

Audi FIS Alpine Ski World Cup 2025/26 – Women’s Slalom Hafjell stat sheet

Previous SL race (Are) stats

- **Mikaela Shiffrin’s (USA/Atomic)** 0.94s win ahead of **Emma Aicher (GER/Head)** in **Are** equalled the record for most Slalom wins in a season (8) that **Shiffrin** already shared (2018/19) with **Janica Kostelic (CRO)** (2000/01). **Shiffrin** is now the first woman to win 8 SL races in a season twice.
- **Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic)** has 9 Slalom podiums this season. **Vreni Schneider (SUI)** was the first woman to reach 9 in a season in 1993/94, then **Janica Kostelic (CRO)** in 2005/06, then **Shiffrin** in 2018/19, 2022/23 (10) and 2025/26. **Shiffrin** is the only woman or man to reach 10 SL podiums in a season (2022/23) and the only woman to reach 9 SL podiums in a season more than once.
- **Emma Aicher’s (GER/Head)** 2nd was her 12th World Cup podium. **Aicher** now has 4 podiums each in Slalom, Downhill and Super G, and is the only woman to make the podium in more than two disciplines this season. Following her World Cup debut in November 2021, **Aicher** required 1203 days to make her first podium, but from then on, all 12 podiums have come in 380 days.
- **Wendy Holdener’s (SUI/Head)** 3rd made her the sixth woman to reach 40 Slalom podiums, and the third Swiss woman to do so after **Erika Hess** (42) and **Vreni Schneider** (47). It also ensured that the race for 2nd in the SL globe standings continues to **Hafjell**.

Overall Globe scenarios

- With the speed events in **Kvitfjell** complete, **Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic)** leads the overall standings on 1286 points ahead of **Emma Aicher (GER/Head)** (1241 pts) who is the only skier who can catch her. Shiffrin has a 45-point lead with just the Hafjell Slalom (24 March) and the GS (25 March) left.
- **Shiffrin** can only win the Overall Globe in the Hafjell SL race if she finishes on the podium and avoids the following scenarios: if **Shiffrin** wins, **Aicher** must finish 5th or better to keep the Overall Globe alive; if **Shiffrin** finishes 2nd, **Aicher** must finish 10th or better; and if **Shiffrin** finishes 3rd, **Aicher** must finish in the top 15 to keep the Overall Globe alive.
- If **Shiffrin** finishes off the SL podium, the Overall globe will continue until the Giant Slalom race regardless of **Aicher’s** result.

Slalom Globe scenarios

- **Mikaela Shiffrin’s (USA/Atomic)** victory in **Spindleruv Mlyn** guaranteed her ninth Slalom globe, which is the most in any event by any women’s or men’s skier.
- **Camille Rast (SUI/Head)** has 518 points, needing just one point in **Hafjell** to guarantee 2nd in the SL globe standings. **Rast** is followed by **Wendy Holdener (SUI/Head)** (418 pts), who must win and needs **Rast** to not score a single point to ensure a tie for 2nd in the standings. **Rast’s** previous best SL Globe standing is 3rd (2024/25) while **Holdener’s** is 2nd (2022/23 and 2017/18).
- In addition to **Holdener**, four other skiers have a mathematical chance of finishing 3rd - **Katharina Truppe (AUT/Voelkl)** (391 pts), **Paula Moltzan (USA/Rossignol)** (347 pts), **Lara Colturi (ALB/Blizzard)** (344 pts) and **Emma Aicher (GER/Head)** (321 pts).
- If **Holdener** finishes 2nd in **Hafjell** she will guarantee 3rd place in the SL globe. Otherwise, **Holdener** can finish 3rd provided **Truppe** does not score 28 points or more than her, **Moltzan** does not score 72

points or more than her, **Colturi** does not score 75 points or more than her, and **Aicher** does not score 98 points or more than her. For example, if **Truppe** finishes 4th (50 points) and **Holdener** finishes 12th (22 points), the 28-point difference will see **Truppe** overtake **Holdener** into 3rd place.

