

## FACTS & FIGURES - Men's Downhill Wengen

- Swiss racers have won the last four men's World Cup Downhills. Switzerland can win five straight men's World Cup Downhill races for the first time since 1992 (seven straight) and for the first time for any country since Austria did it in 2004/05 (six straight).
- Those last four Swiss victories have been achieved by four different racers: Niels Hintermann (Atomic) in Kvitfjell last season, Justin Murisier (Head) in Beaver Creek this december, Marco Odermatt (Stöckli) in Val Gardena and Alexis Monney (Stöckli) in Bormio. If a fifth Swiss athlete wins on Saturday, it will equal the record of five consecutive different men's World Cup Downhill winners from the same country, which has only been achieved once before, also by Switzerland, in 1988 (Daniel Mahrer, Pirmin Zurbriggen, Franz Heinzer, Peter Mueller and Karl Alpiger).
- Marco Odermatt (SUI/Stöckli) won both Wengen Downhills last year and can become the first man to win three in a row in the World Cup era of this race (since 1967).
- Odermatt can equal the record of three World Cup Downhill wins in Wengen, held by Franz Klammer (AUT) and Beat Feuz (SUI).
- If Odermatt didn't make the podium in Friday's Super G, he can reach his 79th World Cup podium in Saturday's Downhill to tie Bode Miller (USA) in equal 10th on the men's all-time list. If he is in the top three on both Friday and Saturday, he will equal Aksel Lund Svindal (NOR) in equal 9th place with 80 podiums.
- Odermatt has finished inside the top seven in his last 11 World Cup Downhill races dating back to March 2023. In those 11 races, he has eight podiums three wins, three seconds and two thirds.
- In five career Wengen Downhill races, Odermatt has four podiums and his worst result is 4th, in 2022.
- Vincent Kriechmayr (AUT/Head) has won the Wengen Downhill twice (2019 and 2022) and, like Odermatt, he can equal Klammer and Feuz's record of three World Cup Downhill wins on the Lauberhorn.
- Kriechmayr can win his first race of the 2025 calendar year (assuming he doesn't win Friday's Super G). The Austrian has won at least one World Cup race in each of the last eight years, from 2017-2024.
- Franjo Von Allmen (SUI/Head) has been runner-up in the last two World Cup Downhill races and he can become the first man to come second in three straight Downhills since Feuz in 2019.
- Von Allmen finished 14th in both Wengen Downhill races last year.
- Alexis Monney (SUI/Stöckli) can win his second straight Downhill race. Prior to his victory in Bormio last month, he had never finished higher than 8th in his 23 career World Cup Downhill races.
- Cameron Alexander (CAN/Rossignol), who was third in the last Downhill in Bormio, can finish inside the top 10 in a World Cup race held in Switzerland for

the first time (pending the outcome of Friday's Super G). His best result on Swiss snow before this weekend was 19th in the Wengen Downhill in 2020.

• Christof Innerhofer (ITA/Rossignol) is the only skier in the field this year other than Odermatt and Kriechmayr to have previously won the Wengen Downhill. Innerhofer, now 40, won in 2013.
