

## FACTS & FIGURES – Men's Downhill Garmisch-Partenkirchen

- **James Crawford (CAN/Head)** won the last Downhill in Kitzbühel and can become the first Canadian man to win back-to-back World Cup Downhill races since Steve Podborski (CAN) won three in a row in the 1980/81 season.
- Crawford's win in Kitzbühel was his first World Cup victory, and if he backs it up with another triumph, he will become the ninth Canadian man to win multiple World Cup races in all disciplines.
- Crawford has only one finish inside the top 18 in six career World Cup races in Garmisch, when he finished fifth in a Super G there in 2024.
- **Marco Odermatt (SUI/Stöckli)** has won seven World Cup races in all disciplines so far this season and can win at least eight for the third season in a row. He won 13 races in each of the last two seasons, but 'only' seven the season before, in 2022/23.
- Odermatt has won two World Cup Downhill races so far this season and can win three in a single season for the first time. His only two World Cup Downhill wins before this season both came last season.
- Odermatt can win his 45th World Cup race in all disciplines to close to within one of Marc Girardelli (LUX, 46) in fifth place on the men's all-time list.
- A 45th win would also put Odermatt one behind Lara Gut-Behrami (SUI/Head, 46) in second place on Switzerland's all-time win list in men's and women's Alpine skiing. Vreni Schneider holds the Swiss record with 55 World Cup wins.
- Odermatt has only raced one Downhill in Garmisch, finishing eighth in 2021.
- **Alexis Monney (SUI/Stöckli)** can record his second win, and fourth podium, of the season. Before this season, he had never been on a World Cup podium.
- In 26 World Cup Downhill starts, Monney has only two results better than eighth position, but those two are one victory (Bormio) and one second (Kitzbühel).
- Monney has never raced a World Cup Downhill in Garmisch or anywhere in Germany. His only two Garmisch races were the two Super Gs in 2024, in which he finished 34th and registered a DNF.
- **Franjo von Allmen (SUI/Head)** has finished inside the top 10 in his last seven World Cup races. Before that streak began, he had recorded only four top-10 finishes in the first 18 races of his young World Cup career.
- Von Allmen's three World Cup Downhill podiums have all come this season and all been second place. He can become the first man since Peter Fill (ITA) in 2016/17 to finish second in four World Cup Downhill races in the same season.
- **Cameron Alexander (CAN/Rossignol)**, has one World Cup win (the Kvitfjell Downhill in 2022) and, like Crawford, he can become the ninth Canadian man to win multiple World Cup races.
- Alexander has finished third in three of the last six World Cup Downhill races. He can become the first man to finish third in four out of seven Downhill races since Michael Walchhofer (AUT) was third four times in six races between November 2024 and January 2005.

- **Miha Hrobat (SLO/Atomic)** has had two Downhill podiums this season and can become the sixth man representing Slovenia to win a World Cup race, after Bojan Krizaj (8 wins), Rok Petrovic (5), Jure Kosir (3), Zan Kranjec (2) and Andrej Jerman (2).
- Hrobat has four top-10 finishes in his last 10 World Cup races. In his 103 World Cup starts before his last 10 races, he made the top 10 only once.
- **Switzerland** have had a skier come second in the last five World Cup Downhill races (all races so far this season). They can become the first country with six consecutive second-place finishes in men's World Cup Downhill races since Austria did it six races in a row between November 2002 and November 2003. This is already the longest such streak in Switzerland's history.
- Switzerland have nine of the 15 total podiums in the five men's Downhill races so far this season, including four wins, five seconds and no thirds.
- The 15 podiums have been shared by only eight skiers. Odermatt and von Allmen have made three podiums, while Monney, Alexander and Hrobat have made two podiums. Single podiums belong to Crawford, Ryan Cochran-Siegle (USA/Head) and Justin Murisier (SUI/Head).
