

FACTS & FIGURES - Women's Super G, St. Anton

- **Lara Gut-Behrami (SUI/Head)** will start as a firm favourite in St. Anton. Not only is the Swiss star the reigning Super G World Cup champion, 2022 Olympic champion and 2021 world champion, she has won two of the past three World Cup Super Gs in St. Anton.
- Gut-Behrami triumphed in the second of a double-header in 2023, having finished third in the opening race. She also won down the Karl Schranz course in 2021.
- Second in both of this season's Super G races, Gut-Behrami is tied at the top of the standings with **Sofia Goggia (ITA/Atomic)**.
- Gut-Behrami is gunning for her third Super G Crystal Globe in a row and her sixth overall. That would take her clear of Lindsey Vonn (USA/Head) and Katja Seizinger (GER) at the top of the list of women's World Cup Super G skiers.
- With 22 victories, she remains second on the all-time Super G World Cup wins list, behind Vonn who has 28 so far.
- Swiss skiers have dominated the women's Super G in St. Anton, winning three of the five races and claiming a further four podium places.
- A win for **Sofia Goggia (ITA/Atomic)** would not only lift her to the top of the Crystal Globe standings on her own, it would also make the Italian the eighth most successful women's World Cup Super G skier ever, alongside Hilde Gerg (GER).
- Victory in the opening Super G of the season in Beaver Creek in December was the seventh of Goggia's career and she followed it up with a third place in St. Moritz.
- Despite having won the downhill in St. Anton in 2021, Goggia is yet to finish a Super G in the resort, having failed in 2023 and 2021.
- **Federica Brignone's (ITA/Rossignol)** St. Anton Super G record is almost as good as Gut-Behrami's. The Italian won the opening race in 2023 and came second in the second race a day later.
- If she triumphs again this weekend, the 34-year-old will become the oldest female skier to win a World Cup Super G, overtaking Elisabeth Görgl (AUT), who won at the age of 33 years, 10 months, and 1 day.
- Brignone is currently fourth in the standings, after two fifth place finishes this season. In the past five seasons she has come second in the Crystal Globe Super G race four times, winning it in 2021/22.
- Brignone won twice last season to take her overall World Cup Super G victory tally to 10. Those wins helped extend her status as Italy's most successful female World Cup skier. Her career total of 29 wins puts her four clear of Goggia.
- No Austrian has ever won a women's World Cup Super G in St. Anton with Anna Fenninger, second in 2013 and Alexandra Meissnitzer, second in 1999, coming closest. But **Cornelia Hütter (AUT/Head)** has a great chance to break that drought.
- The Austrian won last time out in St. Moritz to take her career tally to five Super G triumphs, level with Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic).
- Hütter has a best finish in a St. Anton Super G of ninth.
- **Ariane Rädler (AUT/Head)** and **Stephanie Venier (AUT/Head)** will also grab the crowd's attention. Rädler is the one in form, having finished third in the opening Super G of the season in Beaver Creek. But Venier has history, having claimed her maiden Super G World Cup win just under a year ago in Crans Montana.
- It is a similar story for the two Italians, **Marta Bassino (ITA/Salomon)** and **Elena Curtoni (ITA/Head)**. Bassino has great St. Anton memories to call upon, having finished on the podium in two of her past three Super G races in the resort. While Curtoni is in good form,

having ended ninth and fourth in her two Super Gs this season.

- The returning **Lindsey Vonn (USA/Head)** will have the opportunity to extend her title as the most successful Super G skier in World Cup history. She currently has 28 victories.
- She can, at the age of 40, also become the oldest female skier to win a Super G World Cup race.
- Vonn was 14th on her return to the World Cup stage in December's Super G in St. Moritz after almost six years in retirement.
- She has only skied one Super G in St. Anton, finishing fourth in 2013.
