

Audi FIS Alpine Ski World Cup 2025/26 - Women's Giant Slalom Tremblant stat sheet

Previous race (Copper Mountain, CO) stats

- Alice Robinson's (NZL/Salomon) victory in Copper Mountain, CO was her fifth World Cup win, the
 most women's World Cup wins for a skier from a non-European or North American nation. At age
 23, Robinson is the youngest winner of the opening 10 women's and men's World Cup races in
 Sölden, Levi, Gurgl and Copper Mountain, CO. Of New Zealand's 34 World Cup podiums, more than
 half (18) now belong to Robinson.
- Julia Scheib's (AUT/Rossignol) second-place finish in Copper Mountain, CO made her the only skier to make the podium in the opening two Giant Slalom races this season. Her result marked the first time that an Austrian skier finished on the podium in two consecutive women's World Cup GS races since Eva-Maria Brem (AUT) made three GS podiums in a row in 2015/16.
- Thea Louise Stjernesund's (NOR/Rossignol) third-place finish in Copper Mountain, CO was her fourth career World Cup Giant Slalom podium, which saw her move into third position for the most women's GS podiums by a Norwegian skier, behind Andrine Flemmen (NOR) on 10 and Ragnhild Mowinckel (NOR) on five.
- Mikaela Shiffrin's (USA/Atomic) 14th-place finish in Copper Mountain, CO was her third-lowest Giant Slalom result in her previous 65 completed GS races dating back to October 2016, higher only than a 25th -place finish in Sestriere in 2024/25 and a 17th-place finish in Courchevel in 2019/20. Last season was the first time since 2012/13 that Shiffrin did not make a GS podium the entire season, and she has now participated in seven GS races since her last GS podium (second in Jasna in 2023/24). This is her second-longest streak without a GS podium (the longest was her first 15 GS races from March 2011 to October 2013).
- Asja Zenere's (ITA/Salomon) ninth-place finish in Copper Mountain, CO was her best World
 Cup result in 35 starts since debuting in 2021/22. Zenere was the only top 10 finisher in
 either of the opening two GS races this season who had not previously recorded a top 10
 World Cup finish.

Tremblant stats

NOTE: Stats below do **not** take into account **Beaver Creek, CO** 02-07 Dec men's results.

- **Tremblant** has previously hosted two World Cup races. Both were women's Giant Slalom contests, held on consecutive days in 2023/24, with both won by **Federica Brignone (ITA/Rossignol)**.
- Double winner Federica Brignone (ITA/Rossignol) and the runners-up from those two races, Petra Vlhova (SVK/Rossignol) and Lara Gut-Behrami (SUI/Head), are all absent this weekend. Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic), who came third in both races, is the only skier active this weekend with a previous World Cup podium in Tremblant.
- If USA skiers win two races this weekend, the USA will become the third nation (after Austria and Switzerland) to record 400 men's and women's individual World Cup wins in all disciplines.



- Valerie Grenier (CAN/Rossignol) is the only Canadian skier since Kathy Kreiner (CAN) in 1974 to win a women's World Cup Giant Slalom race, having won in Kranjska Gora in 2022/23 and 2023/24.
- If Valerie Grenier (CAN/Rossignol) wins either race in Tremblant, she will surpass Thomas Grandi (CAN) to become Canada's second-most successful men's or women's skier for Giant Slalom wins, behind Nancy Greene (CAN, 8).
- If Valerie Grenier (CAN/Rossignol) makes the podium at least once in Tremblant, she will move from fifth position for all-time World Cup GS podiums by a Canadian women's skier (three) to equal-fourth alongside Genevieve Simard (CAN). Two podiums in Tremblant would see Grenier leapfrog Simard into equal-third alongside Allison Forsyth (CAN). Simard, Forsyth and Grenier are the only Canadian skiers to have made a women's World Cup GS podium this century.
- Italy has won 99 men's and women's World Cup Giant Slalom races and would become the third nation (after Austria and Switzerland) to post 100 victories if an Italian skier wins one race in Tremblant.
- Italy and France both have 336 men's and women's World Cup wins in all disciplines entering this week's races, equal fourth among all national ski associations. The next Italian or French victory would see that nation move into outright fourth, behind Austria, Switzerland and the USA.
- Sara Hector (SWE/Head) is tied with Kathrin Zettel (AUT) on 21 women's GS podiums, equal 17th all-time. Hector was the only skier besides Federica Brignone (ITA/Rossignol) to win more than one GS World Cup race last season, and is the only women's skier to manage at least four GS podium finishes in each of the past four seasons.
- Alice Robinson (NZL/Salomon), Katharina Liensberger (AUT/Rossignol) and Lena Duerr (GER/Head) are among five women's skiers who are each on 18 World Cup podiums in all disciplines. The other two are Bernadette Zurbriggen (SUI) and Barbara Ann Cochran (USA).
- If Wendy Holdener (SUI/Head) makes at least one podium in Tremblant, she will surpass Ted Ligety (USA) for all-time World Cup men's and women's podiums. The two are currently equal-47th on 52 podiums across all events. Holdener has not made a GS podium since 2019/20.
- If Zrinka Ljutic (CRO/Atomic) wins at least once in Tremblant to achieve her fourth World Cup win, she will surpass Filip Zubcic (CRO) to become Croatia's third-most successful World Cup men's or women's skier. Ljutic and Zubcic are currently equal on three wins each.
- If Lara Colturi (ALB/Blizzard) wins a race in Tremblant, it will be Albania's first World Cup victory and make Colturi the second-youngest skier to win a women's World Cup GS race this century at age 19. The youngest was Alice Robinson (NZL/Salomon) at age 17 in 2019/20.
- Lena Duerr (GER/Head) recorded a career-best World Cup Giant Slalom finish of 6th last weekend in Copper Mountain, CO. The last German women's podium in a World Cup GS race was achieved by Viktoria Rebensberg (GER) in March 2019 (second in Spindleruv Mlyn). Rebensberg is also the last German winner of a women's World Cup GS race, in Kronplatz in January 2018.
