

FACTS & FIGURES – Men's Super G in Wengen

- Two-time defending and the current Crystal Globe standings leader **Marco Odermatt (SUI/Stöckli)** has not finished outside of the top-five in a World Cup Super G since March 2022.
- In that period, covering 19 races, he has won nine and claimed an additional seven podium spots.
- The Swiss man has a decent record in Wengen too. In his eight races down the legendary Lauberhorn, Odermatt has three wins (super G in 2022 and the Downhill twice in 2024) plus four podiums and a worst of fourth.
- In the Super G alone he has that win plus a 2nd (2024) and a 3rd (2023) in his three attempts.
- This season Odermatt has a win (Beaver Creek) a 3rd (Val Gardena) and a fifth (Bormio).
- There have only been four men's Super G World Cups in Wengen so far and Odermatt has the opportunity to become the first repeat winner.
- **Fredrik Moeller (NOR/Atomic)** is one of the three different winners in the three World Cup Super G races so far this season, having triumphed last time out in Bormio in late December.
- That win marked Moeller's first ever World Cup podium finish in just his 27th World Cup race.
- The 24-year-old was 4th in both the first two Super G races this season, having started the campaign with a previous best ever World Cup finish of 21st, recorded in the December 2023 Val Gardena Super G.
- At the age of 34 **Mattia Casse (ITA/Rossignol)** is enjoying his best ever Super G World Cup season, sitting third in the standings.
- Casse recorded a first ever World Cup triumph by winning the Val Gardena Super G in December 2024. It was his 201st World Cup start.
- The Italian has form down the Lauberhorn, having finished third in the Wengen Downhill in 2023.
- **Vincent Kriechmayr (AUT/Head)** has the opportunity to move up to equal 4th in the list of all-time most successful men's World Cup Super G skiers. The Austrian currently has nine victories and is eyeing up Pirmin Zurbriggen (SUI) who has 10. Odermatt is in third place with 13 wins, while Hermann Maier (AUT) leads the way with 24.
- Kriechmayr was second last time out, in Bormio, but has yet to crack the Super G podium in Wengen. He has though won the Downhill in Wengen twice, in 2019 and 2022.
- The 30-year-old finished 2nd in the Super G rankings last season. It was his best finish since winning the Super G Crystal Globe in 2020/21.
- In the absence of the injured pair Cyprien Sarrazin (FRA/Rossignol) and Aleksander Aamodt Kilde (NOR/Atomic), Odermatt is the only former Wengen Super G winner in the field, while **Stefan Rogentin (SUI/Fischer)** is the only other racer who has finished on the podium. The Swiss skier finished second behind Kilde in 2023.
- So far this season, Rogentin has two top-five finishes to his name, having ended fifth in Val Gardena and fourth in Bormio.
- Rogentin's only World Cup win came in the Super G in the 2023/24 World Cup Finals in Saalbach.
- Three skiers at varying stages in their careers have recorded the first World Cup podium finishes of their career this season in the Super G. First 23-year-old **Lukas**

Feurstein (AUT/Head) finished third in Beaver Creek, then the 33-year-old **Jared Goldberg (USA/ Rossignol)** ended second in Val Gardena, before **Alexis Monney (SUI/Stöckli)** 25, was third last time out in Bormio.

- Money also won his first World Cup in Bormio, triumphing in the Downhill.
