

Audi FIS Alpine Ski World Cup 2025/26 – Men's Super G Kitzbuehel stat sheet

Previous SG race stats – Wengen

- **Giovanni Franzoni (ITA/Rossignol)** won the fifth race of the Audi FIS World Cup Super G season in Wengen (SUI) on 16 January - his first World Cup win in his 60th World Cup start. **Stefan Babinsky (AUT/Head)** finished 2nd - his first ever World Cup podium finish, in his 94th World Cup start. And **Franjo von Allmen (SUI/Head)** ended 3rd for the second successive World Cup Super G.
- **Giovanni Franzoni (ITA/Rossignol)** became the first Italian skier to win a World Cup Super G race in Wengen and he recorded the first victory for team Italy in the men's World Cup this season. Italy are now the seventh different nation to win a men's World Cup this season, alongside Switzerland, Austria, France, Norway, Czechia and Brazil.
- **Giovanni Franzoni's (ITA/Rossignol)** win in Wengen was Italy's 20th World Cup Super G win. Italy lies 5th in the list of the nations with the most Super G wins, a list headed by Austria with 89 victories.
- **Stefan Babinsky's (AUT/Head)** first Alpine World Cup podium place came after he had recorded three 4th-place finishes, all in Super G (Cortina d'Ampezzo and Aspen in 2022/23 and Copper Mountain in 2025/26).
- Only two athletes have finished inside the top 10 of every World Cup Super G race this season; **Marco Odermatt (SUI/Stöckli)** and **Stefan Rogentin (SUI/Fischer)**.
- **Marco Odermatt (SUI/Stoeckli)** has finished inside the top 5 in each of the last nine World Cup Super G races. It's his second longest career streak. Odermatt holds the all-time longest streak of 19 consecutive World Cup Super G top-5 finishes.
- **Marco Odermatt (SUI/Stoeckli)** has finished inside the top 10 in each of his past 12 World Cup races across all disciplines. He has claimed five wins and a total of eight podium finishes during that streak.
- The reigning three-time World Cup Super G champion **Marco Odermatt (SUI/Stoeckli)** leads this season's standings with 325 points, ahead of **Vincent Kriechmayr (AUT/Head, 231)** in 2nd and **Giovanni Franzoni (ITA/Rossignol, 218)** in 3rd.

Kitzbuehel Super G stats

- Kitzbuehel will host a men's World Cup Super G race on Friday for the 23rd time. The first race here took place during the 1994/95 season.
- **Marco Odermatt (SUI/Stoeckli)** won the most recent 2024/25 Kitzbuehel World Cup Super G race - becoming just the third Swiss skier to win a Kitzbuehel Super G after Didier Defago (2013/14) and Didier Cuche (2009/10). **Raphael Haaser (AUT/Atomic)** finished 2nd - one of five 2nd place finishes in Super G for the Austrian, who is yet to

win a World Cup Super G. **Stefan Rogentin (SUI/Fischer)** ended 3rd - which is the last time he appeared on a World Cup Super G podium.

- **Hermann Maier (AUT)** has the best record in the Kitzbuehel Super G, having claimed the most wins (six) and the most podiums (seven). **Aksel Lund Svindal (NOR)** won three Kitzbuehel Super Gs, while no other skier has managed to win more than once.
- Team Austria has the most wins in the Kitzbuehel Super G – 10. Norway has four wins and Switzerland three.
- Team Austria has been the most successful nation in men's Super G this season, claiming two wins (one each for **Vincent Kriechmayr (AUT/Head)** and **Marco Schwarz (AUT/Atomic)** and four podium finishes. This puts them narrowly ahead of Team Switzerland who have one win and four podium finishes.
- If an Austrian athlete wins in Kitzbuehel, it will be team Austria's 90th World Cup Super G win. Austria comfortably leads the list of the nations with the most Super G wins, 2nd-placed Switzerland only has 53.
- A win on Friday for **Vincent Kriechmayr (AUT/Head)** would make him the second most successful Austrian skier in the Kitzbuehel Super G in terms of wins, after he won in 2020/21. That is the only time in his eight Kitzbuehel Super G World Cup races that Kriechmayr has finished on the podium.
- A podium finish for **Vincent Kriechmayr (AUT/Head)** would see him claim 5th place on his own in the all-time World Cup Super G men's podiums list. Currently, Kriechmayr has 24 World Cup Super G podiums, level with **Stephan Eberharter (AUT)** and **Aleksander Aamodt Kilde (NOR/Atomic)**.
- If **Marco Odermatt (SUI/Stöckli)** wins in Kitzbuehel, it will be his 17th career World Cup Super G victory, which will see him join **Aksel Lund Svindal (NOR)** and **Renate Götschl (AUT)** in 4th place on the all-time list of World Cup Super G wins, men and women. **Lindsey Vonn (USA, Head)** currently leads this list with 28 Super G victories.
- A win for **Marco Odermatt (SUI/Stöckli)** would also see him join **Aksel Lund Svindal (NOR)** in 2nd place on the men's all-time World Cup Super G winners list. Currently, Odermatt has 16 Super G World Cup wins, one behind Svindal and eight behind **Hermann Maier (AUT)** who leads the men's field with 24 wins.
- If **Marco Odermatt (SUI/Stöckli)** finishes on the podium in both Friday's Super G and Saturday's Downhill in Kitzbuehel he will join **Marc Girardelli (LUX)** and **Henrik Kristoffersen (NOR/Van Deer)** in the 3rd spot on the list of the most men's World Cup podiums across all disciplines. Odermatt currently has 98 career podium finishes, while Girardelli and Kristoffersen have 100. Kristoffersen will have an opportunity to claim his 101st podium in Sunday's Slalom, also taking place in Kitzbuehel.

- **Marco Odermatt (SUI/Stöckli)** has the opportunity in Kitzbuehel to stretch his record streak of men's top-10 World Cup Super G finishes. The Swiss skier has finished inside the top 10 in his last 29 World Cup Super G races dating back to the race in Courchevel Meribel (FRA) in March 2022. In that time he has claimed 12 wins and 20 podium finishes.
- A top-three finish for **Franjo von Allmen (SUI/Head)** would be his fifth in his past seven World Cup races. This streak, which includes a win (in the second of two Val Gardena Downhills), a 2nd place (first of two Val Gardena Downhills) and two 3rd-place finishes (in the Livigno and Wengen Super G races), all of which came after he failed to reach the podium in his first three World Cup races this season.
- Fourth place in last year's Kitzbuehel Super G is **Franjo von Allmen (SUI/Head)** best finish in a speed race in Kitzbuehel.
- Wengen Super G winner **Giovanni Franzoni (ITA/Rossignol)** has one win and a 3rd place finish in his past three World Cup Super G races - this after 20 previous World Cup Super Gs without a podium finish. He has raced just twice in Kitzbuehel before, finishing 10th in last season's Super G and 14th in last season's Downhill.
- A win for **Raphael Haaser (AUT/Atomic)** would be his first World Cup success in his 99th start. The 2025 Super G World Championship silver medallist has seven World Cup podiums, all in Super G.
- A top-10 finish for **Stefan Rogentin (Fischer)** would be his 21st, which will see him join **Carlo Janka** in 6th place on the list of the most Swiss men's top-10 World Cup Super G finishes. **Didier Cuche** tops that list with 57 top-10 finishes.
- Team Canada has 99 men's World Cup Super G top-10 finishes. If any Canadian skier finishes in the top 10 in Kitzbuehel, Canada will become the eighth nation to reach 100.
