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2 Summary of TD Education

2.1 Application Process

TD Applicants should be recruited from active members of the FIS or NSA. Ideal applicants should have experience with the sport (i.e., National TD, working with a local organizer, former athlete, team member) and be able to communicate in English.

The application to become a FIS Ski Jumping TD may only be made through the candidate's National Ski Association or directly through FIS. The application should be submitted to the Chair of the FIS Sub-Committee for Officials, Rules and Control by the Chair of officials of the respective National Ski Association. The official registration form of the FIS must be used for the application.

Upon acceptance to become a FIS Ski Jumping TD, the applicant will receive access to the FIS E-Learning platform Moodle and will be registered as such in the central data system of the FIS – Berkutschi

2.2 Applicant Phase

The Applicant must:

- Study the only course "Welcome to FIS"
- Study the only course "How do we work at FIS"
- Optionally study the course "Basic Training Ski Jumping"
- Prove necessary English skills
- Pass the online Multiple-Choice exam

2.3 Candidate Phase:

Candidate phase last 3 consecutive years.

First year:

The Candidate:

- Must attend at least one FIS Ski Jumping TD seminar during the training period.
- Must work during national competitions on different positions to get the overall detailed knowledge of the organization of the competition
- Must proof active approach to ski jumping movement and actively participate on national level

Second year:

The Candidate must:

- Attend a (second) FIS Ski Jumping TD Seminar in which the written exam will take place, conducted by the Chair of a designated member of the Sub-Committee for Officials, Rules, and Control
- Pass the written exam that can be taken no earlier than 12 months before the end of the training period (i.e., at least 24 months after the acceptance to the Candidate phase)
 - o If the candidates do not pass the exam they may make one additional attempt after a two-year waiting period, however, a new application form must be submitted by the Chair of officials of their National Ski Association.
 - o If they do not pass on the second attempt, approval for any further attempts must be granted by the Sub-Committee for Officials, Rules and Control SJ.

Third year:

The Candidate must:

- Pass the practical exam for which the candidate will be nominated by the Chair of Officials of their NSA after successfully passing the written exam
 - o Competition used is determined by the annual Obman meeting. It should be conducted at a FIS Cup competition (in exceptional cases, Continental Cup competitions are allowed)
 - o The candidate will formally work on the competition as a Ski Jumping TDA and will perform the role of TDA under direct supervision of the TD.
 - o An assessment of the candidate's performance during the practical test is reported by the supervising TD and/or Cup coordinator to the Chair of the responsible FIS Sub-Committee.
 - o The Chair then decides whether the candidate has passed the exam. After passing the exam the candidate will be listed in the FIS data system – Berkutschi – as a FIS Ski Jumping TD.
 - o If the candidate fails the practical exam, the Chair of officials of the National Ski Association may, after consulting with the Chair of the FIS Sub-Committee for Officials, Rules and Control, propose and arrange for an additional practical test.
 - o If the candidate does not pass the practical test on the second attempt, the FIS Sub-Committee for Officials, Rules and Control must approve any additional attempts.
 - o After successfully completing the exam, candidates will receive their license in the form of a FIS Ski Jumping passport, pin, and patch.

2.4 Licensed Phase:

In general, the TD license is valid for two years.

The Licensed TD must:

- Participate in National or FIS TD Seminars every second year and update themselves every year
- Prove active engagement in TD work demonstrated by assignments. In detail, TDs must prove at least one FIS TD assignment/year (national or FIS)
- Prove active engagement in development of Ski Jumping in their country
- A TD license will be revoked if the TD fails to work as an assigned FIS TD for two consecutive years without justified cause.
- A TD license will be revoked if the TD fails attend a TD seminar for two consecutive years without a justified cause.

3 Training and Education Opportunities

3.1 Seminar

TD Candidates and licensed TDs need to actively engage in TD Seminars. Not only will the candidates participate alongside licensed TDs, but they will also contribute to the learning process. These sessions go beyond traditional lectures, incorporating interactive workshops, role-plays, simulations, and real-case presentations.

Seminars are key in TD education and as such reserved for TD Candidates and licensed FIS TD. However, if the space and organization allow, other interested stakeholders, such as National TDs (licensed and/or in training), LOC members, coaches etc., may participate. However, access to supporting learning material and the FIS e-learning platform is exclusive for FIS TD Candidates and FIS licensed TDs.

The seminars must be organized every two years in each region in late autumn. The duration of the seminar should be at least two days

At least one member of the S.C. SJ Officials, Rules & Control must be present as a lecturer and a member of the examination board.

The invitation and agenda of the approved FIS seminars must be then sent through the FIS Nordic Office to the FIS Sub-Committee for Officials, Rules and Control , the Obmen, the SJ FIS staff, and the NSA at least 20 days before.

The agenda, the presentations and videos prepared must be shared with the FIS Nordic office to be uploaded to the seminar folder on the FIS E-Learning Platform Moodle.

An update on the WC rules can be organized by the FIS Sub-Committee for Officials, Rules and Control for the TDs nominated for the WC events.

3.2 In Service Education and Training

In addition to theoretical knowledge, in-service education and training, i.e., active participation in specified roles during an event, is a cornerstone in the education of Candidates and the training of licensed TD. All in-service training for Candidates is meticulously observed, with reports provided to FIS to ensure comprehensive feedback and growth.

3.3 E-Learning

The overall FIS education strategy considers a blended-learning approach. As such, all applicants, candidates and licensed TD have access to the FIS E-Learning Platform Moodle (www.edu.fis-ski.com). Moodle is meant to provide a platform for self-regulated e-learning at the discretion of the user. Additionally, it supports the in-person and/or guided e-learning process with supplementary information and learning tools.

4 Governance of TD Education

The responsibility for all TD matters, including the educational content, mode and methods of education, belongs to the FIS Sub-Committee for Officials, Rules and Control.
