

## Audi FIS Alpine Ski World Cup 2025/26 - Women's Slalom Courchevel stat sheet

## **General Slalom stats**

- The first Slalom race won this season by **Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic)** was **USA's** 200<sup>th</sup> women's Slalom podium. Her third win this season was **USA's** 100<sup>th</sup> women's Slalom win. **Shiffrin** is the all-time leader for men's and women's Slalom wins (67) and podiums (92), and is responsible for 67% of Slalom wins and 46% of all Slalom podiums for the **USA**.
- The last time **Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic)** won the opening three Slalom races of a World Cup season was in 2019/20. **Shiffrin** is on a four-race SL winning streak since the last Slalom race of last season. **Shiffrin** has made a winning streak of at least four Slalom races on seven occasions no other women's skier has done so more than twice.
- Mikaela Shiffrin's (USA/Atomic) longest Slalom winning streak is seven races, and she is the only
  skier to have achieved this twice. Seven is second-longest for women behind Vreni Schneider (SUI)
  and Janica Kostelic (CRO) on eight consecutive races each, with Kostelic the only skier to have won
  her races within a single season.
- Camille Rast's (SUI) 3rd in Gurgl was Switzerland's 200<sup>th</sup> women's Slalom podium finish, which is third-highest behind Austria (286) and USA (202). For women's Slalom victories, however, the USA (100) leads Austria (89), while Switzerland in third has 81. For men's and women's Slalom victories, Switzerland is on 107, which is fifth-highest, just one behind Sweden (108).
- Lara Colturi (ALB/Blizzard) is on her first three-race Slalom podium streak, and still looking for her and Albania's first World Cup win in any men's or women's event.
- Lena Duerr (GER/Head) and Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic) are the only two skiers to have made at least four Slalom podiums in each of the past four seasons. With each victory this season, both skiers increase their record as their nation's oldest women's World Cup Slalom race winner.

## Courchevel

- Six women's Slalom World Cup races have been held at **Courchevel** since the first in 2010/11. **France** has never made a women's SL podium in **Courchevel**, and has not made a women's Slalom podium at any French venue since **Leila Piccard (FRA)** finished third in **Meribel** in 1994/95.
- Marie Lamure (FRA/Rossignol) has been a member of the Club des Sports Courchevel since age seven, and was the only French women's skier to make a top 10 Slalom finish last season. Marion Chevrier (FRA/Atomic) is the only French women's skier to make a top 10 Slalom finish so far this season.
- Marlies Schild (AUT) is the only skier to have won more than one Slalom race in Courchevel with
  three victories, while Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic), Petra Vlhova (SVK, Rossignol) and Zrinka Ljutic
  (CRO/Atomic) won the other three. Shiffrin, Andreja Slokar (SLO, Nordica) and Urska Hrovat (SLO)
  also each won a Slalom race in nearby Meribel.
- If Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic) wins, it will be her fifth consecutive Slalom victory. The last skier to win five consecutive Slalom races was Petra Vlhova (SVK) across the 2019/20 and 2020/21 seasons.



- If Wendy Holdener (SUI/Head) starts in Courchevel, she will become the sixth women's skier to make 130 World Cup Slalom starts. Lena Duerr (GER/Head) is the all-time leader for women's Slalom starts on 141. Other active skiers in the top 10 are Anna Swenn Larsson (SWE/Head) on 125 and Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic) on 121. Holdener has 38 Slalom podiums, which is sixth-highest for women's skiers.
- Camille Rast (SUI/Head) and Wendy Holdener (SUI/Head) each have two Slalom World Cup wins, which is equal-fifth for Swiss women's skiers (alongside Sonja Nef and Karin Roten Meier). A win for either skier would see them move to outright fifth on Switzerland's list for all-time women's World Cup SL victories. If Holdener wins, she will become the oldest athlete representing Switzerland to win a women's World Cup SL race at age 32 (Vreni Schneider holds the current record of age 30).
- A win for **Switzerland** will see the nation tie **Sweden** for 108 men's and women's Slalom World Cup wins, which is fourth-highest behind **Austria** (222), **France** (133) and **USA** (125).
- Emma Aicher's (GER/Head) third-place finish in Levi this season made her the fifth German skier to have made a women's World Cup podium in Downhill, Super G and Slalom. With wins in DH and SG already, a SL win will see Aicher become the third German woman (along with Hilde Gerg and Maria Hoefl-Riesch) to have won World Cup races in DH, SG and SL.
- **Germany** has 29 men's and women's Slalom World Cup wins one more win will see **Germany** become the 10<sup>th</sup> nation to achieve 30. Victory would also see **Germany** move from equal-10<sup>th</sup> for women's Slalom wins (13) alongside **Liechtenstein** to outright 10<sup>th</sup>.
- Katharina Liensberger (AUT/Rossignol) and Lena Duerr (GER/Head) are both on 17 Slalom World Cup podiums, alongside Annemarie Moser-Proell (AUT), Tina Maze (SLO) and Sarka Strachova (CZE). This is 21<sup>st</sup> best for women's Slalom podiums, behind Nicole Hosp (AUT) who rounds out the Top 20 outright on 19 Slalom podiums.
- Katharina Liensberger's (AUT/Rossignol) 17 Slalom podiums is equal-fourth highest for Austrian
  women alongside Annemarie Moser-Proell (AUT). A podium in Courchevel will see Liensberger pass
  Moser-Proell into fourth outright. Liensberger has three Slalom wins, which is equal fifth for Austrian
  women alongside Moser-Proell and five other non-active skiers. A win in Courchevel will see
  Liensberger pass them into outright fifth behind Nicole Hosp (AUT) on 5.
- If two Austrian skiers finish in the top 10 in **Courchevel**, **Austria** will become the first nation to record 1000 top 10 World Cup finishes in women's Slalom.
- Anna Swenn Larsson (SWE/Head) is on 14 Slalom World Cup podiums, needing one more to become the 29<sup>th</sup> women's skier to make 15 SL podiums. Larsson made two Slalom podiums last season, most recently in January 2025. If Larsson does not make the podium in Courchevel, it will be her longest streak (9 Slalom races) without a Slalom podium since 2018/19.
- If Paula Moltzan (USA/Rossignol) makes the podium in Courchevel, she will move from equal-10th to outright 10th on the USA's list for all-time women's World Cup Slalom podiums. Moltzan is currently on three SL podiums, behind Lindsey Vonn (USA) on five. Moltzan is the only USA skier besides Shiffrin to have made more than one World Cup SL podium since 2009/10.
