

Audi FIS Alpine Ski World Cup 2025/26 – Women’s Slalom Spindleruv Mlyn stat sheet

Previous Slalom race (Flachau) stats

- **Mikaela Shiffrin’s (USA/Atomic)** Slalom win in **Flachau** saw her become the first women’s or men’s skier to reach 70 World Cup wins in a single discipline. **Shiffrin’s** Slalom victory count alone (70) is enough to earn her fourth place on the all-time women’s and men’s win list for all disciplines combined. **Shiffrin’s** win was her 11th podium in 12 Slalom races in **Flachau**, and her sixth win there. This is twice as many as the next best, **Petra Vlhova (SVK)**, who has three wins in **Flachau**.
- **Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic)** has won six Slalom races this season. **Shiffrin** has won at least six Slalom races in a season on six occasions (2016/17, 2017/18, 2018/19, 2022/23, 2023/24, 2025/26). Only two women and one men’s skier have won at least six Slalom races in a season more than once - **Vreni Schneider (SUI)** did it twice (1988/89 and 1993/94), while **Marlies Schild (AUT)** did it three times (2006/07, 2010/11, 2011/12), as did **Alberto Tomba (ITA)** (1987/88, 1991/92, 1994/95).
- **Paula Moltzan’s (USA/Rossignol)** 2nd in **Flachau** was her first Slalom podium in nine Slalom races dating back to her 3rd in **Sestriere** last season. **Moltzan’s** podium means she is now ranked 10th outright for **USA** women’s Slalom podiums (4), one behind **Lindsey Vonn (USA/Head)**. **Moltzan** has eight individual podiums (4 SL, 3 GS, 1 PAR) in 142 World Cup starts, but is still looking for her first victory.
- **Katharina Truppe’s (AUT/Voelkl)** 3rd in **Flachau** was her first Slalom podium in eight Slalom races dating back to her first World Cup victory in **Are** last season. **Truppe** now has six Slalom podiums, which is equal-16th best for Austrian women alongside **Claudia Strobl (AUT)** and **Ingrid Salvenmoser (AUT)**.

Spindleruv Mlyn stats

- **Spindleruv Mlyn** has hosted six women’s Slalom races - 2005/06, 2007/08, 2010/11, 2018/19 and two in the 2022/23 season.
- The first women’s Slalom race in 2005/06 in **Spindleruv Mlyn** was won by **Anja Paerson (SWE)**, who went on to win Slalom gold at the 2006 Olympic Winter Games two months later. **Marlies Schild (AUT)** won the next two Slalom races there in 2007/08 (as reigning Olympic SL bronze medallist) and 2010/11 (as reigning Olympic Slalom silver medallist). **Schild’s** 0.93s win ahead of **Kathrin Zettel (AUT)** in 2010/11 remains the biggest women’s Slalom winning margin to date in **Spindleruv Mlyn**.
- **Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic)** won the next two Slalom races in **Spindleruv Mlyn**, in 2018/19 and the first race in 2022/23, while **Lena Duerr (GER/Head)** won the second race in 2022/23 by 0.06s ahead of **Shiffrin** to record the smallest winning margin for women’s Slalom in **Spindleruv Mlyn**. **Duerr** is also the oldest women’s Slalom winner in **Spindleruv Mlyn** at age 31 years and 178 days, while **Shiffrin’s** win at age 23 years and 361 days in 2018/19 makes her the youngest.
- **Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic)** and **Marlies Schild (AUT)** are the only skiers to have won the women’s Slalom in **Spindleruv Mlyn** more than once, with two wins each. Both **Shiffrin** and **Schild** share the lead for Slalom podiums there too with three each, followed by two apiece for **Wendy Holdener (SUI/Head)** and **Lena Duerr (GER/Head)**.

