

Audi FIS Alpine Ski World Cup 2025/26 –

Men's Downhill Wengen stat sheet

- Wengen first hosted a World Cup Downhill on the Lauberhorn in January 1967. A total of 52 Downhill World Cup races have been held there to date.
- If **Marco Odermatt (SUI/Stöckli)** wins in Wengen he will become the most successful Wengen World Cup Downhill skier of all time. Currently he has three wins (two races in 2023/24 and one in 2024/25) which puts him alongside **Franz Klammer (AUT)** and **Beat Feuz (SUI)**.
- **Marco Odermatt (SUI/Stöckli)** won the three most recent Wengen World Cup Downhill races. No other athlete has won more than two consecutive World Cup Downhills in Wengen.
- **Marco Odermatt (SUI/Stöckli)** is leading the 2025/26 World Cup Downhill standings after three events with 280 points. **Franjo von Allmen (SUI/Head)** is second with 230, **Dominik Paris (ITA/Nordica)** is in 3rd place with 140.
- **Marco Odermatt (SUI/Stöckli)**, two time-defending Downhill Crystal Globe winner, has had the best start to a Downhill season in his career, with two wins (Beaver Creek and the first Val Gardena Downhill) and a runners-up spot (second Val Gardena Downhill) so far.
- It's been two seasons since **Marco Odermatt (SUI/Stöckli)** finished outside the top 7 in a World Cup Downhill race – when he came 15th in the 2022/23 World Cup Finals in Soldeu.
- If **Marco Odermatt (SUI/Stöckli)** finishes inside the top 3 in Wengen, he will set a personal record of seven consecutive World Cup Downhill podiums. The streak started with a runners-up spot in Crans Montana in February 2025. **Franz Klammer (AUT)** recorded the all-time longest streak of 10 consecutive Downhill podium finishes during the 1975/76–1976/77 seasons.
- **Marco Odermatt (SUI/Stöckli)** now has 19 consecutive World Cup Downhill top-10 finishes which is the second longest all-time streak. **Beat Feuz (SUI)** holds the longest streak of all, 36, which ended with a DNF in Bormio in December 2021.
- **Franjo von Allmen (SUI/Head)** and **Marco Odermatt's (SUI/Stöckli)** 1-2 in the most recent World Cup Downhill in Val Gardena in December was the 17th time in succession that at least one Swiss skier has featured on a World Cup Downhill podium – the nation's longest ever streak. They still have some way to match the longest all-time streak however; 33 consecutive Downhill podium finishes recorded by Austrian skiers in 2002/03–2005/06.

- **Marco Odermatt (SUI/Stöckli)** and **Franjo von Allmen (SUI/Head)** finished 1-2 in the 2024/25 Wengen Downhill, one of six times the duo have finished 1st and 2nd in the past 10 World Cup Downhill races. Of those six occasions, both skiers have won three times and finished runner-up to each other three times.
- It has been 10 years and 10 races since a Swiss skier failed to feature on a Wengen Downhill World Cup podium. During that streak, Swiss skiers have won five of the 10 races - three for **Marco Odermatt (SUI/Stöckli)** and two for **Beat Feuz (SUI)** - and claimed a further six podium finishes. The race in 2015/16, won by Aksel Lund Svindal (NOR) ahead of Hannes Reichelt (AUT) and Klaus Kroell (AUT), was the last time a Swiss skier was not on the podium.
- Austria is the most successful nation in the Wengen World Cup Downhill, having claimed 18 wins to date. Switzerland has 15 victories, USA is in 3rd with eight.
- **Franjo von Allmen (SUI/Head)** has claimed top-five finishes in his past six consecutive World Cup Downhill races. This streak dates back to his win in Crans Montana in February 2025 and is comfortably the longest of his career.
- **Franjo von Allmen (SUI/Head)** is also chasing an 11th consecutive World Cup Downhill top-10 finish. His current streak, which started in Val Gardena in December 2024, is the longest streak of his career.
- A win in Wengen for **Dominik Paris (ITA/Nordica)** would see the Italian claim 2nd place on his own in the all-time men's Downhill World Cup winners list. Currently Paris – whose most recent win came in Kvitfjell in March 2025 – sits alongside **Peter Müller (SUI)** with 19 World Cup victories. **Franz Klammer (AUT)** is out in front with 25 wins.
- No Italian has won the Downhill in Wengen since **Christof Innerhofer (ITA/Rossignol)** in 2012/13.
- If **Dominik Paris (ITA/Nordica)** claims a podium finish in Wengen he'll join **Franz Heinzer (SUI)** in 6th place in the all-time men's Downhill World Cup top-3 finishes list with 34 podiums. **Beat Feuz (SUI, 47)** tops this list.
- **Vincent Kriechmayr (AUT/Head)** is the only Austrian to have won the Wengen World Cup Downhill in the past 11 years, having triumphed twice, in 2018/19 and 2021/22. In total Kriechmayr has nine World Cup Downhill victories, but he has not won since triumphing in Soldeu in March 2023.
- **Ryan Cochran-Siegle (USA/Head)** needs one more top-3 finish to become the most successful US skier among active athletes in terms of the most top-3 World Cup Downhill finishes. Currently he is level with **Bryce Bennett (USA/Fischer)** both having claimed three podiums each.
- **Justin Murisier (SUI/Head)** has scored points in his past 14 consecutive Downhill World Cup races. This is his career longest and the second longest current streak among all

athletes. Only **Marco Odermatt (SUI/Stöckli)** has more; 21 consecutive points-scoring races. These are career best streaks for both skiers.

- **Christof Innerhofer (ITA/Rossignol)**, the Wengen winner in 2012/13, needs three more Downhill World Cup starts to top the list of Italian athletes with the most Downhill World Cup starts, men or women. He is chasing **Kristian Ghedina** who started 155 World Cup Downhills.
- **Aleksander Aamodt Kilde (NOR/Atomic)** is the second most successful active Downhill skier in Wengen, with four podium finishes. The Norwegian has won twice, in 2021/22 and 2022/23 but won't be at the start this year. Only **Marco Odermatt (SUI/Stöckli)** has more Wengen Downhill podiums among active skiers, with five (three wins and two second places).
- **Miha Hrobat (SLO/Atomic)** became the first Slovenian skier in the 59-year history of the Wengen World Cup Downhill to finish on the podium when he finished 3rd in last season's race. It is one of just two World Cup Downhill podiums for Hrobat so far, the other coming in Beaver Creek last season.
- **Alessio Miggianno (SUI/Head)** recorded his first career top-5 result in Val Gardena. He finished 5th in just his sixth Downhill World Cup start.
- Wengen will be the 100th Downhill World Cup race for **Maxence Muzaton (FRA/Rossignol)**. Muzaton has claimed nine top-10 results to date.
