

Audi FIS Alpine Ski World Cup 2025/26 – Women's Slalom Levi stat sheet Season-opening Women's Slalom stats

- Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic) starts the season chasing an all-time record-extending ninth women's Slalom Globe. She surpassed the previous record of six, set by Vreni Schneider (SUI), back in 2022/23.
- If Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic) won the Overall World Cup title this season she would equal Annemarie Moser-Proell (AUT) for the all-time women's record of six Overall titles. But having announced her intention to focus on the Slalom and Giant Slalom this season, with the possibility of an occasional Super G, Shiffrin will need a strong season in the technical disciplines to stay in contention with athletes competing in three or more disciplines.
- To date **Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic)** has won a record 64 Slalom World Cup races. If she wins six more this season, she will have twice as many Slalom World Cup wins as her nearest competitor, Marlies Schild (AUT) who has 35 Slalom World Cup wins.
- With a current total of 101 victories, **Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic)** is also the most successful World Cup skier of all-time. She is 15 clear of Ingemar Stenmark (SWE) and 19 clear of compatriot **Lindsey Vonn (USA/Head)** on the all-time list.
- Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic) also leads the standings in terms of number of World Cup race wins in a single season. Shiffrin won 17 races in the 2018/19 season, when she won 10/12 Slalom races (including Parallel Slalom and City Events). No other athlete, in either gender, has ever won more than 14 World Cup races in a single season, with Shiffrin also winning 14 World Cup races in 2022/23 and Vreni Schneider (SUI) winning 14 World Cup races in 1988/89.
- Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic) remains the most successful Overall women's Alpine skier of the past 15 World Cup seasons, with seven seasons inside the top three Overall classification, ahead of Lara Gut-Behrami (SUI/Head) on six, and Petra VIhova (SVK/Rossignol) on five.
- Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic) finished last season fourth in the Slalom World Cup standings, the first time in nine seasons she had finished outside the top two. She also ended the season 16th in the Overall classification, which was only the second time since 2016 that she finished outside the top three. These results were largely due to the fact that she missed several races after sustaining an injury during the Giant Slalom in Killington (USA) in November 2024. Last season also marked the first time in her career she did not claim a podium place in the Slalom at a World Championships, finishing fifth in the 2025 Slalom World Championships race.



- Zrinka Ljutic (CRO/Atomic) won the Slalom Globe in 2024/25 at the age of 21, which made her the youngest women's small Globe winner since Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic) won the Slalom Globe in 2015 at the age of 20.
- **Zrinka Ljutic (CRO/Atomic)** won her first Slalom World Cup race last season in Semmering in December 2024. She went on to win twice more, in Kranjska Gora and Courchevel, as she powered to her first ever globe, finishing 32 points clear of **Katharina Liensberger (AUT/Rossignol)**.
- Katharina Liensberger's (AUT/Rossignol) second-place finish was her best result since winning the Slalom Globe in 2020/21. The same season she won gold at the World Championships, ending Mikaela Shiffrin's (USA/Atomic) streak of four consecutive World Championships gold medals between 2013 and 2019.
- Katharina Liensberger (AUT/Rossignol) is searching for her first World Cup win since triumphing in Are in March 2022 one of three World Cup Slalom wins to date.
- Camille Rast (SUI/Head) won the Women's Slalom gold at the 2025 World Championships, her first World Championships medal. She was the first Swiss woman to win World Championships Slalom gold since Vreni Schneider (SUI) in 1991. Compatriot Wendy Holdener (SUI/Head) won the silver medal, to complete a first ever World Championships 1-2 for Switzerland in Women's Slalom.
- Camille Rast (SUI/Head) won her first Slalom World Cup race last season in Killington, before triumphing again in Flachau. She went on to finish third in the Slalom standings, comfortably her best ever season finish.
- Lena Dürr (GER/Head) starts the new season seeking just her second World Cup victory in Slalom. She has been on the podium in 16 Slalom races between 2021/22 and 2024/25 seasons, but her only victory came in the Spindleruv Mlyn Slalom in January 2023.
- Wendy Holdener (SUI/Head) starts the new season seeking just her third Slalom World Cup win. She has been on the World Cup podium 52 times so far, with only five wins: two in Slalom (both in the 2022/23 season), two in Alpine Combined and one in a City Event. In addition, she has won five Olympic medals and nine World Championships medals.
- Lara Colturi (ALB/Blizzard) is seeking the first World Cup win of her career. A World Cup victory would not only mark her first career win, but also the first-ever for Albania. She was on the podium for the first time last season, in the Gurgl Slalom, several days after she turned 18. Colturi made her World Cup debut in the Levi Slalom three years ago, just four days after turning 16. This year's Levi Slalom will take place on the day of her 19th birthday.
- Sara Hector (SWE/Head) finished in the Top 10 of the Slalom standings last season for the third season in-a-row. She is a Giant Slalom specialist and the current Olympic GS champion, but she has been on a Slalom World Cup podium three times during the past two seasons. Hector's best result in Levi is a fourth place in 2023/24.



Women's Slalom Levi-specific stats

- Levi made its debut on the Women's World Cup calendar in 2003/04. Since then, there have been 24 Slalom World Cup races in Levi. Between 2020 and 2023 two women's Slalom were held on consecutive days, but since 2024 Levi reverted back to the previous format of Women's Slalom on Saturday and Men's Slalom on Sunday.
- Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic) and Petra VIhova (SVK/Rossignol) have won the past 13 Slalom races in Levi. The last winner other than these two athletes was **Tina Maze (SLO)** in 2014.
- Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic) has won eight Slalom races in Levi between 2013 and 2024, claiming four of the past five races (two in 2022, one in 2023, one in 2024). Her wins in Levi set a record for the number of Slalom wins by a female skier in a single location. Only Lindsey Vonn (USA/Head) has won more races in a single discipline in a single location, with 14 Downhill wins in Lake Louise.
- Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic) has been on the podium in 13 of the past 16 Slalom races in Levi, and in the Top 5 in all the past 13 Levi Slalom races. The last time she was not in the top 5 came in the 2014/15 race.
- Only four athletes have won the Levi Slalom race more than once: Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic) eight times, Petra VIhova (SVK/Rossignol) six times, Maria Höfl-Riesch (GER) three times and Marlies Schild (AUT) twice.
- Katharina Liensberger (AUT/Rossignol) has been on the Levi podium four times, with a second place in 2024/25 and three third places in both 2020/21 races and in 2023/24.
- Wendy Holdener (SUI/Head) has been on the Levi podium four times so far between the 2016/17 and 2022/23 seasons. But she has never won here and last year she finished in 16th position.
- Camille Rast (SUI/Head), the reigning Slalom World Champion, finished fifth in the 2024/25 Levi slalom. This is her only top-10 result in the nine Levi Slalom races she has competed in.
- The first and only time a Finnish athlete has won the Levi women's Slalom was when **Tanja Poutiainen (FIN)** triumphed in the very first edition of the race in 2003/04. She was also on the podium in 2009/10, 2010/11 and 2012/13.



• In the last five Levi women's Slalom races, no Finnish athletes have qualified for the second run. No other Finnish athlete except for **Tanja Poutiainen (FIN)** has ever finished in the Top 20 of this race.
