

Audi FIS Alpine Ski World Cup 2025/26 – Women's Super G Val d'Isere stat sheet

Previous Super G race

- **Alice Robinson (NZL/Salomon)** won the first Super G race this season, in **St. Moritz**, which was her 21st World Cup podium and first in SG (in 40 SG starts). The win saw **Robinson** break into the top 70 list for most women's World Cup podiums, and made her the second skier (and first woman) from a non-European/North American nation to win a World Cup SG race. **Steven Lee (AUS)** was the first, winning the men's SG in **Furano** in 1984/85. **Robinson** is also now responsible for more than half (7 out of 12) of **New Zealand's** World Cup wins.
- **Lindsey Vonn (USA/Head)** made her 107th Super G start in **St. Moritz**, edging closer to **Lara Gut-Behrami (SUI/Head)** who has the most (111) for an active women's skier.
- **Romane Miradoli (FRA/Dynastar)** is the only skier to have finished in the top 5 of the last three SG races (**St. Moritz**, and last season's **Sun Valley** and **La Thuile** races). **Miradoli's** second in **St. Moritz** was her best result in 24 Super G starts since winning the SG in **Lenzerheide** in 2021/22 (her first and only World Cup win to date).
- **Sofia Goggia (ITA/Atomic)** finished third in **St. Moritz** to become the 20th women's or men's (and 10th women's) skier to amass 20 SG World Cup podiums. **Goggia** is the second Italian women's or men's skier to do so after **Federica Brignone (ITA/Rossignol)** on 27.
- **Malorie Blanc's (SUI/Atomic)** sixth-place finish in **St. Moritz** was her best World Cup Super G result. **Blanc** has one podium to date, a Downhill second in **St. Anton** in just her second World Cup race, and was one of only two top 14 finishers in **St. Moritz** born after 2000 - the other was winner **Alice Robinson (NZL/Salomon)**.
- **Laura Gauche's (FRA/Head)** fifth-place finish in **St. Moritz** equalled her previous best Super G result first achieved 30 SG races earlier in **Altenmarkt-Zauchensee** in 2021/22.

Val d'Isere stats

- **Val d'Isere** has hosted 20 women's World Cup Super G races since 1986/87. Three women's skiers have won more than one - **Katja Seizinger (GER)** (3), **Hilde Gerg (GER)** (2) and **Alexandra Meissnitzer (AUT)** (2).
- Active skiers with a single SG win in **Val d'Isere** are **Lara Gut-Behrami (SUI/Head)** in 2016/17, **Lindsey Vonn (USA/Head)** in 2017/18, **Ester Ledecka (CZE/Kaestle)** in 2020/21, **Sofia Goggia (ITA/Atomic)** in 2021/22 and the most recent winner, **Federica Brignone (ITA/Rossignol)** in 2023/24.
- **Lindsey Vonn (USA/Head)**'s victory in **Val d'Isere** in 2017/18 was the last of her record 28 World Cup Super G wins.

- **Sofia Goggia (ITA/Atomic)** has four World Cup podiums in **Val d'Isere**, which is second-highest alongside **Renate Goetschl (AUT)** and **Katja Seizinger (GER)** and behind leader **Hilde Gerg (GER)** on five. A podium for **Goggia** in **Val d'Isere** will see her join **Gerg** on five.
- **Sofia Goggia (ITA/Atomic)** has won seven World Cup Super G races and can join **Hilde Gerg (GER)** in equal-eighth place on the women's all-time list with her eighth win on Sunday. The active skiers above **Goggia** on that list are: **Lindsey Vonn (USA/Head)** (28, No.1), **Lara Gut-Behrami (SUI/Head)** (24, No.2) and **Federica Brignone (ITA/Rossignol)** (13, No.5).
- **Alice Robinson (NZL/Salomon)** can become the first woman to win back-to-back World Cup Super G races since **Lara Gut-Behrami (SUI/Head)** in January 2024. Other than **Gut-Behrami**, who also won four straight in January-February 2021, the last woman to win back-to-back World Cup Super G races was **Viktoria Rebensburg (GER)** in 2019.
- **Germany** and **Austria** share top honours with five women's SG wins each in **Val d'Isere**, meaning the next win for either nation will make it **Val d'Isere's** most successful for SG.
- Only two French skiers have won a women's SG on home snow in **Val d'Isere** - **Regine Cavagnoud (FRA)** in 2000/01 and **Carole Montillet-Carles (FRA)** in 2002/03. **Montillet-Carles'** win is the last time a French skier made a women's SG podium in **Val d'Isere**.
- **Elena Curtoni (ITA/Head)**, who finished third in the Super G in **Val d'Isere** in 2021/22, will make her 94th SG start. **Lindsey Vonn (USA/Head)** and **Lara Gut-Behrami (SUI/Head)** are the only active women's skiers with more SG starts than **Curtoni**.
- **Ilka Stuhec (SLO/Kaestle)**, whose last Super G win came in 2018/19, will make her 84th Super G start. **Slovenia** is on seven women's Super G wins, equal-ninth alongside **Liechtenstein**. A win for **Stuhec** would see **Slovenia** move to equal-eighth alongside **Sweden** (8).
- **Priska Ming-Nuger (SUI/Kaestle)** will make her 80th World Cup SG start. **Cornelia Huetter (AUT/Head)** and **Mirjam Puchner (AUT/Atomic)** will make their 70th SG start in **Val d'Isere**.
- **Cornelia Huetter (AUT/Head)**, who finished fourth in the last Super G race in **Val d'Isere**, has 14 World Cup SG podiums, equal-fifth for Austrian women alongside **Anita Wachter (AUT)**. **Huetter's** next SG podium will see her move into outright fifth.
- **Kajsa Vickhoff Lie (NOR)** is currently on five World Cup Super G podiums, which is second best for **Norway** women's skiers behind **Ragnhild Mowinckel (NOR)** on seven. **Lie** is yet to win a SG race, with four second-place finishes including in **Val d'Isere** in 2023/24.
- **Joana Haehlen (SUI/Atomic)** finished sixth in the last Super G race in **Val d'Isere** in 2023. Her best result in the 23 World Cup races (12 SG, 11 DH) she has taken part in since then is ninth in the 2024 **Altenmarkt** Super G.
