

FACTS & FIGURES - Men's Slalom Schladming

- Clément Noël (FRA/Dynastar) has won four World Cup Slalom races this season and can become the second Frenchman to win five or more in a season, and first since Jean-Noël Augert (FRA) won five in 1970/71.
- Noël can become the first men's skier of any nationality to achieve five or more Slalom wins in a season since Marcel Hirscher (AUT/NED, Van Deer Racing) won five in 2018/19.
- Noël's four slalom victories already this season match his total from the last four seasons combined.
- Noël can win his 15th World Cup Slalom race to equal Ivica Kostelic (CRO) in sixth place on the men's all-time list.
- With a 15th career win, Noël would also tie Augert in equal third place for World Cup wins in all disciplines among Frenchmen, behind Alexis Pinturault (FRA/Head, 34) and Jean-Claude Killy (FRA, 18).
- In his seven previous races in the Schladming slalom, Noël has finished in every position in the top six except fifth. He has also finished ninth and recorded one DNF.
- In seven Slalom races this season, Noël's four wins are his only top-five finishes. His other results are sixth, 11th and DNF.
- Henrik Kristoffersen (NOR/Van Deer Racing) can become the first man to win the Schladming Slalom five times at World Cup level. He currently shares the record of four with Benjamin Raich (AUT).
- **UPDATED**: After his podium in the Schladming Giant Slalom on Tuesday, Kristoffersen has 92 World Cup podiums in all disciplines and can surpass Raich to move into outright fifth place on the men's all-time list with 93.
- Kristoffersen can reach his sixth World Cup Slalom podium in Schladming to tie Hirscher for second behind Raich, who reached seven podiums.
- Kristoffersen can win his first World Cup race in any discipline on Austrian snow since his last Schladming win five years and one day ago on 28 January, 2020.
- Linus Strasser (GER/Rossignol) can win the Schladming Slalom for the third time, which would represent half of his six total World Cup wins.
- Strasser can become the fourth three-time winner of the Schladming World Cup Slalom race, joining Kristoffersen (4), Raich (4) and Hirscher (3).
- In Strasser's last nine Schladming Slaloms, he has won twice but his next highest finish is 13th. In his last four, he has won twice and failed to finish twice.
- Strasser won last year's Schladming Slalom and can become the first man to win it in consecutive seasons since Kristoffersen in 2016 and 2017.
- Daniel Yule (SUI/Fischer) has three World Cup Slalom podiums in Schladming, all third places in consecutive years from 2018-20. Overall, third places make up over half of his individual World Cup podiums (9/17).
- If Yule reaches the podium in Schladming, half of his 18 individual World Cup podiums will have come on Austrian snow.
- If Yule reaches his fourth World Cup podium in Schladming, it will equal Kitzbühel as his most successful World Cup podium venue.

- Lucas Pinheiro Braathen (BRA/Atomic) is getting closer to becoming the first Brazilian to win an Alpine skiing World Cup race. He has been on the podium in two of the last three Slaloms.
- Pinheiro Braathen has reached 10 World Cup Slalom podiums. Three of his first four podiums were wins, but none of the six since have been on the top step.
- Atle Lie McGrath (NOR/Head) has either been on the podium (four times) or failed to finish (three times) in the last seven World Cup Slalom races. His only Slalom this season that he finished and wasn't on the podium was when he came 12th in the season-opening Slalom in Levi.
- Timon Haugan (NOR/Van Deer Racing) is another 'feast or famine' Slalom skier. In his last nine World Cup slaloms, he has two wins, a second, and no other finish higher than eighth.
- Alexander Steen Olsen (NOR/Rossignol) won the Slalom in Palisades Tahoe in February 2023. In his 18 World Cup Slaloms since then, his best result is seventh and he has only two top 10 finishes.
