

## Audi FIS Alpine Ski World Cup 2025/26 – Women’s Super G Val di Fassa stat sheet

### Previous race (Soldeu) – First Super G race

- **Emma Aicher’s (GER/Head)** 0.88s win in the first Super G race in **Soldeu** was the biggest women’s or men’s SG winning margin so far this season, and the seventh-highest women’s SG winning margin this century. **Aicher’s** win made her the first woman to win two Super G races this season - **Sofia Goggia (ITA/Atomic)** joined her in this feat a day later - and the first German to win two SG races in the same season since **Hilde Gerg (GER)** in 2001/02.
- **Alice Robinson’s (NZL/Salomon)** 2<sup>nd</sup> was her third Super G podium this season, which is equal-second best alongside **Emma Aicher (GER/Head)**. **Robinson** is second-highest for top-6 SG finishes this season (4), and is responsible for 47 of **New Zealand’s** 88 top-10 World Cup finishes.
- **Corinne Suter’s (SUI/Head)** 3<sup>rd</sup> made her the 25<sup>th</sup> woman to reach 10 Super G podiums. **Suter** now has 28 World Cup podiums, which is equal-54<sup>th</sup> for women alongside **Sara Hector (SWE/Head)**.

### Previous race (Soldeu) – Second Super G race

- **Sofia Goggia’s (ITA/Atomic)** win in the second Super G race in **Soldeu** made Italy the fourth nation to reach 100 women’s SG podiums after **Austria** (237), **Switzerland** (125) and **Germany** (104). **Goggia** is the second woman to win two SG races this season, after **Emma Aicher (GER/Head)**.
- **Sofia Goggia (ITA/Atomic)** is the only woman to finish in the top 6 in all six Super G races so far this season, and has the most SG podiums (4) from those races. **Soldeu** was **Goggia’s** ninth career SG win, surpassing **Hilde Gerg (GER)** (8) into eighth-highest among women.
- **Emma Aicher’s (GER/Head)** 2<sup>nd</sup> made her the only woman to make both SG podiums in **Soldeu**, and the 11<sup>th</sup> German skier to reach 10 World Cup podiums.
- **Kajsa Vickhoff Lie’s (NOR/Head)** 3<sup>rd</sup> was Norway’s 90<sup>th</sup> women’s World Cup podium, and made **Lie** the fourth Norwegian woman to reach 10 World Cup podiums.

### SG Globe scenarios

- **Val di Fassa** is the first of two Super G races left this season. **Sofia Goggia (ITA/Atomic)** leads the SG standings on 420 pts, followed by **Alice Robinson (NZL/Salomon)** (336 pts) and **Emma Aicher (GER/Head)** (304 pts). The latter are the only two skiers with a mathematical chance of passing **Goggia**. None of these three skiers have ever won a SG Globe.
- If **Goggia** wins in **Val di Fassa**, she will win the Super G Globe. If **Goggia** finishes second, then either **Robinson** or **Aicher** must win to keep the SG Globe race alive. If **Goggia** finishes third, **Robinson** must finish in the top five or **Aicher** in the top two to keep the SG Globe race alive.
- If **Goggia** finishes off the podium, she can still secure the SG Globe in Val di Fassa provided she scores at least 17 points more than **Robinson**, and **Aicher** fails to score 17 points more than her.

## Val di Fassa SG stats

- **Val di Fassa** has previously hosted one women's Super G race in 2020/21. **Federica Brignone (ITA/Rossignol)** won ahead of **Lara Gut-Behrami (SUI/Head)** and **Corinne Suter (SUI/Head)**.
- If **Sofia Goggia (ITA/Atomic)** wins, she will become the eighth woman (and second Italian woman, after **Federica Brignone**) to reach 10 Super G wins.
- If **Alice Robinson (NZL/Salomon)** wins, she will be the 44<sup>th</sup> woman to win more than one World Cup Super G race. **Lauren Macuga (USA/Rossignol)**, **Romane Miradoli (FRA/Dynastar)**, **Elena Curtoni (ITA/Head)**, **Jasmine Flury (SUI/Kaestle)** and **Malorie Blanc (SUI/Atomic)** also have one SG win each
- A podium for **Alice Robinson (NZL/Salomon)** will make **New Zealand** the 18<sup>th</sup> nation to reach 40 World Cup podiums.
- If **Emma Aicher (GER/Head)** wins, she will become the fourth German women's or men's skier to reach four Super G wins. **Aicher** and **Kajsa Vickhoff Lie (NOR/Head)** both have 10 World Cup podiums across all disciplines, which is eighth-highest among German women and equal-third highest among Norwegian women.
- If **Kajsa Vickhoff Lie (NOR/Head)** makes the podium, she will equal **Ragnhild Mowinckel (NOR)** on seven Super G podiums, which is the most among Norwegian women. However, of the 10 Norwegian women and men with more than two SG podiums, **Lie** is the only one yet to win a SG race. A podium for **Lie** will also see her equal **Andrine Flemmen** for second-highest World Cup podiums (11) among Norwegian women, behind leader **Mowinckel** (14).
- If **Romane Miradoli (FRA/Dynastar)** wins, she will become the fourth French woman to win more than one World Cup SG race. A podium will see **Miradoli** move from equal-sixth (5) to equal-fourth (6) for SG podiums among French women and men.
- **Malorie Blanc (SUI/Atomic)** has the fewest top-10 SG finishes this season (2) among the top-10 skiers in the SG globe standings (where **Blanc** is seventh). **Blanc's** SG win in **Crans Montana** at age 22 years and 25 days made her the youngest SG winner this season, beating **Emma Aicher's (GER/Head)** mark of 22 years and 66 days set two weeks earlier in **Tarvisio**. **Blanc's** next win will make her the eighth Swiss woman to win more than one SG race.
- Two skiers in the top 10 Super G globe standings have not made an SG podium this season – **Kira Weidle-Winkelmann (GER/Rossignol)** (9<sup>th</sup>) and **Cornelia Huetter (AUT/Head)** (10<sup>th</sup>).
- Of the 10 women to have made a Super G podium this season, two are not in the top 10 SG globe standings - **Corinne Suter (SUI/Head)** (15<sup>th</sup>) and **Breezy Johnson (USA/Atomic)** (21<sup>st</sup>).
- **Norway** has 139 women's and men's Super G podiums, needing one more to become the fourth nation to reach 140 after **Austria** (519), **Switzerland** (288) and **Italy** (173). **Germany** has 37 women's SG wins, needing one to equal **USA** (38) in equal-third behind **Austria** (64) and **Switzerland** (48).
- For Super G starts: **Corinne Suter (SUI/Head)** will make her 80<sup>th</sup>; **Cornelia Huetter (AUT/Head)** and **Mirjam Puchner (AUT/Atomic)** their 75<sup>th</sup>; and **Kira Weidle-Winkelmann (GER/Rossignol)** her 70<sup>th</sup>.