Hafjell stats

- **Hafjell** has hosted three women's Slalom races. The first, in 1992/93, was won by a 17-year-old **Renate Goetschl (AUT)** in her only SL win. The next two were held in 1995/96 and 2002/03.
- If **Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic)** wins in **Hafjell**, she will become the first woman to win nine Slalom races in a season.
- **Camille Rast (SUI/Head)** is the only other skier besides **Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic)** to win a SL race this season. If **Shiffrin** or **Rast** win in **Hafjell**, it will mark the sixth time that only two women have won all Slalom races in a season. The first was in 1973/74 between **Christa Zechmeister (FRG)** and **Rosi Mittermaier (FRG)**, then 2000/01 between **Janica Kostelic (CRO)** and **Sonja Nef (SUI)**, then 2017/18, 2018/19 and 2019/20 between **Shiffrin** and **Petra Vlhova (SVK/Rossignol)**. The only woman to win every SL race in a season is **Vreni Schneider (SUI)** who won all seven held in 1988/89.
- If **Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic)** finishes in the top 3 it will be the second time, after 2022/23, that she has made 10 Slalom podiums in a season (**Shiffrin** is the only woman or man to achieve this even once). It will also be **Shiffrin's** 99th SL podium, meaning she must wait until next season for a chance to become the first skier to reach 100 podiums in a single discipline.
- For Slalom podiums this season, **Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic)** has 9 from 9 for a 100% strike rate (SR), followed by **Camille Rast (SUI/Head)** with 5 from 9 (56% SR), then **Emma Aicher (GER/Head)** and **Lara Colturi (ALB/Blizzard)** on 4 each (44% SR), and **Wendy Holdener (SUI/Head)** on 2 (22% SR). No other skier has made more than 2 SL podiums this season. A podium for **Shiffrin** in **Hafjell** will mark the second time (after 2018/19) that she has made 100% of SL podiums in a season.
- For Slalom top-6 finishes this season, **Shiffrin** leads on 9 (100% SR), followed by **Wendy Holdener (SUI/Head)** and **Katharina Truppe (AUT/Voelkl)** on 7 each (78% SR), then **Paula Moltzan (USA/Rossignol)** and **Camille Rast (SUI/Head)** on 6 each (67% SR). In previous seasons, **Truppe** has never managed more than 3 (2019/20) and **Moltzan** never more than 5 (2024/25, 2022/23), while **Rast's** best is 7 (2024/25) and **Holdener's** best is 10 (2022/23).
- For Slalom top-10 finishes this season, **Shiffrin** and **Holdener** share the lead on 9 (100% SR), followed by **Rast** and **Truppe** on 8 each (89% SR), **Moltzan** on 7 (78% SR), then three skiers on 6 each (67% SR) - **Colturi**, **Aicher** and **Anna Swenn Larsson (SWE/Head)**. In previous seasons, **Colturi** has never managed more than 3 (2024/25) and **Aicher** never more than 4 (2024/25).
- If **Wendy Holdener (SUI/Head)** makes the podium, she will equal **Janica Kostelic (CRO)** on 55 podiums across all disciplines, which is equal-25th highest among women. It will also mark the second time (after 2018/19) that **Holdener** has finished in the top 10 in 100% of SL races in a season.
- If **Camille Rast (SUI/Head)** makes the podium, she will move from equal-sixth (8) among Swiss women for Slalom podiums to equal-fifth (9) alongside **Michelle Gisin (SUI/Salomon)**.
- If **Katharina Truppe (AUT/Voelkl)** maintains 5th or better in the Slalom globe standings it will be her best-ever season finish, improving on her previous best of 6th in the 2018/19 SL standings.

- **Lara Colturi (ALB/Blizzard)** and **Emma Aicher (GER/Head)** are guaranteed to record their best-ever finish in the Slalom globe standings. **Colturi's** previous best is 10th while **Aicher's** is 17th (both in 2024/25). At age 19, **Colturi** is the youngest of the 33 women to have made a podium across all disciplines this season. Both are still looking for their first SL win.
- If **Anna Swenn Larsson (SWE/Head)** makes the podium, she will be the 29th woman (and fourth from **Sweden**) to reach 15 World Cup Slalom podiums.
- **Lena Duerr (GER/Head)** and **Paula Moltzan (USA/Rossignol)** are the only two women to have taken part in all 65 Slalom races from 2019/20 to the most recent World Cup SL in **Are**. **Moltzan** will make her 90th SL start in **Hafjell** and can record her best-ever SL globe finish if she maintains 6th or better in the SL standings (her previous best is 7th from 2022/23). **Duerr** is on track to post her lowest SL standing in six seasons since finishing 15th in 2019/20.
