

Audi FIS Alpine Ski World Cup 2025/26 – Women’s Slalom Kranjska Gora stat sheet

Previous Slalom race stats – Semmering

- **Mikaela Shiffrin’s (USA/Atomic)** 0.09s win ahead of **Camille Rast (SUI/Head)** and **Lara Colturi (ALB/Blizzard)** was the smallest winning margin of the 18 Slalom races held in **Semmering** to date. Shiffrin’s previous four SL wins this season were all won by 1.23s or more. Shiffrin’s win made her the oldest SL winner in **Semmering** at age 30 years and 290 days.
- **Mikaela Shiffrin’s (USA/Atomic)** victory in **Semmering** was her sixth consecutive Slalom win since her victory in **Sun Valley** last season. It is the fourth time **Shiffrin** has won at least six consecutive SL races. Only one other woman has done so more than once - **Vreni Schneider (SUI)**, who did so twice.
- The record for most consecutive women’s SL wins is eight, achieved first by **Vreni Schneider (SUI)** from 1988/89 to 1989/90 and then by **Janica Kostelic (CRO)** in 2000/01. Shiffrin’s longest SL winning streak is seven, which she achieved twice (2015/16 to 2016/17, and 2017/18 to 2018/19). Kostelic’s personal longest SL winning streak of races that she took part in is 10, from 1999/00 to 2000/01, with a seven-race gap between the second and third win.
- **Mikaela Shiffrin’s (USA/Atomic)** victory in **Semmering** marked the third time **Shiffrin** has won five consecutive SL races within the same season. No other women’s skier has achieved this more than once. The last women’s skier to win six consecutive SL races in the same season was **Janica Kostelic (CRO)** who won eight in a row in 2000/01. **Erika Hess (SUI)** (six in 1980/81) and **Vreni Schneider (SUI)** (seven in 1988/89) are the only other women to have won at least six in a row in the same season.
- **Lara Colturi’s (ALB/Blizzard)** 3rd in **Semmering** was her fourth SL podium this season (only **Shiffrin** has more so far). **Colturi** made one SL podium last season (2nd in **Gurgl**), which was her first ever.
- **Camille Rast’s (SUI/Head)** 2nd in **Semmering** was her third SL podium this season (only **Shiffrin** and **Colturi** have more so far). **Rast** made three SL podiums last season, including 3rd in **Gurgl** which was her first individual podium (her first ever was 2nd in Team Parallel in 2022/23).
- **Katharina Liensberger’s (AUT/Rossignol)** 4th and **Katharina Truppe’s (AUT/Voelkl)** 5th in **Semmering** brought up **Austria’s** 1000th and 1001st women’s SL top 10 finish. **Truppe** has one World Cup win, in SL in **Are** last season, and finished 3rd in SL in **Kranjska Gora** in 2019/20. **Liensberger** has three World Cup wins (all SL) with her most recent in **Are** in 2021/22.
- **Wendy Holdener’s (SUI/Head)** 6th in **Semmering** was her ninth consecutive SL race without a podium. This is **Holdener’s** longest streak without a SL podium since 2014/15 (12 races).
- **Eliane Christen’s (SUI/Head)** 9th in **Semmering** was her best result in 13 career SL starts and her first top 10 finish. **Cornelia Oehlund’s (SWE/Head)** seventh was her second-best result in 32 career SL starts, bettered only by a fifth in **Sestriere** last season.

Kranjska Gora stats

- **Kranjska Gora** has hosted 13 women’s World Cup Slalom races. The first in 1976 was won by **Lise-Marie Morerod (SUI)**, with soon-to-be 1976 Olympic SL champion **Rosi Mittermaier (FRG)** in second.

