

Audi FIS Alpine Ski World Cup 2025/26 – Women's Slalom Flachau stat sheet

Previous SL race (Kranjska Gora) stats

- **Camille Rast (SUI/Head)** ended **Mikaela Shiffrin's (USA/Atomic)** five-race Slalom win streak with victory in **Kranjska Gora** by 0.14s ahead of **Shiffrin**, with **Wendy Holdener (SUI/Head)** in third. This was the second-smallest winning margin of the six women's SL races this season - only **Shiffrin's** 0.09s win ahead of **Rast** in **Semmering** was smaller.
- **Camille Rast (SUI/Head)** has made six podiums this season (4 SL, 2 GS), the same total as **Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic)** (6 SL), but **Shiffrin** has five wins to **Rast's** two. After making her World Cup debut in 2016/17, **Rast** required 3007 days to reach four World Cup podiums (3 SL, 1 GS). In contrast, **Rast** needed just 43 days this season to make her next six podiums (4 SL, 2 GS). Her win in **Kranjska Gora** made her the 20th Swiss woman to reach 10 World Cup podiums.
- **Mikaela Shiffrin's (USA/Atomic)** 2nd in **Kranjska Gora** was her 95th Slalom podium. With four SL races left this season **Shiffrin** could reach 99 if she gets on the podium in all four, but will have to wait until next season for a chance to become the first women's or men's skier to reach 100 podiums in a single discipline.
- **Wendy Holdener's (SUI/Head)** 3rd in **Kranjska Gora** ended a streak of nine Slalom races without a podium. **Holdener** now has 39 SL podiums, which is sixth-highest among women and equal-11th among women's and men's skiers alongside **Ivica Kostelic (CRO)**.
- **Lara Della Mea's (ITA/Fischer)** 6th in **Kranjska Gora** was her best finish in 60 Slalom and 85 World Cup starts, while **Dzenifera Germane's (LAT/Head)** 7th was her best finish in 15 World Cup starts.

Flachau stats

- **Flachau** has hosted 18 women's World Cup Slalom races. **Janica Kostelic (CRO)** won the first in 2000/01 by 1.56s, which remains the biggest SL winning margin in **Flachau** to date. **Kostelic** won again in 2001/02, three weeks after winning Olympic SL gold in **Salt Lake City**.
- **Camille Rast (SUI/Head)** won the last women's Slalom race in **Flachau** in 2024/25 by 0.16s ahead of **Wendy Holdener (SUI/Head)**, with **Sara Hector (SWE/Head)** in third. This was the third-smallest winning margin of the 18 women's SL races held in **Flachau**. The smallest is 0.10s, achieved by **Petra Vlhova (SVK)** ahead of **Anna Swenn Larsson (SWE/Head)** in 2019/20.
- **Anna Swenn Larsson (SWE/Head)**, **Wendy Holdener (SUI/Head)** and **Lena Duerr (GER/Head)** have each contested 14 women's Slalom races in **Flachau**. **Duerr** is the only one to have appeared in all 14 races in **Flachau** since 2011/12, while **Larsson** and **Holdener** first raced in the 2010/11 edition but missed one each in later seasons. **Lindsey Vonn (USA/Head)** is the only active skier to have taken part in the third women's SL race held in **Flachau** back in 2009/10.
- **Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic)** recorded a DNF in her first race at **Flachau** in 2011/12, but since then has been on the podium in each of the ten subsequent races, five of which she won.
- Of the nine women to have won a Slalom race in **Flachau**, three are active skiers - **Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic)** (five wins), **Petra Vlhova (SVK/Rossignol)** (three wins) and **Camille Rast (SUI/Head)** (one win).

