

- The penultimate event of the Coop FIS Cross-Country World Cup season will take place in **Oslo, Norway**, with the iconic Holmenkollen 50km returning to the calendar after a one-year absence. This historic race will feature a new format this season. For the first time since the women's distance was extended from 30km to 50km in 2023, both the men's and women's 50km free technique races will be held on the same day. In addition, the two races will partially overlap, with the men starting first at 10:00 local time, 45 minutes ahead of the women.
- **Sweden** have won 12 individual Women's World Cup events this season, with six different athletes, including seven of the last nine individual races. **Jonna Sundling (SWE)** now leads the field with five individual wins, while **Jessie Diggins (USA)** has won three individual races.
- **Sweden** have placed at least one athlete on the podium in 20 out of the 23 individual World Cup races held so far.
- **Sweden** placed at least two athletes on the podium in 10 out of the 23 individual World Cup races held so far, including a podium clean sweep in the Sprint Classic in Trondheim, Norway.
- **Jessie Diggins (USA)** is the only athlete who has won two consecutive World Cup races this season, the 20km Pursuit Classic and the Tour-debuting 5km Heat Mass Start Free in Toblach, Italy, during the Tour de Ski.
- **Jonna Sundling (SWE)** won the Sprint Classic in Drammen, Norway, earlier in the week, with **Kristine Stavaas Skistad (NOR)** in second place and **Nadine Faehndrich (SUI)** third. Sundling won her second consecutive World Cup Sprint, and her fifth race this season, finishing just 0.77 seconds ahead of Skistad.
- In the 2023/24 edition of the Holmenkollen 50km, **Frida Karlsson (SWE)** won the race, ahead of **Ebba Andersson (SWE)** and **Katharina Hennig Dotzler (GER)**. This was the last podium to date for Hennig Dotzler, who since then had 11 more top-10 finishes, without a single podium.
- **Jessie Diggins (USA)** is currently leading the Overall standings, 275 points ahead of **Moa Ilar (SWE)**. There are currently three Swedish athletes in the top four positions of the Overall standings, and Diggins is the only non-European athlete in the top 27 positions.
- **Jessie Diggins (USA)**, who will retire from the sport after the final stage in Lake Placid, United States, is the only active athlete with more than 20 individual World Cup victories. The Minnesotan star has 31 individual World Cup wins.

- **Jessie Diggins (USA)** has won three Overall World Cup titles, including two in the past two seasons. She is leading the Overall standings this season. If she wins a third consecutive Crystal Globe this season, and her fourth in total, she would be behind only **Elena Vaelbe Trubitsina (RUS)**, who won five titles between 1988/89 and 1996/97.
- **Jessie Diggins (USA)** won her third Overall Tour de Ski title this season. Only **Justyna Kowalczyk (POL)** and **Therese Johaug (NOR)**, with four Overall Tour de Ski trophies each, have won the competition more often.
- **Sweden** dominated the women's events at the Milano Cortina 2026 Olympic Winter Games, winning five gold medals out of six, including a podium clean sweep in the Sprint Classic. **Frida Karlsson (SWE)** was the most successful athlete, with two individual gold medals plus a silver medal in the relay. **Ebba Andersson (SWE)** won one gold and three silver medals, while **Jonna Sundling (SWE)** won one gold and two silver medals.
- At Milano Cortina 2026, **Ebba Andersson (SWE)** became the first Olympic Women's 50km Mass Start champion. It was Andersson's first Olympic gold medal, adding to her four Games silvers and a bronze. In addition to her second in Oslo in 2024, Andersson came third in Lahti, Finland in 2025, but has never won a 50km World Cup race.
