

FACTS & FIGURES – Women’s Super G, Saalbach 2025 Alpine World Ski Championships

- **Gold medals by nation:** Austria (7), Italy (3), Switzerland (2), USA (2), Sweden (2), France (1), Germany (1), Slovenia (1).
- **Medals by nation:** Austria (15), USA (12), Switzerland (8), Italy (6), Germany (5), France (3), Norway (2), Slovenia (2), Sweden (2), Liechtenstein (1).
- **Women to have won World Championships Super G gold on home snow:** Maria Walliser (SUI) in Crans Montana (SUI) in 1987, Ulrike Maier (AUT) in Saalbach-Hinterglemm (AUT) in 1991, Isolde Kostner (ITA) in Sestriere (ITA) in 1997, Anja Pärson (SWE) in Are (SWE) in 2007.
- **Marta Bassino (ITA/Salomon)** won gold in this event at the last World Championships in Courchevel Meribel in 2023, beating Mikaela Shiffrin by 0.11 seconds.
- She has not won a World Cup Super G race since that 2023 victory.
- If she wins gold she will become the fourth woman to win back-to-back gold medals in the World Championships Super G after Ulrike Maier (AUT - 1989, 1991), Isolde Kostner (ITA - 1996, 1997) and Anja Pärson (SWE - 2005, 2007).
- Bassino is yet to reach a Super G World Cup podium in four attempts this season. Finishes of 6th in Garmisch-Partenkirchen and Beaver Creek represent her best Super G World Cup results this season.
- **Lara Gut-Behrami (SUI/Head)** leads the Super G World Cup standings after winning one race (Garmisch-Partenkirchen) and finishing 2nd on three occasions.
- She is one of two women to have won a medal of each kind at a World Championships Super G (silver in 2013, bronze in 2017 and gold in 2021). Michaela Schiffrin (USA/Atomic) is the other to have achieved the feat (gold in 2019, bronze in 2021, silver in 2023).
- If Gut-Behrami wins a medal of any kind she will become the first ever woman to win four medals in the World Championships Super G.
- **Kajsa Vickhoff Lie (NOR/Head)** was tied for bronze with **Cornelia Hütter (AUT/Head)** in 2023. It was the first time in women's Super G history at the World Championships that two athletes shared a podium place.
- Lie is fourth in the Super G World Cup standings but is yet to win a race in five attempts. Her best Super G result this season was a 2nd-place finish behind Gut-Behrami at Garmisch-Partenkirchen.
- If Lie wins, it will be Norway’s first gold medal at the World Championships in this event.

- **Sofia Goggia (ITA/Atomic)** has never won gold in any World Championship event despite her decorated career.
- Goggia's only World Championships medal in Super G is the silver she won at the 2019 World Championships in Are (SWE).
- Goggia's only World Cup Super G win this season came in Beaver Creek in December, but she is third in the Super G standings for the season.
- **Lindsey Vonn (USA/Head)** won gold in this event in Val d'Isère in 2009 and bronze in Vail/Beaver Creek in 2015.
- Vonn made her highly anticipated return to World Cup Super G racing in December last year, finishing 14th in St. Moritz (SUI). Her best World Cup Super G result this season was a finish of 4th in St. Anton (AUT).
- The oldest woman to win Super G gold at the World Championships was Regine Cavagnoud (FRA) who won in St. Anton in 2001 at the age of 30 years, 7 months and 2 days. Vonn would beat that record by nearly a decade if she wins. She will be 40 years, 3 months and 20 days on the day of the race.
- If **Cornelia Hütter (AUT/Head)** wins gold she will become the first Austrian champion in women's Super G at the World Championships since Nicole Schmidhofer in 2017.
- If she wins gold, **Lauren Macuga (USA/Rossignol)** will be the fifth-youngest woman to win the World Championships Super G at 22 years, 7 months and 2 days. The youngest was Katja Seizinger (GER) who was 20 years 9 months and 4 days when she won gold in Morioka Shizukuishi in 1993.
- Macuga won her first World Cup in St. Anton last month. It was her first Alpine World Cup podium of any kind.
- If **Corinne Suter (SUI/Head)** wins gold this year, she will join Lara Gut-Behrami and Michaela Shiffrin in winning a Super G medal of each color at the World Championships, after winning bronze in 2019 and silver in 2021.
