

Audi FIS Alpine Ski World Cup 2025/26 – Women's Giant Slalom Spindleruv Mlyn stat sheet

Previous GS race (Kronplatz) stats

- **Julia Scheib (AUT/Rossignol)** secured **Austria's** 400th women's World Cup win with her victory in the Giant Slalom in **Kronplatz** four days ago. **Scheib** won by 0.37s ahead of **Camille Rast (SUI/Head)**, with **Sara Hector (SWE/Head)** in 3rd, to secure her fourth consecutive GS podium. The last Austrian woman to make four consecutive GS podiums was **Anna Veith (AUT)** in 2014/15. In seven previous GS races in **Kronplatz**, **Scheib** had not finished higher than 9th (2023/24).
- **Julia Scheib's (AUT/Rossignol)** win in **Kronplatz** was her sixth podium in the seven GS races held so far this season – the next best this season is **Alice Robinson (NZL/Salomon)** on three GS podiums so far in 2025/26. The last Austrian woman before **Scheib** to make at least six GS podiums in a single season was **Michaela Dorfmeister (AUT)** who made seven in 1999/00. **Tina Maze (SLO)** holds the record for most women's GS podiums in a single season with nine in 2012/13.
- **Julia Scheib's (AUT/Rossignol)** win in **Kronplatz** was her seventh podium in 51 GS starts since her World Cup debut, also in **Kronplatz**, in 2017/18. **Scheib** required 2469 days from her debut to make her first individual podium, a 3rd in GS in **Soelden** in 2024/25, then needed just 88 days from the start of this season to add another six GS podiums.
- **Camille Rast's (SUI/Head)** 2nd in **Kronplatz** was her third consecutive Giant Slalom podium, equalling her best run of consecutive podiums in a single discipline (achieved this season in Slalom). **Lara Gut-Behrami (SUI/Head)** was the last Swiss woman before **Rast** to make three consecutive GS podiums, in 2023/24. **Rast** took 2955 days to make her first individual podium (3rd in Slalom in **Gurgl** in 2024/25), then needed 423 days to add her next 10 podiums (4 GS, 6 SL).
- **Sara Hector's (SWE/Head)** 3rd in **Kronplatz** was her third podium in her past four Giant Slalom races, and saw her equal **Sonja Nef (SUI)** and **Lise-Marie Morerod (SUI)** on 24 GS podiums, which is equal-14th all-time for women. It was also **Sweden's** 73rd women's GS podium, which saw **Sweden** surpass **Federal Republic of Germany** (72) into outright 7th place for women's GS podiums.
- **Mikaela Shiffrin's (USA/Atomic)** 4th in **Kronplatz** marked her 12th Giant Slalom race without a podium, which is her second-longest streak without a podium within a single discipline. Her longest was her first 15 GS races from 2010/11 to 2013/14.
- **Maryna Gasienica-Daniel's (POL/Atomic)** 5th in **Kronplatz** matched her best-ever World Cup result, achieved in Giant Slalom in **Semmering** this season.
- **Federica Brignone's (ITA/Rossignol)** 6th in **Kronplatz** marked her return from injury, and was her first World Cup race in 301 days since a 2nd in Giant Slalom in **Sun Valley** in 2024/25.

Spindleruv Mlyn stats

- **Spindleruv Mlyn** has hosted four women's Giant Slalom races - 2005/06, 2007/08, 2010/11 and most recently in 2018/19. The venue also hosted a Slalom race the day after GS in each of those four seasons, followed by two SL races only in 2022/23.