- **Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic)** five wins came in 2012/13, 2013/14, 2017/18, 2020/21 and 2023/24. **Petra Vlhova's (SVK/Rossignol)** three wins came in 2018/19, 2019/20 and 2022/23. Four non-active women's skiers have two SL wins in **Flachau**, while **Camille Rast (SUI/Head)** is the only active skier among three women with one win each.
- **Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic)** is the youngest women's Slalom winner in **Flachau**, having made her third SL win there in 2012/13 at age 17 years and 308 days. **Veronika Velez Zuzulova (SVK)** is the oldest, having won in 2015/16 at age 31 years and 184 days. Skiers who could surpass **Zuzulova's** record with a win in **Flachau** include **Paula Moltzan (USA/Rossignol)**, **Wendy Holdener (SUI/Head)**, **Sara Hector (SWE/Head)**, **Anna Swenn Larsson (SWE/Head)**, **Lena Duerr (GER/Head)** among others.
- **Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic)** has 580 SL points coming into **Flachau** - a 218-point lead ahead of **Camille Rast (SUI/Head)** on 362. If **Shiffrin** wins in **Flachau** she will move to 680 points, in which case **Rast** must score at least 18 points (14th place minimum) in **Flachau** to maintain a possibility of catching **Shiffrin** in the final three SL races of the season.
- If **Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic)** wins she will become the first women's or men's skier to reach 70 World Cup wins in a single discipline. **Shiffrin's** current Slalom victory count (69) is enough to earn her fourth place on the all-time women's and men's win list for *all* disciplines.
- If **Wendy Holdener (SUI/Head)** wins, she will become the oldest skier representing **Switzerland** to win a women's World Cup Slalom race at age 32 (**Vreni Schneider** holds the current record of age 30). If **Holdener** makes the podium, she will become the sixth woman (and third from **Switzerland**) to reach 40 SL podiums. A podium will also see **Holdener** break into the top 10 for women's and men's SL podiums at equal-10th alongside **Mario Matt (AUT)**.
- **Camille Rast (SUI/Head)** has three Slalom wins while **Wendy Holdener (SUI/Head)** has two. A win for **Holdener** will see her match **Rast**, which is fifth-best among Swiss women. A win for **Rast** would see her join **Corinne Schmidhauser (SUI)** on four, which is equal-fourth among Swiss women behind **Vreni Schneider** (34), **Erika Hess** (21) and **Lise-Marie Morerod** (10).
- **Camille Rast's (SUI/Head)** win in **Kranjska Gora** means **Switzerland** is now equal-fourth with **Sweden** on 108 women's and men's Slalom wins, behind **Austria** (222), **France** (134) and **USA** (127). The next **Swiss** or **Swedish** win will see that nation move into fourth outright.
- If **Anna Swenn Larsson (SWE/Head)** makes the podium she will become the 29th woman to make 15 SL podiums.
- **Katharina Liensberger (AUT)** and **Lena Duerr (GER/Head)** are both on 17 Slalom podiums alongside **Annemarie Moser-Proell (AUT)**, **Tina Maze (SLO)** and **Sarka Strachova (CZE)**, which is equal-21st best for women, behind **Nicole Hosp (AUT)** who rounds out the Top 20 outright on 19. A podium for **Duerr** will see her move to 18 and outright 21st, while **Liensberger** is out for the season due to injury.
- **Austria** has 89 women's Slalom wins. A win for an Austrian skier would see **Austria** become the second nation after the **USA** to reach 90 women's SL wins.
- While **Austria** leads comfortably for most women's Slalom podiums (286), the **USA** (205) and **Switzerland** (204) are close enough that either nation could lead or be equal after **Flachau**.

- **Germany** is on 29 women's and men's SL wins. A win for **Emma Aicher (GER/Head)** or **Lena Duerr (GER/Head)** will see **Germany** become the 10th nation to achieve 30 SL wins. If **Aicher** wins, she will become the third German woman (along with **Hilde Gerg** and **Maria Hoefl-Riesch**) to have won World Cup races in Downhill, Super G and SL.
- **Croatia** has 98 women's Slalom top 10 finishes. If **Zrinka Ljusic (CRO/Atomic)** and **Leona Popovic (CRO/Voelkl)** both finish in the top 10, **Croatia** will become the 13th nation to reach 100. **Croatia** has 23 women's SL wins (three for **Ljusic**, 20 for **Janica Kostelic**), which is seventh highest, but **Croatia** is the only top 10 nation for women's SL wins that is yet to reach 100 top 10 women's SL finishes.
- **Sara Hector (SWE/Head)** will make her 100th Slalom start in **Flachau**, while **Katharina Truppe (AUT/Voelkl)** will make her 99th, and **Aline Daniioth (SUI/Head)** her 50th.
- Across all disciplines, **Asa Ando (JPN/Atomic)** will make her 100th World Cup start in **Flachau**, while **AJ Hurt (USA/Head)** will make her 90th and **Doriane Escane (FRA/Head)** her 80th.
