

FACTS & FIGURES – Women’s Super G World Cup Finals, Sun Valley

- **Women’s Super G Crystal Globe 2024/25 season standings:** 1. Federica Brignone (570); 2. Lara Gut-Behrami (565); Sofia Goggia (466); Kajsa Vickhoff Lie (295); Lauren Macuga (279); Elena Curtoni (264).
- **Federica Brignone (ITA/Rossignol)** leads the women's Super G with 570 points. If she finishes ahead of Lara Gut-Behrami (SUI/Head) on Sunday she will win the Super G Crystal Globe.
- Gut-Behrami, who will start the World Finals race five points behind Brignone, is the only skier who can overtake the Italian.
- If Brignone is to win the Super G Crystal Globe, it would be her second time winning it after achieving the feat in 2021/22.
- Aside from her win in 2021/22, the Italian has finished 2nd in the Super G each season since 2019/20.
- Brignone has won three Super G World Cup titles this year; in Cortina d'Ampezzo, Kvitfjell and La Thuile.
- Brignone won silver in the Super G at the Saalbach 2025 World Championships, finishing behind Stephanie Venier (AUT/Head).
- Coming into the World Cup Finals, Brignone has 10 World Cup wins to her name this season (2 Downhill, 3 Super G, 5 Giant Slalom) making 2024/25 her most successful season. In 2019/20 she won five World Cup races, and in 2023/24 she won six.
- Brignone has won 37 World Cup races in all disciplines in her career, putting her tied 8th with Marlies Schild (AUT) on the all-time World Cup win list. A win in any discipline in Sun Valley would see her go clear on her own as the 8th best of all time.
- Brignone only needs 19 points in any of the disciplines this weekend to guarantee she wins the women's Overall Crystal Globe. It would be her second Overall Globe after winning in 2019/20.
- **Lara Gut-Behrami (SUI/Head)** is 2nd in the women's Super G with 565 points. If she scores six more points than Brignone on Sunday she will win the Super G Crystal Globe.
- Gut-Behrami has won the Super G Globe five times before: 2013/14, 2105/16, 2020/21, 2022/23 and 2023/24.
- She won her 46th World Cup race (Super G at Garmisch in January) to equal Renate Götschl (AUT) in 5th place on the all-time women's list. One more win puts her into 5th place outright. Vreni Schneider (SUI) is in 4th place with 55 wins.
- Garmisch was Gut-Behrami’s first World Cup win of the season. She has won at least one race over the last 12 seasons, apart from in 2018/19. She has come second in four races of this Super G World Cup season.
- Gut-Behrami is in 2nd place in the women's Overall and is the only skier who can mathematically stop Federica Brignone from winning the Overall Crystal Globe, but she starts the Finals 382 points behind the Italian.
- Gut-Behrami has 98 World Cup podiums to her name. If she manages two more during Finals she will become the fifth woman to reach 100 World Cup podiums after Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic), Lindsey Vonn (USA/Head), Annemarie Proell (AUT), Renate Goetschl (AUT) and Vreni Schneider (SUI).

- **Sofia Goggia (ITA/Atomic)** is 3rd in the women's Super G with 466 points.
 - Goggia cannot win the Super G Crystal Globe but she can come 2nd if she wins at Sun Valley and Gut-Behrami fails to score any points.
 - Goggia has five Super G podiums to her name this season, including one victory - at Beaver Creek in December.
 - She has two World Cup wins to her name this season, having won the Downhill at the iconic Cortina d'Ampezzo in January, as well as the Beaver Creek Super G.
 - To show how close things have been this season, Goggia has twice so far finished 0.01 second behind Brignone in a race: in the Downhill at Garmisch-Partenkirchen in January and in the La Thuile Super G last weekend.
- **Kajsa Vickhoff Lie (NOR/Head)** has finished in the top seven in five of the eight World Cup Super G races this season.
 - Vickhoff Lie is still searching for her first World Cup Super G win, having reached five podiums. Her only World Cup win came in a Downhill in Kvitfjell in March 2023.
 - The Norwegian won tied for bronze in the Super G at the 2025 World Championships, sharing 3rd with Lauren Macuga (USA/Rossignol).
 - Vickhoff Lie has one Super G World Cup podium to her name this season, coming 2nd behind Lara Gut-Behrami in Garmisch.
- **Lauren Macuga (USA/Rossignol)** is currently 5th in the Super G standings, having finished 13th last season.
 - The 22-year-old won the St. Anton Super G in January - the first World Cup win of her career.
 - In what has been a breakthrough season for the American, Macuga won bronze in the Super G at Saalbach 2025, alongside Vickhoff Lie.
- **Elena Curtoni (ITA/Head)** is yet to get onto a Super G World Cup podium this season, but has finished 4th twice; in St. Moritz and Cortina d'Ampezzo.
- **Corinne Suter (SUI/Head)** won the Super G Crystal Globe in 2019/20, the last time the Globe was won by anyone other than Gut-Behrami or Brignone.
 - Suter has one Super G World Cup podium to her name this season, finishing 3rd at Cortina d'Ampezzo.
- **Stephanie Venier (AUT/Head)** won the Super G world title in Saalbach last month but has won only one World Cup Super G race, in Crans Montana in February 2024.
 - Venier has one World Cup Super G podium this season; 2nd place in St. Anton in January.
- **Conny Hütter (AUT/Head)** won the St. Moritz Super G in December, her only Super G World Cup podium of the season so far.
