

Audi FIS Alpine Ski World Cup 2025/26 – Women’s Super G Tarvisio stat sheet

Previous SG race (Val d’Isere) stats

- **Sofia Goggia (ITA/Atomic)** won the second Super G race this season, in **Val d’Isere**, by 0.15s ahead of **Alice Robinson (NZL/Salomon)**, with **Lindsey Vonn (USA/Head)** in third. It was **Goggia’s** first victory in any discipline since a Downhill win in **Cortina d’Ampezzo** in 2024/25, ending a 22-race winless streak. This was **Goggia’s** longest winless streak since the one that started with her World Cup debut in 2011 and continued for 60 races before her first win (DH in **Jeongseon**) in 2016/17.
- **Sofia Goggia’s (ITA/Atomic)** win in **Val d’Isere** was her eighth Super G win among 21 podiums (38% win-to-podium rate) in 63 SG starts (33% podium-to-race rate), compared to her Downhill record of 19 wins among 38 podiums (50% win-to-podium rate) in 70 starts (54% podium-to-race rate). **Goggia’s** win sees her join **Hilde Gerg (GER)** in equal-eighth place for all-time women’s SG wins (8).
- **Alice Robinson’s (NZL/Salomon)** 2nd in **Val d’Isere** was her second Super G podium (in 41 SG starts). Robinson won the first SG race this season in **St. Moritz** to become the first Alpine skier from a non-European/North American nation to win a World Cup race in more than one of the four individual disciplines (SL, GS, DH, SG). After her 2nd in **Val d’Isere**, **Robinson** joins **Ilka Stuhec (SLO/Kaestle)** and **Mateja Svet (SLO)**, but she competed for **JUG** on 22 World Cup podiums in all disciplines, which is equal-66th all-time for women.
- **Lindsey Vonn’s (USA/Head)** 3rd in **Val d’Isere** was her 48th Super G podium, which is the most for women and men. As of 18 Jan 2026, **Vonn’s** last of her 28 SG wins came 2955 days ago in 2017/18 in **Val d’Isere**. **Vonn’s** first SG podium (3rd in **Lake Louise**) came in 2004, the same year that the four youngest SG competitors in **Val d’Isere** were born: **Sara Thaler (ITA/Rossignol)**, **Garance Meyer (FRA/Dynastar)**, **Allison Mollin (USA/Head)** and **Malorie Blanc (SUI/Atomic)**.
- **Elena Curtoni’s (ITA/Head)** 4th in **Val d’Isere** was the third time she has finished 4th in the 14 Super G races she has contested since making her last SG podium, a 2nd in **Kvitfjell** in 2022/23.
- **Mirjam Puchner (AUT/Atomic)** and **Kira Weidle-Winkelmann (GER/Rossignol)** are the only two skiers to have taken part in all 43 Super G races from 2020/21 to **Val d’Isere** this season.
- **Ilka Stuhec’s (SLO/Kaestle)** 7th in **Val d’Isere** was her best Super G result in the 43 SG races she started since winning the SG in **Val Gardena-Groeden** in 2018/19.

Tarvisio stats

- **Tarvisio** has hosted three World Cup women’s Super G races: 2006/07, 2008/09 and 2010/11. The first was won by **Renate Goetschl (AUT)** by 1.01s ahead of **Nicole Hosp (AUT)**, which remains the biggest winning margin of the three.
- **Lindsey Vonn (USA/Head)** won the next two races in **Tarvisio**, including in 2008/09 at age 24 years and 127 days, making her the youngest SG winner in **Tarvisio**. **Vonn’s** 0.23s win ahead of **Julia Mancuso (USA)** in 2010/11 is the smallest SG winning margin in **Tarvisio**.
- In addition to **Lindsey Vonn (USA/Head)**, two other active skiers have previously competed in Super G in **Tarvisio** - **Lara Gut-Behrami (SUI/Head)** finished 20th as a 17-year-old in 2008/09 and 12th in 2010/11, while a 20-year-old **Elena Curtoni (ITA/Head)** finished 19th in 2010/11.

