 2013/14.

Kronplatz stats

- **Federica Brignone (ITA/Rossignol)** won the first of the nine World Cup women's Giant Slalom races held in **Kronplatz** since 2016/17, and is the only Italian among the seven women's GS winners there. Only **Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic)** has more than one GS win in **Kronplatz**, with three victories - 2018/19, 2022/23 and 2023/24. **Shiffrin's** 1.21s win ahead of **Tessa Worley (FRA)** in 2018/19 is the biggest GS winning margin in **Kronplatz** to date.
- In addition to **Federica Brignone (ITA/Rossignol)**, other active skiers with a Giant Slalom win in **Kronplatz** are **Sara Hector (SWE/Head)** in 2021/22, **Lara Gut-Behrami (SUI/Head)** in 2023/24 and **Alice Robinson (NZL/Salomon)** in the most recent GS race there in 2024/25.
- **Lara Gut-Behrami (SUI/Head)** is the oldest women's Giant Slalom winner in **Kronplatz** at 32 years and 278 days in 2023/24. Skiers who could break that record this weekend include: **Sara Hector (SWE/Head)**, **Sofia Goggia (ITA/Atomic)** and **Lena Duerr (GER/Head)** among others.

- **Alice Robinson (NZL/Salomon)** is the youngest women's GS winner in **Kronplatz** at age 23 years and 51 days in 2024/25, as well as the youngest women's GS winner anywhere of the past two seasons. Skiers who could beat both milestones in **Kronplatz** include: **Lara Colturi (ALB/Blizzard)**, **Zrinka Ljutic (CRO/Atomic)** and **Britt Richardson (CAN/Dynastar)** among others.
- **Tessa Worley (FRA)** and **Lara Gut-Behrami (SUI/Head)** have the most podiums in **Kronplatz** with four each, followed by four skiers on three each: **Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic)**, **Sara Hector (SWE/Head)**, **Marta Bassino (ITA/Head)** and **Federica Brignone (ITA/Rossignol)**. On two each is **Alice Robinson (NZL/Salomon)** and **Ragnhild Mowinckel (NOR)**. **Paula Moltzan (USA/Rossignol)** has one.
- A win for a skier from **Austria** would be a first in women's GS in **Kronplatz**. **Austria** is ranked first for all-time women's GS wins (96) but is the only nation in the top seven not to have won the women's GS in **Kronplatz**. Nations ranked second to seventh have all won a women's GS in **Kronplatz**: **Switzerland** (84), **France** (53), **Italy** (50), **United States of America** (43) and **Sweden** (22).
- A win for **Camille Rast (SUI/Head)** would see her become the 63rd skier to win more than one women's Giant Slalom race. A win or podium for **Rast** would also see her equal her longest single-discipline podium streak (three in Slalom, set this season).
- If **Alice Robinson (NZL/Salomon)** wins she will move from six Giant Slalom wins, which is equal-24th for women alongside 11 other skiers, of which only one other is active - **Marta Bassino (ITA/Head)** – to equal-22nd alongside **Sara Hector (SWE/Head)** and **Kathrin Zettel (AUT)**. **Robinson** and **Bassino** are also equal for women's GS podiums (20) alongside three non-active skiers, which is equal-19th among women.
- A win for **New Zealand** will see the nation move from equal-13th for women's Giant Slalom wins (6) alongside **Jugoslavia** and **Slovakia**, to equal-12th alongside **Spain** (7).
- If **Sara Hector (SWE/Head)** wins, she will move from seven Giant Slalom wins, which is equal-22nd for women alongside **Kathrin Zettel (AUT)**, to equal-19th alongside **Michaela Dorfmeister (AUT)**, **Monika Kaserer (AUT)** and **Nancy Greene (CAN)**. This would see **Hector** become just the fourth active skier in the current top 20 for women's GS wins, alongside **Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic)** on 22 in first, **Federica Brignone (ITA/Rossignol)** on 17 in third, and **Lara Gut-Behrami (SUI/Head)** on 10, in equal-15th.
- **Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic)** has now gone 11 Giant Slalom races without a podium, which is her second-longest streak without a podium within a single discipline. Her longest streak without a podium within a single discipline was her first 15 GS races from 2010/11 to 2013/14.
- **Italy** is on 99 women's and men's Giant Slalom wins. The next win will see **Italy** become the third nation after **Austria** (210) and **Switzerland** (190) to reach 100 GS wins.
- A win for **Sweden** will see the nation move from equal-seventh for women's Giant Slalom podiums (72) alongside **Federal Republic of Germany**, to outright seventh behind **Germany** (85).
- **France** is on 299 women's and men's Giant Slalom podiums. The next French podium will see **France** become the fourth nation to reach 300, after **Austria** (635), **Switzerland** (502) and **Italy** (310).

- **Maryna Gasienica-Daniel (POL, Atomic)** will make her 90th Giant Slalom start in **Kronplatz**. **Estelle Alphand (SWE/Head)** and **Ricarda Haaser (AUT/Salomon)** will both make their 80th GS start, while **AJ Hurt (USA/Head)** will make her 50th GS start.
- For World Cup starts across all disciplines, **Stephanie Brunner (AUT/Head)** will make her 150th World Cup start in **Kronplatz**, while **Zrinka Ljusic (CRO/Atomic)** will make her 90th (40th in GS, with 50 in SL) and **Doriane Escane (FRA/Head)** her 80th.
