

## Audi FIS Alpine Ski World Cup 2025/26 - Men's Slalom Alta Badia stat sheet

- Timon Haugan (NOR/Van Deer) won the most recent Slalom race in Val d'Isere last week. The runner-up was Loic Meillard (SUI/Rossignol), with Henrik Kristoffersen (NOR/Van Deer) finishing in 3rd place.
- Timon Haugan (NOR/Van Deer) took the lead in the Slalom World Cup after three events with 195 points, Paco Rassat (FRA/Head) is in second with 140 points, Lucas Pinheiro Braathen (BRA/Atomic) is third on 126.
- **Timon Haugan (NOR/Van Deer)** claimed his fifth World Cup Slalom win. He recorded all five wins in the course of just his 16 last starts, out of the 75 total World Cup races he took part in.
- Timon Haugan (NOR/Van Deer) needs one more win to draw level with Ole Kristian Furuseth (NOR), who lies third on the all-time list of Norwegian athletes with six career World Cup Slalom victories. Henrik Kristoffersen (NOR/Van Deer) leads this list with 25 wins.
- **Timon Haugan (NOR/Van Deer)** is the only athlete who finished all three races of the current Slalom season inside the top 10. Furthermore, all three of his results were inside the top 5.
- Timon Haugan (NOR/Van Deer) has claimed top-5 finishes in seven consecutive Slalom World Cup races, which is the longest running streak in the discipline and Haugan's career longest. It started with his win in Schladming in January 2025.
- Loic Meillard (SUI/Rossignol) claimed his 12th career Slalom World Cup podium finish. He's chasing Daniel Yule (SUI/Atomic) on top of the list of most successful Swiss athletes, who has 17 top-3 results.
- Henrik Kristoffersen's (NOR/Van Deer) 3rd place finish allowed him to overtake Alberto Tomba (ITA) and claim the 3rd position on the all-time World Cup Slalom podiums list. Kristoffersen now has 58 top-3 finishes. He needs eight more podiums to overtake Marcel Hirscher (NED/Van Deer) for the second place on that list.
- Henrik Kristoffersen (NOR/Van Deer) needs three more podiums in any discipline to draw level with Marc Girardelli (LUX), who lies third on the men's all-time list with 101 career World Cup podiums. Ingemar Stenmark (SWE) leads the way with 163 podiums.
- Val d'Isere podium featured two Norwegian athletes for the first time in the 2025/26 season in any discipline. The last time two Norwegians claimed the top-3 spots was also in Slalom at last season's Kranjska Gora in March when Henrik Kristoffersen's (NOR/Van Deer) won the race ahead of Timon Haugan (NOR/Van Deer) in 2nd.



- Last week's Val d'Isere race saw three athletes claim their first career top-10 result.
   Oscar Andreas Sandvik (NOR/Head) was 5th, Hans Grahl-Madsen (NOR/Head) finished 6th and Matthias Iten (SUI/Head) claimed 10th place.
- Alta Badia first hosted a World Cup Slalom in December 2006. A total of seven Slalom World Cup races have been held there to date.
- No athlete has won the Alta Badia Slalom more than once and no athlete has been on the podium here more than twice.
- Only one nation won a Slalom race in Alta Badia more than once, it was Austria thanks to the efforts of Reinfried Herbst in 2009/10 and Marcel Hirscher in 2011/12. Norway, Switzerland, Croatia, France and Sweden have one victory each.
- Timon Haugan (NOR/Van Deer) claimed the most recent 2024/25 World Cup Slalom race in Alta Badia. Loic Meillard (SUI/Rossignol) was 2nd and Atle Lie McGrath (NOR/Head) finished 3rd.
- No Italian skier has ever won a World Cup Slalom race on home snow in Alta Badia. The
  last and the only Italian on the podium here was Giuliano Razzoli finishing 2nd in
  2011/12.
- Italian skiers haven't won a men's World Cup Slalom event for 90 consecutive races. It's
  Italy's all-time longest winless streak in history. Manfred Moelgg was the last Italian to
  win a World Cup Slalom race in Zagreb in January 2017.
