

2026 FIS Alpine Junior World Ski Championships - Narvik stat sheet

- The **2026 FIS Alpine Junior World Ski Championships** in **Narvik** is the 45th edition of a competition that began in 1982. **Narvik** will be the 38th edition in Europe, with the other seven held in **Canada** (4) and the **USA** (3). 13 European nations have hosted the tournament – **Italy** (8) and **France** (6) are the hosts with the most, with **Norway** hosting its sixth edition this year, and for the second time in **Narvik** after 2020.
- For individual medals the top 8 nations are: **Austria** (93 gold, 287 medals), **Switzerland** (61 gold, 166 medals), **Italy** (46 gold, 126 medals), **Norway** (29 gold, 93 medals), **USA** (29 gold, 73 medals), **France** (26 gold, 80 medals), **Sweden** (23 gold, 59 medals) and **Germany** (19 gold, 58 medals).

Men's individual

- For men's individual medals the top 8 nations are: **Austria** (39 gold, 131 medals), **Switzerland** (33 gold, 85 medals), **Italy** (24 gold, 71 medals), **USA** (20 gold, 38 medals), **France** (18 gold, 44 medals), **Norway** (17 gold, 59 medals), **Slovenia** (9 gold, 26 medals) and **Sweden** (8 gold, 30 medals).
The only non-European/North American nations to win men's individual medals are **Japan** (1 gold, 2 silver, 2 bronze) and **Chile** (1 bronze).
- **Switzerland** leads the Downhill standings (10 gold, 22 medals) ahead of **Italy** (9 gold, 22 medals) and **USA** (6 gold, 11 medals). **Austria** leads in Super G (10 gold, 30 medals) ahead of **Switzerland** (5 gold, 20 medals) and **France** (5 gold, 10 medals).
- **Austria** leads the Giant Slalom standings (14 gold, 33 medals) ahead of **Norway** (6 gold, 19 medals), **France** (5 gold, 14 medals) and **Switzerland** (5 gold, 10 medals). **Austria** leads in Slalom (7 gold, 25 medals) ahead of **Switzerland** (6 gold, 22 medals), **Italy** (6 gold, 13 medals) and **Norway** (6 gold, 15 medals).
- **Henrik Kristoffersen (NOR/Van Deer)** has the most men's individual gold medals (6), followed by **Marco Odermatt (SUI/Stoeckli)** (5), then **Benjamin Raich (AUT)** (4). **Kristoffersen** also has the most individual podiums (8) followed by three men who each have six podiums – **Josef Strobl (SLO)**, **Marcel Hirscher (NED/Van Deer, formerly AUT)** and **Odermatt**.
- **Rok Petrovic (YUG)** is the youngest men's individual gold medallist, winning Slalom in 1983 at age 16, while three 17-year-olds have won gold this century - **Henrik Kristoffersen (NOR/Van Deer)** (Giant Slalom in 2012), **Reto Schmidiger (SUI)** (SL in 2010) and **Alexis Pinturault (FRA)** (GS in 2009).
- **Henrik Kristoffersen (NOR/Van Deer)** is the only men's skier to win three gold medals in the same individual event (Giant Slalom in 2012, 2014, 2015). Three men have won two Slalom gold - **Kristoffersen** (2014, 2015), **Reto Schmidiger (SUI)** (2010, 2011) and **Benjamin Raich (AUT)** (1996, 1998).
- **Thomas Graggaber (AUT)** is the only man to win two Downhill golds (2000, 2001). No man has won more than one Super G gold.
- **Loic Meillard (SUI/Rossignol)** is the only man to win two Alpine combined gold (2015, 2017).
- The only men to win more than one gold in multiple individual events are **Kristoffersen** (3 GS, 2 SL) and **Raich** (2 GS, 2 SL).
- Two men have won more than two individual gold medals at a single edition: **Daniel Albrecht (SUI)** won three in 2003, and **Marco Odermatt (SUI/Stoeckli)** won four in 2018. The last men to win more than one

individual gold medal at a single edition won two each in 2022 - **Giovanni Franzoni (ITA)** and **Alexander Steen Olsen (NOR)**.

- Seven men have won the most individual medals (4) at a single edition: **Guido Hinterseer (AUT)** in 1982, **Kjetil Andre Aamodt (NOR)** and **Lasse Kjus (NOR)** in 1990, **Tobias Hellman (SWE)** in 1992, **Josef Strobl (SLO)** in 1993, **Aksel Lund Svindal (NOR)** in 2002, **Daniel Albrecht (SUI)** in 2003 and **Marco Odermatt (SUI/Stoeckli)** in 2018. **Franjo Von Allmen (SUI/Head)** is the most recent man to win three (2022).