- A win for **Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic)** would see her become the first woman to record three Slalom wins in **Spindleruv Mlyn**, while victory for **Lena Duerr (GER/Head)** would see her equal **Shiffrin** and **Marlies Schild (AUT)** on two wins each in **Spindleruv Mlyn**.
- If **Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic)** finishes seventh or higher in **Spindleruv Mlyn**, she will earn enough points to secure the Slalom globe this season. Coming into this weekend, **Shiffrin** has 680 Slalom points - a 268-point lead ahead of **Camille Rast (SUI/Head)** on 412. **Rast** can reach a maximum of 712 points if she wins all three remaining SL races this season, meaning **Shiffrin** needs just 33 points (seventh or better) to reach 713 and guarantee the SL globe in **Spindleruv Mlyn**.
- If **Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic)** wins in **Spindleruv Mlyn**, it will be her seventh Slalom win this season, which she has previously achieved on three occasions – 2017/18, 2018/19 and 2023/24. The only other women's or men's skier to have won at least seven Slalom races in a season more than once is **Vreni Schneider (SUI)**, who did it twice (1988/89 and 1993/94). **Shiffrin** shares the record for most Slalom wins in a season (eight in 2018/19) with **Janica Kostelic (CRO)** (eight in 2000/01).
- Of the 34 women to have won four or more Slalom races in their careers, only two are active skiers - **Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic)** (70) and **Petra Vlhova (SVK/Rossignol)** (22).
- If **Paula Moltzan (USA/Rossignol)** makes the podium, she will equal **Lindsey Vonn (USA/Head)** on five Slalom podiums, which is equal-ninth among **USA** women.
- If **Lena Duerr (GER/Head)** wins, she will surpass her own record of oldest women's Slalom winner in **Spindleruv Mlyn** (31 years and 178 days in 2022/23). Other skiers who could surpass her record this weekend include: **Paula Moltzan (USA/Rossignol)**, **Wendy Holdener (SUI/Head)**, **Anna Swenn Larsson (SUI/Head)** and **Sara Hector (SWE/Head)**, among others. A podium for **Duerr** would also see her move to 18 SL podiums, which would be outright 21st for all-time among women.
- If **Anna Swenn Larsson (SWE/Head)** makes the podium she will become the 29th woman to make 15 Slalom podiums.
- If **Wendy Holdener (SUI/Head)** wins, she will become the oldest skier representing **Switzerland** to win a women's World Cup Slalom race at age 32 (**Vreni Schneider** holds the current record of age 30). If **Holdener** makes the podium, she will become the sixth woman (and third from **Switzerland**) to reach 40 Slalom podiums. A podium will also see **Holdener** break into the top 10 for women's and men's Slalom podiums at equal-10th alongside **Mario Matt (AUT)**.
- **Camille Rast (SUI/Head)** has three Slalom wins while **Wendy Holdener (SUI/Head)** has two. A win for **Holdener** will see her match **Rast**, which is currently fifth-best among Swiss women. A win for **Rast** would see her join **Corinne Schmidhauser (SUI)** on four, which is equal-fourth among Swiss women behind **Vreni Schneider** (34), **Erika Hess** (21) and **Lise-Marie Morerod** (10).
- **Austria** has 89 women's Slalom wins. A win for an Austrian skier would see **Austria** become the second nation after the **USA** to reach 90 women's Slalom wins.
- **Switzerland** is equal-fourth with **Sweden** on 108 women's and men's Slalom wins, behind **Austria** (222), **France** (135) and **USA** (128). The next Swiss or Swedish win will see that nation move into fourth outright.
- **Switzerland** has 298 women's and men's Slalom podiums. This weekend's women's (**Spindleruv Mlyn**) and men's (**Kitzbuehel**) SL races occur on the same day, with women's scheduled to finish first.

Switzerland needs two podiums to become the fourth nation to reach 300 after **Austria** (701), **France** (370) and **Sweden** (321).

- **Germany** is on 29 women's and men's Slalom wins coming into this weekend. A win for **Emma Aicher (GER/Head)** or **Lena Duerr (GER/Head)** will see **Germany** become the 10th nation to achieve 30 SL wins. If Aicher wins, she will become the third German woman (along with **Hilde Gerg** and **Maria Hoefl-Riesch**) to have won World Cup races in Downhill, Super G and SL.
- **Katharina Truppe (AUT/Voelkl)** will make her 100th Slalom start this weekend, while **Anna Swenn Larsson (SWE/Head)** will make her 130th, **Jessica Hilzinger (GER/Head)** will make her 70th and **Estelle Alphand (SWE/Head)** will make her 60th.
- For World Cup starts across all disciplines: **Ana Bucik Jogan (SLO/Salomon)** will make her 210th, **Camille Rast (SUI/Head)** will make her 120th, and **Laurence St-Germain (CAN/Rossignol)** her 90th.
