

Audi FIS Alpine Ski World Cup 2025/26 – Women's Slalom Gurgl stat sheet

- **Gurgl** made its debut on the World Cup calendar in 2023/24, hosting a Men's Slalom only. The first Women's Slalom was held last season.
- **Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic)** won the 2024/25 Slalom World Cup in Gurgl, with **Lara Colturi (ALB/Blizzard)** finishing second and **Camille Rast (SUI/Head)** third.
- The top five athletes in last year's Gurgl Slalom were separated by just 0.80 seconds.
- Three Swiss athletes featured in the top 10 of last year's Gurgl Slalom: **Camille Rast (SUI/Head)**, who finished third, **Wendy Holdener (SUI/Head)**, who finished fourth, and **Melanie Meillard (SUI/Rossignol)**, who finished 10th.
- **Katharina Liensberger (AUT/Rossignol)** was the best Austrian athlete in last year's Gurgl Slalom, finishing in seventh. Other home athletes in the Top 30 were **Katharina Huber (AUT/Voelkl)**, 12th, and **Katharina Gallhuber (AUT/Atomic)**, 16th.
- After her win in Levi last week, **Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic)** increased her record tally to 65 Slalom World Cup races. If she wins five more this season, she will have twice as many Slalom World Cup wins as her nearest competitor, Marlies Schild (AUT) who has 35 Slalom World Cup wins.
- With a current total of 102 victories, **Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic)** is the most successful World Cup skier of all-time. She is 16 clear of Ingemar Stenmark (SWE) and 20 clear of compatriot **Lindsey Vonn (USA/Head)** on the all-time list.
- **Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic)** leads the standings in terms of number of World Cup race wins in a single season. Shiffrin won 17 races in the 2018/19 season, when she won 10/12 Slalom races (including Parallel Slalom and City Events). No other athlete, in either gender, has ever won more than 14 World Cup races in a single season, with Shiffrin also winning 14 World Cup races in 2022/23 and **Vreni Schneider (SUI)** winning 14 World Cup races in 1988/89.
- **Lara Colturi (ALB/Blizzard)** is seeking the first World Cup win of her career. A World Cup victory would not only mark her first career win, but also the first-ever for Albania. She was on the podium for the first time last season, in the Gurgl Slalom, when she was also the youngest participating athlete in the race. Colturi was also on the podium last week in Levi, equalling her career best result of second place. She is now seeking to be on the podium for consecutive World Cup races for the first time in her career.
- One of reigning Slalom World Cup champion **Zrinka Ljutić's (CRO/Atomic)** three World Cup victories so far has come on Austrian snow. The Croatian won in both Semmering and Flachau last season, having finished ninth in Gurgl.

- **Zrinka Ljusic (CRO/Atomic)** won three of her next five World Cup Slalom races last season, after finishing ninth in Gurgl. This helped her become, at 21, the youngest women's small Globe winner since **Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic)** won the Slalom Globe in 2015 at the age of 20. Ljusic was sixth last week in the Levi season-opener.
- **Katharina Liensberger (AUT/Rossignol)** is searching for her first World Cup win since triumphing in Are in March 2022, and her first ever World Cup win on home snow. She has finished on the podium six times in Austria, coming second three times (in Lienz in December 2021, in Flachau in January 2021 and in Semmering in December 2020). Liensberger finished 10th in Levi last week.
- **Emma Aicher (GER/Head)** was on the podium in a World Cup Slalom race for the first time in her career last week in Levi. This was her fourth podium in three different disciplines, having won and claimed a podium in Downhill and having won in Super G last season.
- **Marion Chevrier (FRA/Atomic)** claimed first ever career top-10 World Cup finish last week in Levi, the 24-year-old placing ninth.
- **Camille Rast (SUI/Head)** who finished 15th in Levi last week, won the Women's Slalom gold at the 2025 World Championships, her first World Championships medal. She was the first Swiss woman to win World Championships Slalom gold since **Vreni Schneider (SUI)** in 1991. Compatriot **Wendy Holdener (SUI/Head)** won the silver medal, to complete a first ever World Championships 1-2 for Switzerland in Women's Slalom. Rast won her first Slalom World Cup race last season in Killington, before triumphing again in Flachau. She went on to finish third in the Slalom standings, comfortably her best ever season finish.
- **Lena Dürr (GER/Head)** is seeking just her second World Cup victory in Slalom. She has been on the podium in 16 Slalom races between 2021/22 and 2024/25 seasons, but her only victory came in the Spindleruv Mlyn Slalom in January 2023. She finished fourth in Levi last week, just 0.15 seconds off the podium.
- **Wendy Holdener (SUI/Head)** is seeking her third Slalom World Cup win. She has been on the World Cup podium 54 times so far, with only seven wins: two in Slalom (both in the 2022/23 season), two in Alpine Combined, one in a City Event and two in Team Parallel. In addition, she has won five Olympic medals and nine World Championships medals. She finished eighth in Levi last week.
- **Sara Hector (SWE/Head)** who finished 11th in Levi, is seeking a fourth consecutive season inside the top-10 of the Slalom World Cup rankings. The Swede is a Giant Slalom specialist and the current Olympic GS champion, but she has been on a Slalom World Cup podium three times during the past two seasons.