- A win for a skier from any nation other than **USA** or **Austria** will be a first for that nation in women's Super G in **Tarvisio**. **Germany**, **Switzerland** and **Slovenia** are the only other nations to have made a women's SG podium in **Tarvisio**.
- Any finish higher than 5th by a skier from **Italy** will be a new Italian best on home snow in **Tarvisio** for women's Super G. **Nadia Fanchini's (ITA)** 5th in 2008/09 is **Italy's** current best.
- **Renate Goetschl (AUT)** was age 31 years and 210 days when she won the Super G in **Tarvisio** in 2006/07, making her the oldest SG winner in **Tarvisio** to date. Skiers who could surpass that record with a win this weekend include: **Lindsey Vonn (USA/Head)**, **Sofia Goggia (ITA/Atomic)**, **Cornelia Huetter (AUT/Head)**, **Elena Curtoni (ITA/Head)**, **Ilka Stuhec (SLO/Kaestle)**, **Mirjam Puchner (AUT/Atomic)** and **Jacqueline Wiles (USA/Rossignol)** among others.
- If **Sofia Goggia (ITA/Atomic)** wins, it will be the first time that an Italian woman has won two consecutive Super G races. A win for **Goggia** would be her ninth in SG, and leave her one win from becoming the eighth women's skier (and second Italian woman) to reach double figure SG wins.
- If **Sofia Goggia (ITA/Atomic)** finishes in the top 3 she will move to 22 Super G podiums, which would make her equal-eighth best for women alongside **Anna Veith (AUT)**. **Goggia** is currently in equal-ninth on 21 SG podiums alongside **Tina Weirather (LIE)**.
- If **Lindsey Vonn (USA/Head)** makes the podium, she will move from 48 to 49 Super G podiums, edging towards two milestones - becoming the first women's or men's skier to reach 50 SG podiums, and becoming the first women's skier to reach 50 podiums in more than one discipline. Five women's skiers have reached 50 podiums in a single discipline – three in Downhill: **Vonn** (70), **Renate Goetschl (AUT)** (59) and **Annemarie Moser-Proell (AUT)** (54), and two in Slalom: **Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic)** (96) and **Marlies Schild (AUT)** (56).
- If **Ilka Stuhec (SLO/Kaestle)** wins, **Slovenia** will move from equal-ninth for women's Super G wins (7, alongside **Liechtenstein**) to equal-eighth alongside **Sweden** (8).
- **Kasja Vickhoff Lie (NOR/Head)** will make her 50th Super G start in **Tarvisio**. If she wins, **Norway** will move from 12th place for women's Super G wins (4) to equal-11th alongside **Canada** (5). A podium for **Lie** would see **Norway** move from 17 to 18 women's SG podiums, which would be equal 11th alongside **Canada**. **Lie** is currently on five SG podiums, which is second-best for Norwegian women behind **Ragnhild Mowinckel** on seven.
- If **Alice Robinson (NZL/Salomon)** wins, she will become the youngest women's SG winner in **Tarvisio** at 24 years and 48 days as of 18 Jan 2026. Skiers who could also achieve this include **Emma Aicher (GER/Head)** and **Malorie Blanc (SUI/Atomic)**, among others.
- **Alice Robinson (NZL/Salomon)** has made the podium in her last two Super G races (1st in **St. Moritz**, 2nd in **Val d'Isere**). A podium in **Tarvisio** would mark the first time she has made three consecutive SG podiums (she has done so three times in Giant Slalom, including a six-race podium streak).
- If **Cornelia Huetter (AUT/Head)** makes the podium, she will move to 15 Super G podiums, which would be outright fifth-best for **Austria**. **Huetter** is currently in equal-fifth among Austrian women alongside **Anita Wachter** on 14. **Huetter** would be the 18th skier to reach 15 women's SG podiums.

- If **Corinne Suter (SUI/Head)** makes the podium, she will become the 25th woman to reach 10 SG podiums. **Suter** would be the third Swiss woman to achieve this after **Lara Gut-Behrami (SUI/Head)** (45) and **Fabienne Suter** (11).
- **Italy** is on 98 women's Super G podiums, needing two more to become the fourth nation to reach 100 after **Austria** (237), **Switzerland** (123) and **Germany** (101).
- The **USA** is on 89 women's Super G podiums, needing one more to become the fifth nation to reach 90 after **Austria** (237), **Switzerland** (123), **Germany** (101) and **Italy** (98).
- **Lindsey Vonn (USA/Head)** will make her 109th Super G start in **Tarvisio**, which is second-highest for women's SG behind **Lara Gut-Behrami (SUI/Head)** on 111. **Elena Curtoni (ITA/Head)** will make her 95th, which is equal-fifth highest for women's SG alongside **Julia Mancuso (USA)**, while **Ilka Stuhec (SLO/Kaestle)** will make her 85th, which is equal-14th for women's SG alongside **Isolde Kostner (ITA)**.