Women's individual

- For women's individual medals the top 8 nations are: **Austria** (54 gold, 156 medals), **Switzerland** (28 gold, 81 medals), **Italy** (22 gold, 55 medals), **Sweden** (15 gold, 29 medals), **Germany** (14 gold, 41 medals), **Norway** (12 gold, 34 medals), **USA** (9 gold, 35 medals) and **France** (8 gold, 36 medals). **New Zealand** is the only non-European/North American nation to win a women's individual medal (1 gold, 1 bronze).
- **Austria** leads the Downhill medals (11 gold, 36 medals) ahead of **Switzerland** (10 gold, 24 medals) and **France** (5 gold, 13 gold). **Austria** also leads Super G (16 gold, 44 medals) ahead of **Italy** (5 gold, 14 medals) and **Germany** (5 gold, 8 medals).
- In Giant Slalom, **Austria** (9 gold, 26 medals) and **Italy** (9 gold, 17 medals) are followed by **Sweden** (7 gold, 9 medals). In Slalom, **Austria** (10 gold, 29 medals) leads **Sweden** (7 gold, 16 medals) and **Switzerland** (5 gold, 17 medals).
- Two women have won six individual gold medals – **Sabine Ginther (AUT)** and **Magdalena Egger (AUT/Head)**.
- **Julia Mancuso (USA)** has five golds, followed by **Anja Paerson (SWE)** and **Maria Hoefl-Riesch (GER)** on four each.
- For individual podiums, **Ginther, Egger** and **Hoefl-Riesch** share top honours (8) followed by **Mancuso** (7), then four skiers have six - **Paerson, Anna Veith (AUT), Melanie Turgeon (CAN)** and **Stefanie Grob (SUI)**.
- **Mateja Svet (YUG)** is the youngest women's individual winner at age 15 (Giant Slalom in 1984), while four 16-year-olds have won gold this century – **Tina Weirather (LIE)** (GS in 2006), **Anna Veith (AUT)** (Super G in 2006), **Ilka Stuhec (SLO/Kaestle)** (Slalom in 2007) and **Lara Colturi (ALB/Blizzard)** (SG in 2023).
- 18 women have won two gold medals in the same individual event, but only three have won two gold medals in two individual events each: **Anja Paerson (SWE)** (Slalom, Giant Slalom), **Magdalena Egger (AUT/Head)** (Downhill, Super G) and **Sabine Ginther (AUT)** Super G, Combined).
- Three women have won three individual gold medals at a single edition: **Sabine Ginther (AUT)** in 1988 (SG, GS, K); **Julia Mancuso (USA)** in 2002 (GS, DH, K) and **Magdalena Egger (AUT/Head)** who did so twice - in 2020 (DH, SG, AC) and 2022 (DH, SG, GS). The last woman to win two individual gold medals at a single edition was **Hanna Aronsson Elfman (SWE)** in 2023 (GS, SL).
- Only one woman has won five individual medals at a single edition – **Melanie Turgeon (CAN)** in 1994 (SL, GS, DH, SG, K). Two women have won four individual medals at a single edition – **Sabine Ginther (AUT)** in 1988 (GS, DH, SG, K) and **Magdalena Egger (AUT/Head)** in 2022 (GS, DH, SG, AC).

2025 Tarvisio Jnr. WChs stats

- **France** topped the medal tally for all events at the 2025 edition (3 gold, 1 bronze) ahead of **Switzerland** (2 gold, 5 silver) and **Germany** (2 gold). **Sweden, Austria, Norway** and **Italy** all won a single gold medal each. **France's** tally included gold in mixed team parallel and men's Team Alpine Combined.

- Three skiers won two individual medals each in **Tarvisio**: **Stefanie Gross (SUI/Rossignol)** (women's DH gold, GS silver), **Jasmin Mathis (SUI/Head)** (women's SG gold, DH silver) and **Matthias Fernsebner (AUT/Head)** (men's DH bronze, SG bronze).
- 18-year-old gold medallists **Benno Brandis (GER/Atomic)** (men's Super G) and **Giorgia Collomb (ITA/Rossignol)** (women's Giant Slalom) were the youngest individual medallists in **Tarvisio**.
- **Luca Carrick-Smith's (GBR/Dynastar)** bronze in men's Slalom was **Great Britain's** second individual medal at the tournament, and first since **Graham Bell** won Downhill silver in 1984.

Narvik 2026 - entry list highlights

- Women's 2025 Jnr World Championship Giant Slalom champion **Giorgia Collomb (ITA/Rossignol)** and men's GS champion **Flavio Vitale (FRA/Head)** will both compete in Narvik.
- Milano Cortina 2026 Olympic Winter Games competitors **Cornelia Oehlund (SWE/Head** - DNF2 in Slalom after finishing run one as the 3rd quickest skier) **Sue Piller (SUI/Atomic** - 24th in GS) and **Anna Trocker (ITA/Salomon** - 10th Team Combined & DNF1 Slalom) are all competing.
- Narvik 2026 competitor **Giorgia Collomb (ITA/Rossignol)**, **Cornelia Oehlund (SWE/Head)**, **Sue Piller (SUI/Atomic)**, **Elisabeth Bock (USA/Rossignol)** and **Dania Allenbach (SUI/Salomon)** have all scored FIS World Cup points this season.
- Men's skier **Flavio Vitale (FRA/Head)** has also scored World Cup points this season.
- Great Britain's three Carrick-Smith brothers will all compete. **Luca Carrick-Smith (GBR/Dynastar** - aged 20) and **Freddy Carrick-Smith (GBR/Dynastar** - aged 19) who have both competed on the World Cup tour this season. Plus **Zak Carrick-Smith (GBR/Dynastar** - aged 19, double 2024 Youth Olympic Games champion).
