

FACTS & FIGURES - Men's GS World Cup Finals, Sun Valley

- Men's GS Crystal Globe 2024/25 season standings: 1. Marco Odermatt (SUI) 500 winner; 2 Henrik Kristoffersen (NOR) 394; 3. Alexander Steen Olsen (NOR) 346; 4. Loic Meillard (SUI) 334; 5. Lucas Pinhiero Braathen (BRA) 291
- This is the first time since the 1970s that Men's FIS World Cup racing has taken place in Sun Valley. Ingemar Stenmark (SWE) won two GS races here in 1975 and 1977, while Gustav Thoeni (ITA) won a Slalom in 1975, and Phil Mahre (USA) won a Slalom in 1977.
- Marco Odermatt (SUI/Stöckli) has already won the 2024-25 GS Crystal Globe. He tops the GS standings with 500 points, 106 points ahead of Henrik Kristoffersen (NOR/Van Deer).
- This is Odermatt's fourth consecutive GS Crystal Globe.
- In the 36 GS World Cup races Odermatt has competed in since the start of the 2021/22 season, the Swiss skier has won 24 exactly two thirds.
- Only Marcel Hirscher (31 wins) and Stenmark (46 wins) are in front of him on the all-time men's GS win list.
- Odermatt has also won the Super G, Downhill and Overall Crystal Globes this season. He has won all four Globes for the second season in a row.
- Odermatt enters the weekend with 45 World Cup wins in all disciplines, and could equal Marc Giradelli (LUX, 46), who is fifth on the men's all-time list.
- Odermatt has the joint most Swiss men's World Cup podium record in all disciplines, level with Zurbriggen's on 86.
- Odermatt was second last time out in the GS, in Hafjell.
- Henrik Kristoffersen (NOR/Van Deer), the GS Globe winner in 2019-20, is currently second in the standings, having come second in Sölden and Schladming, and won the GS at Kranjska Gora.
- Kristoffersen is in 12th place on his own in the all-time men's GS World Cup winners list, ahead of three legendary figures in the sport: Pirmin Zurbriggen (SUI), Marc Giradelli (LUX) and Jean Claude Killy (FRA).
- Alexander Steen Olsen (NOR/Rossignol) won the first GS of the season in Sölden and won again in Schladming. He is currently third in the race for the Crystal Globe, with 346 points.
- Loic Meillard (SUI/Rossignol) lies fourth in the standings. He won the most recent GS in Hafjell, his first GS win of the season.
- He won GS bronze at Saalbach one of three medals he claimed, along with gold medals in the Team Combined and the Slalom.
- Meillard's GS bronze came at the expense of team-mate Odermatt, who finished fourth - seven hundredths of a second behind Meillard.
- After becoming the first Brazilian to climb onto a World Cup podium, when finishing second in the GS in early December Lucas Pinhiero Braathen (BRA/Atomic) could become his nation's first ever winner, should he secure a

- third career GS victory (the previous two came when Pinheiro Braathen was skiing for Norway).
- Braathen is currently fifth in the GS standings, with 291 points.
- Thomas Tumler (SUI/Stöckli) won GS silver at Saalbach 2025. He is sixth in the GS World Cup standings.
- If Tumler wins in Sun Valley he will become the sport's oldest GS victor at the age of 35 years, 4 months and 21 days. Didier Cuche (SUI) triumphed aged 35 years, 2 months and 9 days in Sölden in 2009/10.
- Tumler's first ever World Cup win came in Beaver Creek in the GS in December.
