

## FACTS & FIGURES – Women's Slalom in Courchevel

- **Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic)**, returning from injury, has 99 World Cup wins and can become the first Alpine skier to reach 100 World Cup victories.
- Shiffrin can win her 63rd World Cup Slalom race, which would take her past Annemarie Moser-Pröll's (AUT) World Cup victories total in all disciplines (62) in Slalom alone. Lindsey Vonn (USA) is the only woman with more World Cup wins (82) in all disciplines than Shiffrin has just in Slalom.
- Shiffrin has 154 World Cup podiums in all disciplines and can equal Ingemar Stenmark's (SWE) record of 155 for any Alpine ski racer.
- Shiffrin has won the last six World Cup Slalom races that she has entered. She can win at least seven in a row for the third time, and first time since she won seven in a row from March 2018 to January 2019. Her personal record is 12 Slalom victories in a row, from February 2015 to December 2016.
- Shiffrin can win her third World Cup Slalom race of the 2024/25 season, after Levi and Gurgl. It would be the 11th different season in which she has won three or more Slalom races.
- Shiffrin can win her eighth World Cup race in Courchevel/Meribel in all disciplines, which would equal Levi as her most successful resort. Only one of her seven wins in Courchevel/Meribel was in Slalom, in December 2018.
- **Camille Rast (SUI/Head)** has been in the top five in all six Slalom races this season and can make it 7/7 in Courchevel. Prior to this season, she had only made the top five four times in her World Cup Slalom career.
- Rast won the last Slalom in Flachau and can join Shiffrin and Zrinka Ljutic (CRO/Atomic) in winning two Slaloms in a row this season.
- Rast leads the World Cup Slalom standings by 60 points over teammate Wendy Holdener (SUI/Head) and will be guaranteed to retain at least a share of the lead by finishing sixth or higher in Courchevel.
- Zrinka Ljutic (CRO/Atomic) has won two of the last three Slaloms and can become the first woman other than Shiffrin and Petra Vlhova (SVK/Rossignol) to win three out of four World Cup Slaloms since Marlies Schild (AUT) in 2012.
- Ljutic has finished only one of her four career races in Courchevel/Meribel, coming fifth in the Slalom at the 2022 World Cup finals.
- Wendy Holdener (SUI/Head) can reach a World Cup Slalom podium in France for the first time. Her 38 World Cup Slalom podiums have come in 12 countries.
- She does have one Giant Slalom in Courchevel in December 2019 the only one of her 54 World Cup podiums in all disciplines (including team events) to come in France.
- Holdener's 38 World Cup Slalom podiums place her sixth on the women's all-time list. The top 10 skiers on that list all have at least 14 Slalom victories except Holdener, who has only two.
- Holdener's last three World Cup Slalom podiums have been second place. She can equal her longest second-place streak among podium finishes of four, set from March 2019 to February 2020.

INTERNATIONAL SKI AND SNOWBOARD FEDERATION

- Sara Hector (SWE/Head) is still chasing her first World Cup Slalom victory and can become the third woman from Sweden to win in both Giant Slalom and Slalom at World Cup level. The other two are Anja Pärson and Pernilla Wiberg.
- In the absence of Vlhova, **Katharina Liensberger (AUT/Rossignol)** is the only woman in the field other than Shiffrin with more than two career World Cup slalom victories. Liensberger has won three World Cup slaloms, the last coming in March 2022 in Are.
- Lena Dürr (GER/Head) has won one World Cup Slalom race in her career, in Spindleruv Mlyn in January 2023. She can become the fifth woman representing Germany to win multiple World Cup Slalom races.
- Anna Swenn Larsson (SWE/Head) can reach the top five in Courchevel/Meribel for the first time. Her best finish in eight races in all disciplines in the French resort is seventh.
