Men's Downhill Val Gardena Südtirol stat sheet

- Saslong course, located above Val Gardena on the Langkofel mountain in the Dolomites, first hosted a World Cup Downhill in February 1969. A total of 63 Downhill World Cup races have been held there to date.
- Val Gardena will feature a speed triple header this year. A sprint downhill race will take
 place on Thursday, 18 December. The Super G will take place on Friday, 19 December,
 and the classic downhill on Saturday, 20 December.
- This is not the first time Val Gardena is hosting such a triple header, another one happened in 2023/24, when Bryce Bennett (USA/Fischer) won the sprint Downhill, Vincent Kriechmayr (AUT/Head) was 1st in the Super G and Dominik Paris (ITA/Nordica) topped the podium in the second Downhill of the weekend.
- Kristian Ghedina (ITA) and Franz Klammer (AUT) have the most wins in Val Gardena World Cup Downhills at four each. Aleksander Aamodt Kilde (NOR/Atomic) leads the field among active athletes with three victories.
- Marco Odermatt (SUI/Stöckli) won the 2024/25 World Cup Downhill in Val Gardena ahead of Franjo von Allmen (SUI/Head) and Ryan Cochran-Siegle (USA/Head). This was Odermatt's first career win in Val Gardena in any discipline.
- Marco Odermatt (SUI/Stöckli) is leading the 2025/26 World Cup Downhill standings after his win in the Beaver Creek season opener. Ryan Cochran-Siegle (USA/Head) was the runner-up, Adrian Smiseth Sejersted (Nor/Atomic) finished in 3rd place.
- Marco Odermatt (SUI/Stöckli) also leads the overall Cup standings after the Val d'Isere weekend with 505 points. Henrik Kristoffersen (NOR/Van Deer, 302) is second, Timon Haugan (NOR/Van Deer, 281) is in third place.
- Marco Odermatt (SUI/Stöckli), two times Downhill Crystal Globe winner, had never opened a new season with a win before Beaver Creek.
- It's been two seasons since Marco Odermatt (SUI/Stöckli) finished outside the top 7 in a World Cup Downhill race – when he came 15th in the 2022/23 World Cup Finals in Soldeu.
- Marco Odermatt's (SUI/Stöckli) win in Beaver Creek was the 15th time in succession that at least one Swiss skier has featured on a World Cup Downhill podium – equalling the nation's longest ever streak. They still have some way to match the longest ever streak however; 33 consecutive Downhill podium finishes recorded by Austrian skiers in 2002/03–2005/06.



- The Downhill in Val Gardena in December 2023 was the last time a Swiss skier did not finish on a World Cup Downhill podium. Dominik Paris (ITA/Nordica), Aleksander Aamodt Kilde (NOR/Atomic) and Bryce Bennett (USA/Fischer) finished 1-2-3 that day.
- Marco Odermatt (SUI/Stöckli) needs two more consecutive World Cup Downhill top-10 finishes to record the second longest all-time streak. His current streak, which started in the 2023/24 season opener in Val Gardena, is the longest of his career at 17 races. Beat Feuz (SUI) holds the longest streak of all, 36, which ended with a DNF in Bormio in December 2021.
- Ryan Cochran-Siegle (USA/Head) equaled his career-best World Cup Downhill finish by claiming the 2nd place in Beaver Creek. He was also 2nd in Val Gardena in December 2020.
- Ryan Cochran-Siegle (USA/Head) is now the most successful US skier among active athletes on par with Bryce Bennett (USA/Fischer) in terms of the most top-3 World Cup Downhill finishes at three podiums both.
- Adrian Smiseth Sejersted (Nor/Atomic) claimed his first ever World Cup Downhill podium in Beaver Creek. He recorded 57 Downhill starts since his World Cup debut in 2013/14, claiming a total of 9 top-10 finishes.
- Franjo von Allmen (SUI/Head), fourth in Beaver Creek, is chasing a ninth consecutive World Cup Downhill top-10 finish. His current streak, which started in Val Gardena in December 2024, is the longest streak of his career so far.
- A win at home in Val Gardena for Dominik Paris (ITA/Nordica) would see the Italian claim 2nd place on his own in the all-time men's Downhill World Cup winners list. Currently Paris who won in Kvitfjell last season sits alongside Peter Müller (SUI) with 19 World Cup victories. Franz Klammer (AUT) is out in front with 25 wins.
- Miha Hrobat (SLO/Atomic) has scored points in his past 13 consecutive Downhill World Cup races. This is the second longest current streak. Only Marco Odermatt (SUI/Stöckli) has more; 19 consecutive points-scoring races. These are career best results for both skiers.
- The returning Aleksander Aamodt Kilde (NOR/Atomic) has the chance to improve his record as the most successful active Downhill skier in Val Gardena. The Norwegian has won three times down the Saslong course, in 2018/19, 2020/21 and 2022/23. He also was the runner-up here twice in both the 2023/24 races. No other active athlete has more than three Downhill podiums in Val Gardena.
- Austria is the most successful nation in the Val Gardena Downhill, having claimed 19 wins to date. Switzerland has 15 victories, Norway 8. Italy is in 4th place with six wins on the home slopes.



• The last Italian to win in a Val Gardena Downhill was **Dominik Paris (ITA/Nordica)** in 2023/24. That win ended a streak of 22 races on the Saslong without a win for Italy after **Kristian Ghedina's (ITA)** victory in 2001/02.
