

Audi FIS Alpine Ski World Cup 2025/26 – Men's Giant Slalom Alta Badia stat sheet

- Alta Badia first hosted a World Cup Giant Slalom in December 1985. A total of 43 Giant Slalom World Cup races have been held there to date. Only two venues have hosted more Giant Slalom World Cup events: Kranjska Gora (SLO, 47) and Adelboden (SUI, 54).
- Marco Odermatt (SUI/Stöckli) has won the last four men's World Cup Giant Slalom races in Alta Badia - and five of the past six. His only blemish came in 2022, when Lucas Pinheiro Braathen won, while racing for Team Norway. Odermatt came 3rd that day, part of a streak that has seen him finish on the podium in seven consecutive Alta Badia Giant Slaloms.
- A sixth Alta Badia Giant Slalom win for Marco Odermatt (SUI/Stöckli) would see him equal Marcel Hirscher (NED/Van Deer) as the resort's most successful World Cup GS skier.
- A Giant Slalom podium finish for Marco Odermatt (SUI/Stöckli) in Alta Badia would be the 46th of his career, seeing him equal Michael von Gruenigen and Vreni Schneider as the Swiss skiers with the most career Giant Slalom World Cup podiums in history.
- Since the start of the 2021/2022 season in Sölden, Austria Marco Odermatt (SUI/Stöckli) has been on the podium in every Giant Slalom World Cup race he has finished. He missed one race in Schladming in 2022/23, had three consecutive DNFs in 2024 (at the World Cup Finals in Saalbach in March, at the subsequent season-opener in Sölden, and at the following race in Beaver Creek) and recorded a DNF in Copper Mountain this season.
- Third place in last weekend's Val d'Isere Giant Slalom saw Marco Odermatt (SUI/Stöckli) grab the lead on his own in the World Cup Giant Slalom standings. The Swiss skier has 260 points, ahead of Stefan Brennsteiner (AUT/Fischer) in 2nd with 245 points, while Henrik Kristoffersen (NOR/Van Deer) sits in 3rd place, with 200 points.
- After just one top-10 finish from his first seven World Cup starts this season, Loic Meillard (SUI/Rossignol) won the Giant Slalom in Val d'Isere last week. It was his fifth career World Cup GS victory.
- Luca Aerni (SUI/Fischer) claimed his first career Giant Slalom World Cup podium and repeated his career-best World Cup result by finishing 2nd in Val d'Isere. He had another runner-up spot in the Madonna di Campiglio Slalom in December 2017.
- The Swiss 1-2-3 in the Val d'Isere Giant Slalom was the first Alpine World Cup podium sweep of the season. The previous 1-2-3 was also claimed by a Swiss men's Giant Slalom trio; with Loic Meillard (Rossignol, 1st), Marco Odermatt (Stöckli, 2nd) and Thomas Tumler (Stöckli, 3rd) doing the job in Hafjell in March 2025.



- After Henrik Kristoffersen (NOR/Van Deer) failed to finish inside the top 10 in Val d'Isere, there are only two athletes left who have managed to claim a top-10 spot in all Giant Slalom World Cup races this season: Stefan Brennsteiner (AUT/Fischer) and Alex Vinatzer (ITA/Atomic).
- Stefan Brennsteiner (AUT/Fischer) has finished inside the top 10 in eight consecutive Giant Slalom World Cup races since Schladming in January 2025. It is the longest active streak in the discipline.
- Stefan Brennsteiner (AUT/Fischer) and River Radamus (USA/Rossignol) have both scored points in 13 consecutive Giant Slalom World Cup races to date. No other athlete has a longer active point-scoring streak.
- The last Italian to win a World Cup Giant Slalom race on home snow in Alta Badia was Massimiliano Blardone in 2011/12. The last Italian skier on the podium in Alta Badia was Luca De Aliprandini (Salomon) finishing 2nd in 2021/22.
- Italian skiers haven't won a men's World Cup Giant Slalom event for 117 consecutive races. It is Italy's all-time longest winless streak. **Massimiliano Blardone** was the last Italian to win a World Cup Giant Slalom race, when he triumphed in Crans Montana in February 2012.
- Team Switzerland has the most World Cup Giant Slalom wins in Alta Badia 10. Austria and Italy have nine wins each.
