

- The Coop FIS Cross-Country World Cup is coming back to **Goms, Switzerland**, for the first time in two years. It will be the last World Cup stage before the Milano Cortina 2026 Olympic Winter Games. When Goms hosted a stage in January 2024, it was the first time following a 24-year hiatus.
- **Sweden** have won seven individual Women's World Cup events this season, with five different athletes. **Jonna Sundling (SWE)** and **Jessie Diggins (USA)** have won three individual races each.
- **Sweden** have placed at least one athlete on the podium in 14 out of the 16 individual World Cup races held so far, but did not have any representation on the Overall Tour de Ski standings, where the best Swede was **Ebba Andersson (SWE)** in fourth place. The two races where no Swedish skier made it onto the podium were both part of the Tour.
- **Sweden** placed at least two athletes on the podium in seven out of the 16 individual World Cup races held so far. They also had a podium clean sweep in the Sprint Classic in Trondheim, Norway.
- No athlete has finished on the podium in more than two consecutive individual World Cup races this season. **Jessie Diggins (USA)** is the only athlete who has won two consecutive World Cup races, as she won the 20km Pursuit Classic and the Tour-debuting 5km Heat Mass Start Free in Toblach, Italy, during Tour de Ski.
- **Jonna Sundling (SWE)** won the Sprint Free in Oberhof, Germany, last weekend, with **Coletta Rydzek (GER)** in second place and **Maja Dahlqvist (SWE)** third. This was the third individual World Cup win of the season for Sundling, who also won the Team Sprint event in Davos, Switzerland, making her the only athlete with four World Cup wins this season.
- **Moa Ilar (SWE)** won the 10km Interval Start Classic in Oberhof, Germany, last weekend, with **Teresa Stadlober (AUT)** in second place and **Jonna Sundling (SWE)** third. This was the sixth World Cup win for Ilar, but it was only her third individual win and her first in a Classic style race. The victory was Ilar's first World Cup podium this season. **Karoline Groetting (NOR)** finished the race in an impressive fifth place in her second World Cup race.
- In the last edition of the World Cup held in Goms, in the 2023/24 season, **Jessie Diggins (USA)** won the 20km Mass Start Free as **Linn Svahn (SWE)** claimed the Sprint Free victory in a clean sweep for Sweden with **Maja Dahlqvist (SWE)** in second place and **Jonna Sundling (SWE)** third. Sweden

also placed teams in first and second place in the Mixed 4x5km Relay Classic/Free, Norway completing the podium.

- **Jessie Diggins (USA)** is the only active athlete with more than 20 individual World Cup victories. The Minnesota star, who will retire after this season, has 31 World Cup wins to her name.
- **Jessie Diggins (USA)** has won three Overall World Cup titles, including two in the past two seasons. If she wins a third consecutive Overall Crystal Globe this season, she would claim her fourth in total, placing her just behind **Elena Vaelbe Trubitsina (RUS)**, who won five titles between 1988/89 and 1996/97.
- **Jessie Diggins (USA)** has also won the last two Distance titles. If she wins a fourth Distance title this season, it would tie her with **Justyna Kowalczyk (POL)**, just behind the all-time leader **Therese Johaug (NOR)**, who has won it five times.
- **Jessie Diggins (USA)** won her third Overall Tour de Ski title this season. Only **Justyna Kowalczyk (POL)** and **Therese Johaug (NOR)**, with four Overall Tour de Ski trophies each, have won the competition more often.
- **Sweden** dominated the Women's side of last season's FIS Nordic World Ski Championships in Trondheim, Norway, winning all six events, with **Jonna Sundling (SWE)** and **Ebba Andersson (SWE)** claiming three gold medals each. Neither Sundling nor Andersson will compete in Goms.