- The first women's Giant Slalom race in **Spindleruv Mlyn** in 2005/06 was won by **Janica Kostelic (CRO)**, who would go on to win Super G silver and Combined gold at the 2006 Olympic Winter Games just over two months later. **Kostelic** won by 0.08s, which remains the smallest winning margin for women's GS in **Spindleruv Mlyn**. **Denise Karbon (ITA)** won the next in 2007/08 and remains the oldest women's GS winner in **Spindleruv Mlyn** at age 27 years and 142 days.
- The third women's GS in 2010/11 was won by 1.26s by 2010 women's Olympic GS champion, **Viktoria Rebensburg (GER)**, at age 21 years and 158 days. This remains both the biggest winning margin and youngest winner for women's GS in **Spindleruv Mlyn**. The fourth women's GS in **Spindleruv Mlyn** was won by **Petra Vlhova (SVK)** in 2018/19, less than a month after she won GS gold at the 2019 World Championships.
- Of the 10 women to have made a Giant Slalom podium in **Spindleruv Mlyn**, **Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic)**, **Petra Vlhova (SVK/Rossignol)** and **Lindsey Vonn (USA/Head)** are the only *active* skiers. **Vonn** finished 3rd in 2010/11, **Shiffrin** finished 3rd in 2018/19 and **Vlhova** won in 2018/19. Only two women – **Viktoria Rebensburg (GER)** and **Denise Karbon (ITA)** – have reached the podium more than once (twice each) in **Spindleruv Mlyn**. **Shiffrin** is the only one of the three who will ski this weekend.
- **Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic)** and **Petra Vlhova (SVK/Rossignol)** are the only active skiers among the four women to have made a Giant Slalom *and* Slalom podium across consecutive days in **Spindleruv Mlyn**, having won the SL in 2018/19 a day after finishing 3rd in GS. The other two are **Janica Kostelic (CRO)** and **Marlies Schild (AUT)**. No woman has yet won a GS and SL race in **Spindleruv Mlyn**.
- A win for **Julia Scheib (AUT/Rossignol)** would see her become the 40th woman (and ninth Austrian woman) to reach five Giant Slalom wins. If **Scheib** makes the podium, she will move from equal-12th on the all-time list of Austrian women's GS podiums (7) - alongside **Gertrude Gabl (AUT)** – to outright 12th.
- If **Camille Rast (SUI/Head)** makes the podium it will be her fourth Giant Slalom podium in consecutive GS races, which will be her longest streak of podiums in consecutive races within a single discipline. Her current best is three, achieved in Slalom this season. A win for **Rast** would see her become the 63rd skier to win more than one women's GS race.
- If **Sara Hector (SWE/Head)** makes the podium, she will move from equal-14th on the all-time list for women's Giant Slalom podiums (24) – alongside **Sonja Nef (SUI)** and **Lise-Marie Morerod (SUI)** - to outright 14th on 25. A win for **Hector** would be her eighth GS win and see her move to equal-19th alongside **Michaela Dorfmeister (AUT)**. **Hector** would become just the fourth active skier in the current top 20 for women's GS wins, alongside **Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic)** on 22 in first, **Federica Brignone (ITA/Rossignol)** on 17 in third, and **Lara Gut-Behrami (SUI/Head)** on 10, in equal-15th.
- If **Alice Robinson (NZL/Salomon)** makes the podium, she will move from equal-19th on the all-time list for women's Giant Slalom podiums (20) – alongside **Marta Bassino (ITA/Head)**, **Nicole Hosp (AUT)**, **Tanja Poutiainen (FIN)** and **Erika Hess (SUI)** - to equal-18th alongside **Kathrin Zettel (AUT)**.
- A win for **Alice Robinson (NZL/Salomon)** would see her move from six GS wins, which is equal-24th for women alongside 11 other skiers, of which only one other is active - **Marta Bassino** – to equal-22nd alongside **Sara Hector (SWE/Head)** and **Kathrin Zettel (AUT)**.

- **Italy** is on 99 women's and men's Giant Slalom wins. The next win will see **Italy** become the third nation after **Austria** (211) and **Switzerland** (190) to reach 100 GS wins.
- **Sara Hector (SWE/Head)** and **Ana Bucik Jogan (SLO/Salomon)** are the only two skiers to have taken part in all 60 women's Giant Slalom races since the 2019/20 season. They are followed by three skiers on 57 GS starts in that time - **Mina Fuerst Holtmann (NOR/Atomic)**, **Alice Robinson (NZL/Salomon)** and **Thea Louise Stjernesund (NOR/Rossignol)**.
- **Camille Rast (SUI/Head)** will make her 60th Giant Slalom and 120th start across all disciplines in **Spindleruv Mlyn**, while **Sara Hector (SWE/Head)** will make her 120th GS start and **Lena Duerr (GER/Head)** her 75th GS start. **Sofia Goggia (ITA/Atomic)** will make her 220th start across all disciplines, and **Ricarda Haaser (AUT/Salomon)** her 190th across all disciplines.
