

- The Coop FIS Cross-Country World Cup's second stage after the Milano Cortina 2026 Olympic Winter Games will be held in **Lahti, Finland**. Lahti has hosted the World Cup since its very first season, in 1981/82, missing only four seasons. Lahti has hosted seven editions of the FIS Nordic World Ski Championships and will also host its eighth edition in 2029.
- **Sweden** have won nine individual Women's World Cup events this season, with six different athletes. **Jonna Sundling (SWE)** and **Jessie Diggins (USA)** have won three individual races each.
- **Sweden** have placed at least one athlete on the podium in 17 out of the 20 individual World Cup races held so far.
- **Sweden** placed at least two athletes on the podium in eight out of the 20 individual World Cup races held so far, including a podium clean sweep in the Sprint Classic in Trondheim, Norway.
- **Jessie Diggins (USA)** is the only athlete who has won two consecutive World Cup races this season, the 20km Pursuit Classic and the Tour-debuting 5km Heat Mass Start Free in Toblach, Italy, during the Tour de Ski.
- **Linn Svahn (SWE)** won the Sprint Free in Falun, Sweden, last weekend, with **Kristine Stavaas Skistad (NOR)** in second place and **Nadine Faehndrich (SUI)** third. This was the second World Cup win in a row for Svahn, who also won the Sprint Classic in Goms, Switzerland before the Milano Cortina 2026 Olympic Games, where she won the gold medal.
- **Heide Weng (NOR)** won the Skiathlon Classic/Free in Falun, Sweden, last weekend, with **Jessie Diggins (USA)** in second place and **Frida Karlsson (SWE)** third. This was the first individual World Cup win for Weng in more than four years. The 34-year-old had stood on an individual World Cup podium 23 times since winning the 10km Mass Start Free Final Climb, in Val di Fiemme, Italy, on 4 January 2022.
- In the last edition of the World Cup held in Lahti last season, which was the final World Cup stage of the season, **Coletta Rydzek (GER)** claimed the Sprint Free race, while **Therese Johaug (NOR)** won the 50km Mass Start Classic. This was the first ever World Cup win for Rydzek. She also won the Team Sprint Free last season in Lahti partnering with **Laura Gimmler (GER)**. They also won the Team Sprint Free this season in Goms.
- **Jessie Diggins (USA)**, who will retire from the sport after the final stage in Lake Placid, United States, is the only active athlete with more than 20

individual World Cup victories. The Minnesotan star has 31 individual World Cup wins.

- **Jessie Diggins (USA)** has won three Overall World Cup titles, including two in the past two seasons. She is leading the Overall standings this season. If she wins a third consecutive Crystal Globe this season, and her fourth in total, she would be behind only **Elena Vaelbe Trubitsina (RUS)**, who won five titles between 1988/89 and 1996/97.
- **Jessie Diggins (USA)** won her third Overall Tour de Ski title this season. Only **Justyna Kowalczyk (POL)** and **Therese Johaug (NOR)**, with four Overall Tour de Ski trophies each, have won the competition more often.
- **Sweden** dominated the women's events at the Milano Cortina 2026 Olympic Winter Games, winning five gold medals out of six, including a podium clean sweep in the Sprint Classic. **Frida Karlsson (SWE)** was the most successful athlete, with two individual gold medals plus a silver medal in the relay. **Ebba Andersson (SWE)** won one gold and three silver medals, while **Jonna Sundling (SWE)** won one gold and two silver medals.
- At Milano Cortina 2026, **Ebba Andersson (SWE)** became the first Olympic Women's 50km Mass Start champion. It was Andersson's first Olympic gold medal, adding to her four Games silvers and a bronze.