- With three consecutive Slalom wins (2019/20, 2021/22 and 2023/24), **Petra Vlhova (SVK/Rossignol)** is the only skier to have won more than one women's SL race in **Kranjska Gora**. Of the 10 women who have won just once in **Kranjska Gora**, two are active skiers – **Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic)** in 2017/18, and **Zrinka Ljutic (CRO/Atomic)** in 2024/25.
- Two Slovenian skiers have won a women's Slalom race in **Kranjska Gora**. The first was **Mateja Svet (SLO)** in 1987/88, who remains the youngest women's SL winner in **KG** at age 19 years and 168 days. The second was **Natasa Bokal (SLO)** in 1990/91. Both were competing for **Yugoslavia** at the time.
- Zrinka Ljutic (CRO/Atomic)** won the most recent women's Slalom race in **Kranjska Gora** in 2024/25, finishing 0.16s ahead of **Wendy Holdener (SUI/Head)** with **Anna Swenn Larsson (SWE/Head)** in third place. It was the joint-second smallest women's SL winning margin last season.
- Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic)** owns the biggest women's Slalom winning margin in **Kranjska Gora** with 1.64s ahead of **Frida Hansdotter (SWE)** in 2017/18. The smallest winning margin in **Kranjska Gora** is 0.05s, achieved first by **Petra Kronberger (AUT)** in 1990/91 and later by **Hansdotter** in 2013/14.
- Wendy Holdener (SUI/Head)** has the most women's Slalom podiums in **Kranjska Gora** with four, ahead of **Petra Vlhova (SVK/Rossignol)** on three. Five women have two SL podiums in **Kranjska Gora** but only one is an active skier – **Anna Swenn Larsson (SWE/Head)** who finished 3rd in both 2024/25 and 2021/22. **Swenn Larsson** needs one podium to become the 29th woman to make 15 SL podiums.
- Other active skiers to have made a SL podium in **Kranjska Gora** are **AJ Hurt (USA/Head)** 3rd in 2023/24, **Lena Duerr (GER/Head)** 2nd in 2023/24, and **Katharina Truppe (AUT/Voelkl)** 3rd in 2019/20.
- A win for **Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic)** would equal her personal record for longest SL winning streak (7), and mark her 70th Slalom win. No other women's or men's skier has reached 50 wins in a single event. **Ingemar Stenmark (SWE)** is closest with 46 Giant Slalom wins, followed by **Lindsey Vonn (USA/Head)** with 44 Downhill wins.
- A win for **Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic)** would see her match the third-longest women's Slalom winning streak within the same season (6) set by **Erika Hess (SUI)** in 1980/81. **Vreni Schneider (SUI)** won seven in 1988/89, while **Janica Kostelic (CRO)** has the longest with eight in 2000/01.
- A victory for **Switzerland** would see the nation equal **Sweden** on 108 women's and men's SL wins, which is fourth-highest behind **Austria** (222), **France** (133) and **USA** (127). If **Wendy Holdener (SUI/Head)** wins, she will become the oldest skier representing **Switzerland** to win a women's World Cup SL race at age 32 (**Vreni Schneider** holds the current record of age 30).
- Austria** has 89 women's Slalom wins. A win for an Austrian skier would see **Austria** become the second nation after the **USA** to reach 90 women's SL wins.
- Germany** is on 29 women's and men's SL wins. A win for **Emma Aicher (GER/Head)** or **Lena Duerr (GER/Head)** will see **Germany** become the 10th nation to achieve 30 SL wins.
- If **Aicher** wins, she will become the third German woman (along with **Hilde Gerg** and **Maria Hoefl-Riesch**) to have won World Cup races in DH, SG and SL. **Duerr** is the only athlete besides **Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic)** to have made at least four SL podiums in each of the past four

seasons, but **Duerr** has only one win among her 18 SL podiums, achieved in **Spindleruv Mlyn** in 2022/23 by .06s ahead of **Shiffrin**.

- **Croatia** has 98 women's Slalom top 10 finishes. If **Zrinka Ljutic (CRO/Atomic)** and **Leona Popovic (CRO/Voelkl)** both finish in the top 10, **Croatia** will become the 13th nation to reach 100. **Croatia** has 23 women's SL wins, which is seventh highest, and is the only top 10 nation that is yet to reach 100 women's SL podiums.
