

Ski Cross World Cup 2025/26 - Men's Innichen stat sheet

- Reece Howden's (CAN) victory in Arosa saw him become the male athlete with the most World Cup career wins (19). He was previously level with Jean Frederic Chapuis (FRA) on 18 victories.
- A victory for Reece Howden (CAN) this weekend would make him the first male athlete to win three World Cup races in Innichen.
- Reece Howden's (CAN) victory in Arosa was Canada's 50th victory by a male athlete in World Cup history.
- Victory in both races in Innichen for **Reece Howden (CAN)** would mean he will have won over a quarter of World Cup races he has competed in during his career.
- Reece Howden's (CAN) victory in Arosa means he has now won six of the past 10
 World Cup races, equalling Jean Frederic Chapuis (FRA) and Tomas Kraus' (CZE)
 record of wins in a 10-race block. Victory for Howden in both races in Innichen would
 see him break the record.
- **Simone Deromedis (ITA)** came third in the most recent race in Innichen last season. It was the first time in history an Italian man had been on the podium in a World Cup race in Innichen.
- Johannes Aujesky's (AUT) second place-finish in Arosa was his best career finish in a World Cup race, and just the third time he appeared on a World Cup podium.
- Cornel Renn's (GER) sixth-place finish in Arosa was his best finish in a World Cup race since finishing fourth at both Idre Fjäll and Veysonnaz in 2021.
- With his fourth place in Arosa, Terence Tchiknavorian (FRA) finished higher than his
 cousin Melvin Tchiknavorian (FRA) for the first time in six races, a run stretching
 back to the second race of last season's event in Gudauri.
- No Italian of any gender has won a World Cup race on the slopes of Innichen. No male Italian athlete has won a World Cup race in Italy since Karl Heinz Molling's 2004 victory in Pozza di Fassa.
- No male athlete has won both races of an Innichen World Cup event since Marc Bischofberger's (SUI) double victory in 2018.
