

## FACTS & FIGURES – Women’s Super G in Cortina d’Ampezzo

- **Federica Brignone (ITA/Rossignol)** can win her 11th World Cup Super G race, which would take her past Michaela Dorfmeister (GER) into outright sixth place on the women's all-time list.
- Brignone can record her sixth consecutive top-five finish in a World Cup Super G race, which would equal her career-high, set between February 2020 and January 2021.
- **Lara Gut-Behrami (SUI/Head)** can win her fourth World Cup Super G race in Cortina d'Ampezzo, which would tie Garmisch-Partenkirchen, Germany, as her most successful Super G venue in terms of World Cup wins.
- If Gut-Behrami reaches the podium on both Saturday and Sunday, that will draw her level with Anja Paerson (SWE) in equal sixth on the women's all-time list with 95 World Cup podiums.
- **Sofia Goggia (ITA/Atomic)** can win her eighth World Cup Super G race to join Hilde Gerg (GER) in equal eighth place on the women's all-time list. She is currently level with Alexandra Meissnitzer (AUT) and Tina Weirather (LIE) on seven World Cup Super G wins.
- Goggia can win her first World Cup Super G race on home snow in Italy. Her only previous Super G podium on Italian snow came in Cortina in January 2017.
- Goggia, who won the Beaver Creek Super G in December, can win two World Cup Super G races in the same season for the second time after 2021/22, when she won in Lake Louise and Val d'Isère.
- **Lindsey Vonn (USA/Head)** can win her seventh World Cup Super G race in Cortina d'Ampezzo alone. Only 10 other women have won seven or more World Cup Super G races at all venues combined. Vonn's six Super G wins in one resort is already a women's record.
- **Conny Hütter (AUT/Head)** won the St. Moritz Super G in December and can win multiple World Cup Super G races in one season for the first time. She has won exactly one Super G race in each of the last four seasons, including this season.
- **Lauren Macuga (USA/Rossignol)** won the last Super G in St. Anton. She can become the third American woman after Vonn and Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic) to win back-to-back World Cup Super G races, and first since Shiffrin did it in December 2018.

*The following stats do not take the result of Saturday's Downhill into account. Some of them may need reconfirming on Sunday, pending Saturday's result.*

- **Brignone** can win her 31st World Cup race in all disciplines, which would tie her for equal 11th on the women's all-time list with Petra Vlhova (SVK/Rossignol) and Erika Hess (SUI). If Brignone wins on both Saturday and Sunday, she will move into outright 11th place with 32 wins, one win behind Hanni Wenzel (LIE, 33) in 10th.

- Brignone can win a World Cup race on home snow for the first time in nearly four years, since she won a Super G race in Val di Fassa in February 2021. Three of her 30 World Cup wins have come in Italy.
- Brignone can reach the podium in Cortina for the first time at World Cup or world championship level. In 23 World Cup races and five world championships races before this weekend, her best result is fourth, in a World Cup Super G in January 2022. She only has five top-10 results in those 28 races.
- **Gut-Behrami** can win her 46th World Cup race in all disciplines to equal Renate Goetschl (AUT) in fifth place on the all-time women's list.
- Gut-Behrami can win her fifth World Cup race in all disciplines in Cortina to make it her most successful venue. She has also won four times in Crans Montana and Garmisch-Partenkirchen. Including her two world championship triumphs in Super G and Giant Slalom in Cortina in 2021, Gut-Behrami has won six major races in the Italian resort.
- **Goggia** can win her 26th World Cup race in all disciplines, which would draw her level with Michela Figini (SUI) and Tina Maze (SLO) in equal 16th place on the women's all-time list.
- **Vonn** can win her first World Cup race since claiming the Are Downhill on 14 March 2018. Her last win in Cortina came in Downhill on 20 January 2018.
- Vonn, 40, can smash the record as the oldest winner of a women's World Cup race, currently held by 34-year-old Brignone. Vonn was the oldest winner of a women's World Cup Downhill race at age 33 until Brignone's victory last weekend in St. Anton.
- **Hütter** can win a World Cup race on Italian snow for the first time. Only two of her 30 World Cup podiums prior to this weekend have come in Italy, including one in Cortina (a runner-up finish in Super G in 2023).
- Hütter can win three World Cup races in all disciplines in one season for the first time.
