

## Audi FIS Alpine Skiing World Cup 2025/26 – Women's Giant Slalom Copper Mountain, CO stat sheet

## Women's Giant Slalom season opener in Sölden

- Julia Scheib's (AUT/Rossignol) win in Sölden was her first World Cup victory in 49 starts. Her 0.58s winning margin was the biggest winning gap for a women's race in Sölden since Lara Gut-Behrami (SUI/Head) won by 1.44s ahead of Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic) in 2016/17, and marked the first time an Austrian skier won the women's race in Sölden since Anna Veith (AUT) tied with Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic) in 2014/15.
- Paula Moltzan's (USA/Rossignol) second-place finish in Sölden was her best-ever GS result, having previously finished third in GS in Kronplatz in 2024/25. Despite six World Cup podiums since 2020/21, Moltzan is yet to win a World Cup race.
- Lara Gut-Behrami (SUI/Head) is injured after a training crash in Copper Mountain, CO last week. Her third place in Sölden means she is now tied with Vreni Schneider (SUI) for the most World Cup podiums by a women's or men's Swiss skier (101).
- Mikaela Shiffrin's (USA/Atomic) fourth-place finish was her best result in Sölden since winning in 2021/22. After Slalom wins in Levi and Gurgl, Shiffrin has 103 career World Cup wins among 159 podiums. Both are the most for women's or men's Alpine skiers Shiffrin is 17 wins clear of Ingemar Stenmark (SWE) on 86, and 21 clear of third-placed Lindsey Vonn (USA/Head) on 82. For podiums, Shiffrin's 159 is four clear of Stenmark (155) and 19 clear of Vonn and Marcel Hirscher (NED/Van Deer) who are both on 138.
- Six US athletes finished in the Top 20 in Sölden: Paula Moltzan (USA/Rossignol) in second, Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic) in fourth, Nina O'Brien (USA/Rossignol) in sixth, Katie Hensien (USA/Rossignol) in 12<sup>th</sup>, AJ Hurt (USA/Head) in 13<sup>th</sup>, and Elisabeth Bocock (USA/Rossignol) in 19<sup>th</sup>. Since then, however, Hensien suffered a minor ankle fracture during practice before Levi while Bocock pulled a groin muscle, with neither taking part in Finland. O'Brien (USA/Rossignol) was the only athlete who finished inside the Top 10 in Sölden who is yet to make a World Cup podium.

## Women's Giant Slalom Copper Mountain, CO stats

- Copper Mountain, CO has hosted the women's Giant Slalom World Cup on three occasions in 1975/76, 1999/00 and 2001/02. Copper Mountain, CO has only hosted a men's World Cup on one occasion, in 1975/76, when Ingemar Stenmark (SWE) won the Slalom race.
- The only USA skier to finish on the podium in the three women's Giant Slalom races held in **Copper Mountain, CO** is **Cindy Nelson (USA)**, who finished second in 1975/76.



- The only nation to achieve more than one women's Giant Slalom podium in Copper Mountain, CO is Switzerland, with two third-place finishes (Sonja Nef in 2001/02 and Bernadette Zurbriggen in 1975/76).
- Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic) is currently on 43 women's Giant Slalom World Cup podiums, which is third on the all-time list. Shiffrin sits one podium ahead of Federica Brignone (ITA/Rossignol) on 42, two behind Anita Wachter (AUT) and three behind leader Vreni Schneider (AUT) on 46.
- Paula Moltzan (USA/Rossignol) is searching for her first World Cup victory, having posted six podium finishes to date. If both Moltzan and Shiffrin make the podium this weekend, the USA could overtake Switzerland for the most women's GS podiums in Copper Mountain, CO, provided a Swiss skier doesn't also make the podium. The last USA athlete other than Shiffrin or Lindsey Vonn (USA) to win a women's GS race was Julie MJ Parisien in 1990/91.
- If Julia Scheib (AUT/Rossignol) wins in Copper Mountain, CO it will mark the first time an Austrian skier will have won two women's Giant Slalom races in a row since Anna Veith (AUT) won three in a row in 2014/15.
- Thea Louise Stjernesund (NOR/Rossignol) has made three women's World Cup Giant Slalom podiums, which is equal-third for Norway alongside Stina Hofgard Nilsen (NOR). One more podium will see Stjernesund move to outright third behind second-placed Ragnhild Mowinckel (NOR) on five.
- If Alice Robinson (NZL/Salomon) wins at least one World Cup race in 2025/26, she will become the most successful women's World Cup race winner from a non-European or North American nation. Robinson started the season on four World Cup race victories, which is tied with her compatriot Claudia Riegler who won four races in the late 1990s.
- Of the four skiers who won a women's Giant Slalom race last season, Alice Robinson (NZL/Salomon) had the lowest ratio of wins-to-podiums, with one win from seven GS podium finishes (14%). Federica Brignone (ITA/Rossignol) had the highest ratio of wins-to-podiums, with five wins from six podium finishes (83%).
- Lara Colturi (ALB/Blizzard) is seeking the first World Cup win of her career, which
  would be a first-ever for Albania. Colturi made three podiums in the entire 2024/25
  season, including third in Giant Slalom in Are, and has already achieved two Slalom
  podium finishes this season in Levi and Gurgl, equalling her career best result and
  marking the first time she made back-to-back World Cup podiums.
- Historically, Giant Slalom in the women's World Cup is dominated by Austria with 94 race victories among 277 podium finishes, the most in both categories by any national federation. Switzerland is second in both with 83 victories among 211 GS podium finishes.
