

FACTS & FIGURES – Men's Super G in Kvitfjell

- **Marco Odermatt (SUI/Stöckli)** has clinched his third straight Super G Crystal Globe with two races remaining, as Mattia Casse (ITA/Rossignol), the only skier within 200 points of Odermatt's lead, has withdrawn from Sunday's race.
- Odermatt is the fifth man to win three or more Super G season titles, joining Kjetil Jansrud (NOR) on three. Aksel Lund Svindal (NOR) and Hermann Maier (AUT) share the men's record with five Super G globes, while Pirmin Zurbriggen (SUI) won four.
- Odermatt is the first man since Svindal from 2012-14 to win three Super G globes in a row. Maier holds the men's record with four Super G globes in a row from 1998-2001.
- By finishing in the top three on Sunday, Odermatt would also join Jansrud on 26 World Cup Super G podiums, which would be equal third on the men's all-time list behind Maier (38) and Svindal (30).
- Odermatt has won the last two World Cup Super G races and can win three in a row for the second time in his career and first since he won four in a row from January-March 2023.
- Odermatt has finished inside the top seven in his last 22 World Cup Super G races dating back to March 2022, making the podium in 18 of them.
- Odermatt entered the weekend with 45 World Cup wins in all disciplines, and could equal or surpass Marc Giradelli (LUX, 46), who is fifth on the men's all-time list.
- Odermatt is also within striking distance of the Swiss men's World Cup podium record in all disciplines. He entered the weekend with 84, two behind Zurbriggen's record of 86.
- In eight World Cup races in Kvitfjell, Odermatt only has one podium, a third in last year's Super G, and two top 10 results.
- Vincent Kriechmayr (AUT/Head) currently sits in third place in the Super G standings behind Odermatt and Casse, with second-place finishes in Bormio and Wengen earlier this season.
- Kriechmayr has won nine World Cup Super G races and can become the sixth man to win 10, behind Maier (24), Svindal (17), Odermatt (15), Jansrud (13) and Zurbriggen (10).
- Entering the weekend, Kriechmayr had nine World Cup wins in both Super G and Downhill. With an extra win in each discipline, he would become the 11th man to achieve the 'double-double' of double-figure (10+) wins in two disciplines.
- He would become the fourth man to do the speed double-double after Maier (24 SG, 15 DH), Svindal (17 SG, 14 DH) and Zurbriggen (10 SG, 10 DH).
- Kriechmayr won the Kvitfjell Super G last season and entered the weekend with four World Cup podiums in the Norwegian resort, including three in Super G.
- Alexis Monney (SUI/Stöckli) finished second behind Odermatt in the last Super G race in Crans Montana and can make back-to-back Super G podiums for the first time in his career.
- All his career World Cup podiums (five entering this weekend) have come this season.
- In four World Cup races in Kvitfjell, his best finish is 26th.

INTERNATIONAL SKI AND SNOWBOARD FEDERATION

- **Dominik Paris (ITA/Nordica)** finished third in the last Super G in Crans Montana, his first Super G podium since he was also third in Kvitfjell last year.
- Paris entered the weekend with 48 World Cup podiums in all disciplines and could become the 24th man to reach 50.
- Paris has made three World Cup Super G podiums in Kvitfjell, including winning in 2019. Paris and Kriechmayr are the only skiers racing this weekend who have previously won a Kvitfjell Super G.
- Franjo von Allmen (SUI/Head) won the Super G in Wengen in January, his first World Cup victory. He has finished in the top seven in his last four World Cup Super G races.
- He has only raced once before in Kvitfjell at World Cup level, finishing 21st in last year's Super G.
- With two Super G races to go this season, the standings behind Odermatt are very tight. The Swiss star leads on 441 points, followed by the absent Casse on 260. The next three skiers are separated by just two points: Kriechmayr (236), **Stefan Rogentin (SUI/Fischer**, 235) and Von Allmen (234).
- Four Swiss racers currently sit in the top seven of the standings, including three in the top five.
