

Audi FIS Alpine Ski World Cup 2025/26 - Women's Giant Slalom Semmering stat sheet

Previous GS race stats – Tremblant 2 x GS

- Julia Scheib's (AUT/Rossignol) victory in the second race in Tremblant was her second Giant Slalom win and third GS podium this season. Scheib made just one podium (3rd in 2024/25) in the 45 GS races from her World Cup debut in 2017/18 to the end of 2024/25. In the first four GS races of 2025/26, Scheib already has two wins and a second place.
- Alice Robinson's (NZL/Salomon) first and third placings in the Tremblant races saw her move to 20 Giant Slalom podiums, surpassing Petra Vlhova (SVK/Rossignol) and Carole Merle (FRA) on 19 and becoming the 23rd women's skier to reach 20 GS podiums.
- Alice Robinson (NZL/Salomon) has made the podium in 14 of the past 18 Giant Slalom races dating back to Jasna in January 2024. No other skier has more than eight in that time. At national level, Robinson's results in Tremblant took New Zealand's women's and men's GS podium count to 20 (all by Robinson), surpassing Slovakia (19) and moving to 18th-highest. Next up is Croatia on 22.
- Zrinka Ljutic's second place in the first race in Tremblant was her second Giant Slalom and 10th World
 Cup podium, making her the second Croatian women's skier to reach double figures for World Cup
 podiums, behind Janica Kostelic (CRO) on 55.
- Sara Hector's (SWE/Head) second place in the second race in Tremblant was her 25th World Cup podium, which saw her move from equal-sixth to outright sixth for all-time Swedish men's and women's World Cup podiums, surpassing Fredrik Nyberg (SWE) on 24.
- Valerie Grenier's (CAN/Rossignol) third-place in the first race in Tremblant was her fifth World Cup
 podium, and saw her break into the top 10 for most Canadian women's podiums, where she is ranked
 equal-ninth alongside five non-active Canadian skiers. Grenier finished fourth in the last race held in
 Semmering in 2024/25.
- Clara Direz (FRA/Dynastar) finished fifth in the first race in Tremblant to record her second-highest finish in 79 World Cup Giant Slalom starts, bettered only by a fourth in Tremblant in 2023/24, while Estelle Alphand (SWE/Head) finished seventh to equal her previous best result in 76 GS starts.
- Lena Duerr's (GER/Head) 10th-place finish in the second race in Tremblant was Germany's 352nd top 10 GS finish, which helped Germany surpass the Federal Republic of Germany (351) into eighth-highest on the all-time list.

Semmering stats

- Semmering has hosted 14 World Cup Giant Slalom races, all women's. The first in 1998/99 was won by Anita Wachter (AUT) at age 31 years and 318 days. Wachter remained the oldest GS winner in Semmering until Federica Brignone (ITA/Rossignol) won the most recent race held here in 2024/25, at age 34 years and 168 days.
- Federica Brignone (ITA/Rossignol) won the 2024/25 Giant Slalom race in Semmering by 0.57s ahead
 of Sara Hector (SWE/Head) and Alice Robinson (NZL/Salomon), the sixth-biggest winning margin of



Semmering's 14 GS races. None of the three skiers had made a GS podium in Semmering before.

- Of the 10 skiers to have won a women's Giant Slalom race in Semmering, Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic) (4 wins) and Kathrin Zettel (AUT) (2 wins) are the only two to have won more than one. Zettel was the youngest of all winners, at age 20 years and 145 days in 2006/07.
- Mikaela Shiffrin's (USA/Atomic) four podiums is second-highest in Semmering behind Tessa Worley (FRA) on five, meaning a podium for Shiffrin on Saturday will see her equal Worley.
- Only three non-European skiers have stood on a women's Giant Slalom podium in Semmering:
 Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic) with four wins, Alice Robinson (NZL/Salomon) with third in 2024/25, and Sarah Schleper (USA) with third in 2000/01. Shiffrin is the only non-European winner to date.
- Anna Veith (AUT) is the most recent Austrian to make a Giant Slalom podium in Semmering, having won in 2012/13 in what remains the only GS in Semmering with a winning margin of more than one second (1.10s). Stephanie Brunner (AUT/Head) finished fifth in 2016/17 and fourth in 2018/19, while more recently, Julia Scheib (AUT/Rossignol) finished sixth in 2024/25.
- Austria has five Giant Slalom wins in Semmering, followed by the USA on four and Italy on two.
 Switzerland, France and Slovakia are the only other nations to have won a GS in Semmering.
- Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic) has not made the podium in her last nine World Cup GS races, which is her longest streak without a GS podium since her first 15 GS races from 2010/11 to 2013/14.
 Shiffrin has 22 GS wins, more than any other women's skier, and sixth-highest among women and men. A win would see Shiffrin match Michael Von Gruenigen (SUI) in equal fifth on 23.
- A win for Julia Scheib (AUT/Rossignol) would give her back-to-back World Cup wins for the first time.
- A win for Alice Robinson (NZL/Salomon) would see her join Sara Hector (SWE/Head) and Kathrin Zettel (AUT) on seven GS wins (equal 22nd-highest for women's GS). With each victory this season, Robinson increases her record of wins for a non-European/North American skier.
- A podium for Alice Robinson (NZL/Salomon) would be her fourth Giant Slalom podium in a row and see her join Kathrin Zettel (AUT) on 21 GS podiums (18th highest for women's GS), surpassing Marta Bassino (ITA/Head), Nicole Hosp (AUT), Tanja Poutiainen (FIN) and Erika Hess (SUI) all on 20.
- Sara Hector (SWE/Head) is on seven World Cup Giant Slalom wins. A win for Hector will see her move into the top 20 for women's GS wins. She can join Monika Kaserer (AUT), Nancy Greene (CAN) and Michaela Dorfmeister (AUT) in equal 19th on eight wins each.
- **Italy** has 99 women's and men's Giant Slalom victories. A win for **Italy** would see it become the third nation, after **Austria** and **Switzerland**, to achieve 100 GS wins.
- **Switzerland** has 499 men's and women's GS podiums, meaning a top 3 finish for **Switzerland** would see it become the second nation after **Austria** to achieve 500 GS podiums.
- Norway has 599 men's and women's Giant Slalom top 10 finishes. One more will make Norway the
 sixth nation to reach 600 GS top 10 finishes. Canada has 198 GS top 10 finishes, needing two more to
 become the 11th nation to reach 200.
