

FACTS & FIGURES - Women's Downhill World Cup Finals, Sun Valley

- Women's Downhill Crystal Globe 2024/25 season standings: 1. Federica Brignone (384); 2. Conny Hütter (368); 3. Sofia Goggia (350); 4. Lauren Macuga (230); 5. Lara Gut-Behrami (229); 6. Laura Pirovano (209)
- This is the first time Sun Valley has hosted a women's World Cup Downhill.
- Federica Brignone (ITA/Rossignol) leads the women's Crystal Globe Downhill standings with 384 points. If she finishes ahead of Conny Hütter (AUT/Head) and Sofia Goggia (ITA/Atomic) on Saturday, she will win the Downhill Crystal Globe.
- If Brignone is to win the Downhill Crystal Globe, it would be her first time winning it. Her previous best finish in the Downhill was 3rd in 2019/20.
- Brignone has won two Downhill World Cup races so far this season, in St.
 Anton and Garmisch-Partenkirchen. They are the only two Downhill World Cup wins of her career.
- She also came 3rd in Cortina d'Ampezzo, her only other podium of the Downhill World Cup season.
- Brignone came 10th in the Downhill at the World Championships at Saalbach 2025. It was the only event at those Championships she entered in which she did not achieve a podium place.
- Brignone has 10 World Cup wins to her name this season (2 Downhill, 3 Super G, 5 Giant Slalom) making 2024/25 her most successful season. In 2019/20 she won five World Cup races, and in 2023/24 she won six.
- Brignone has won 37 World Cup races in all disciplines in her career, putting her tied 8th with Marlies Schild (AUT) on the all-time World Cup win list. A win in any discipline in Sun Valley would see her go clear on her own as the 8th best of all time.
- Brignone only needs 19 points in any of the disciplines this weekend to guarantee she wins the women's Overall Crystal Globe. It would be her second Overall Globe after winning in 2019/20.
- Conny Hütter (AUT/Head) is 2nd in the women's Downhill standings with 368 points. If she finishes ahead of Goggia and gets 17 points more than Brignone, she will win the Globe.
- Hütter won last year's Downhill Crystal Globe (her first time winning it), ending Goggia's three-year reign.
- Hütter won the first Downhill World Cup of the season in Beaver Creek. She did
 not appear on a Downhill podium again until the most recent races at Kvitfjell,
 where she finished 1st and 3rd.
- Her victory in Kvitfjell ensured she has three World Cup wins across all disciplines in one season, the first time she has achieved that feat.
- Hütter narrowly missed out on a Downhill medal at Saalbach 2025, finishing in 4th place.
- **Sofia Goggia (ITA/Atomic)** is 3rd in the women's Downhill standings with 350 points. If she finishes Saturday's event with 34 points more than Brignone and 19 points more than Hütter, she will win the Downhill Crystal Globe.

- She is a four-time winner of the Downhill Crystal Globe, having won in 2017/18, 2020/21, 2021/22, 2022/23.
- Regardless of the result on Saturday, she will keep up her run of finishing in the top three in every season of the Downhill since coming 17th in 2019/20.
- Goggia won the Downhill at the iconic Cortina d'Ampezzo in January her only Downhill World Cup win of the season.
- She has two World Cup wins to her name this season, having also won the Beaver Creek Super G in December.
- To show how close things have been this season, Goggia has twice so far finished 0.01 second behind Brignone in a race: in the Downhill at Garmisch-Partenkirchen in January and in the La Thuile Super G last weekend.
- Lauren Macuga (USA/Rossignol) is already guaranteed her best ever Downhill finish.
- The 22-year-old is currently fourth in the Downhill standings, having achieved a best finish of 33rd last season.
- Macuga won the St. Anton Super G in January the first World Cup win of her career
- Her best World Cup finish in Downhill is 2nd, which she achieved in Kvitfjell earlier this month.
- Those two results represent the first two World Cup podiums she has achieved in what has been a breakthrough season for the American, including winning bronze in the Super G at Saalbach 2025.
- Lara Gut-Behrami (SUI/Head) won her 46th World Cup race, the Super G at Garmisch in January, equalling Renate Götschl (AUT) in fifth place on the all-time women's list. One more win puts her into 5th place outright. Vreni Schneider (SUI) is in 4th place with 55 wins.
- Gut-Behrami can win her 14th World Cup Downhill race to equal Maria Walliser (SUI) in 7th place on the all-time women's list.
- Garmisch was Gut-Behrami's first World Cup win of the season. She has won at least one race over the last 12 seasons, apart from in 2018/19.
- Gut-Behrami is in 2nd place in the women's Overall and is the only skier who can mathematically stop Federica Brignone from winning the Overall Crystal Globe, but she is 382 points behind the Italian.
- Gut-Behrami has 98 World Cup podiums to her name. If she manages two this
 weekend she will become the fifth woman to reach 100 World Cup podiums
 after Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic), Lindsey Vonn (USA/Head), Annemarie
 Proell (AUT), Renate Goetschl (AUT) and Vreni Schneider (SUI).
- Breezy Johnson (USA/Atomic) has never won a World Cup race but has been on the podium eight times.
- Corinne Suter (SUI/Head) is defending Olympic Winter Games Downhill champion after winning gold at Beijing 2022. Her last World Cup Downhill win came at Garmisch in January 2022.
- Kajsa Vickhoff Lie (NOR/Head) is looking for her first World Cup win of the season. Her best result so far this term was 2nd place in Cortina d'Ampezzo.
