

Audi FIS Alpine Ski World Cup 2025/26 – Women's Super G St. Moritz stat sheet

General Super G stats

- **Lara Gut-Behrami (SUI/Head)** won her third consecutive Super G globe last season to become the first women's skier to win six SG Globes. **Gut-Behrami** won Overall titles in 2015/16 and 2023/24, which is the largest gap (8 seasons) between Overall titles among the 16 women's skiers to have won more than one big globe. **Gut-Behrami** is the only woman finish inside the Top 3 of the Overall classification in each of the past three seasons, and the only woman to win more than one SG race in each of the past three seasons.
- The nine women's Super G races last season were won by six different skiers, more than any other women's event. SG is the only women's event to feature at least six different race winners in each of the past four seasons.
- **Federica Brignone (ITA/Rossignol)** won more Super G races (3) and made more SG podiums (7) than any other skier last season, including **Lara Gut-Behrami (SUI/Head)** (two wins, six podiums), to whom she lost the SG globe by 35 points. **Brignone** won her 10th and final race of the 2024/25 season in SG at **La Thuile** at the age of 34 years and 243 days, to extend her own record as the oldest winner of a women's World Cup race in any discipline.
- **Sofia Goggia (ITA/Atomic)** finished a career-high in the Super G standings last season, with one victory among five SG podiums. **Goggia's** 26 career World Cup wins across all disciplines is third best among Italian men's and women's skiers behind **Alberto Tomba (ITA)** on 50 and **Federica Brignone (ITA/Rossignol)** on 37.
- **Lindsey Vonn (USA/Head)** has the most Super G World Cup wins (28) and the most Super G podiums (47) of any women's or men's skier. For SG wins, **Vonn** is four ahead of her nearest rivals, **Hermann Maier (AUT)** and **Lara Gut-Behrami (SUI/Head)**, both on 24. For SG podiums, **Vonn** is two ahead of **Gut-Behrami** on 45. **Vonn's** five SG globes is equal-second highest alongside **Katja Seizinger (GER)**, beaten only by **Gut-Behrami** (6).
- **Lindsey Vonn (USA/Head)** and **Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic)** have previously competed in eight Super G races together, each winning one (**Vonn** in 2015/16, **Shiffrin** in 2018/19), while **Shiffrin** finished higher in six of the eight races.

St. Moritz stats

- Entering the weekend, **St. Moritz** had hosted 54 women's World Cup races, of which 21 were Super G. The last SG race was in 2024/25 and was won by **Cornelia Huetter (AUT/Head)** ahead of **Lara Gut-Behrami (SUI/Head)** and **Sofia Goggia (ITA/Atomic)**.
- The last time a skier representing **Switzerland** won a World Cup race in **St. Moritz** was in 2021/22 when **Lara Gut-Behrami (SUI/Head)** won the Super G.
- **Lindsey Vonn (USA/Head)** will make her 107th World Cup Super G start to move ahead of **Renate Goetschl (AUT)** into outright second place on the all-time women's list, behind only

Lara Gut-Behrami (SUI/Head) on 111. **Elena Curtoni (ITA/Head)** is the only other active skier in the top 10 for most women's SG starts, in equal-sixth on 92.

- The last time **Lindsey Vonn (USA/Head)** and **Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic)** competed in the same World Cup race was **Vonn's** final race before her 2019 retirement - the Super G at **Cortina d'Ampezzo** in 2018/19, which **Shiffrin** won while **Vonn** recorded a DNF. Since that race, **Shiffrin** has won a further 50 World Cup races, but only two of those were SG wins.
- **Lindsey Vonn (USA/Head)** and **Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic)** are equal first with five World Cup wins in **St. Moritz**. **Vonn** has more Super G wins (3) in **St. Moritz** than **Shiffrin** (2) or any other skier, and more podiums across all events (10) in **St. Moritz** than any other skier, with **Shiffrin** (8) in third place. However, **Shiffrin** has more SG podiums in **St. Moritz** (5) than **Vonn** (4), behind all-time leader **Lara Gut-Behrami (SUI/Head)** (6).
- **Lindsey Vonn (USA/Head)** made her World Cup return in 2024/25 in the Super G race in **St. Moritz**, finishing 14th. **Vonn** has contested eight SG races since her return, with a best result of second in **Sun Valley** in March 2025, marking her first World Cup podium since a third-place SG finish in **Are** in 2017/18. A win in any race this season would make **Vonn** the oldest skier to win a World Cup race.
- **Sofia Goggia (ITA/Atomic)** is on 19 World Cup Super G podiums. If she is in the top three in **St. Moritz**, she will become the 10th women's skier to amass 20 SG World Cup podiums, and the second Italian to do so after **Federica Brignone (ITA/Rossignol)** (27). A win for **Goggia** would see her equal **Lindsey Vonn's (USA/Head)** record of three SG victories in **St. Moritz**.
- **Alice Robinson (NZL/Salomon)** made three consecutive podiums for the first time in her career in recent weeks. **Robinson** is yet to make a Super G podium, with a best finish of 4th in **St. Moritz** in 2021/22 and **Kvitfjell** in 2024/25. One more World Cup podium will see **Robinson** break into the top 70 list for most women's World Cup podiums.
- **Emma Aicher (GER/Head)** was age 21 when she won last season's Super G race in **La Thuile**, which made her the youngest women's SG race winner since **Lara Gut-Behrami (SUI/Head)** won at age 19 in **Altenmarkt-Zauchensee** in 2010/11.
- **Kajsa Vickhoff Lie (NOR)** is currently on five World Cup Super G podiums, which is second best for **Norway** women's skiers behind **Ragnhild Mowinckel (NOR)** (7).
- **Cornelia Huetter (AUT/Head)** has 14 World Cup Super G podiums, equal-fifth for Austrian skiers alongside **Anita Wachter (AUT)**. **Huetter's** most recent podium, a third in Downhill in **Kvitfjell** last season, was her 32nd World Cup podium, which saw her break into the top 50 list for most women's World Cup podiums.
