

FACTS & FIGURES – Women's Slalom, Sestriere

- There have only been two women's Slalom events over the last decade, in December 2022 and December 2016. Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic) won in 2016 and Wendy Holdener (SUI/Head) in 2022.
- Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic) has 99 World Cup wins and can become the first Alpine skier to reach 100 World Cup victories.
- Shiffrin can win her 63rd World Cup Slalom race, which would take her past Annemarie Moser-Pröll's (AUT) World Cup victories total in all disciplines (62) in Slalom alone. Lindsey Vonn (USA) is the only woman with more World Cup wins (82) in all disciplines than Shiffrin has just in Slalom.
- Shiffrin has 154 World Cup podiums in all disciplines and can equal Ingemar Stenmark's (SWE) record of 155 for any Alpine ski racer.
- She has won six of the past seven World Cup Slalom races that she has entered, finishing 10th in the other - her last event in Courchevel, which was her first race back after a 60-day absence due to injury.
- She can win at least seven in a row for the third time, and first time since she won seven in a row from March 2018 to January 2019. Her personal record is 12 Slalom victories in a row, from February 2015 to December 2016.
- Shiffrin can win her third World Cup Slalom race of the 2024/25 season, after Levi and Gurgl. It would be the 11th different season in which she has won three or more Slalom races.
- Shiffrin's 62 Slalom World Cup wins are comfortably more than any other ski racer in history.
- Shiffrin finished second at the most recent World Cup Slalom to be held at Sestriere, in December 2022.
- She won the Slalom in Sestriere in December 2016.
- Camille Rast (SUI/Head) tops the Slalom World Cup standings this season, after winning twice and finishing inside the top five in the other five races.
- Rast won gold in the Slalom at the 2025 Alpine Ski World Championships earlier this month, her first World Championships medal.
- Rast become the first Swiss winner of the women's Slalom World Championship gold medal since Vreni Schneider in 1991.
- Prior to this season, Rast had only made the top five four times in her World Cup Slalom career.
- Croatia's **Zrinka Ljutic (CRO/Atomic)** has won three of the past four Slalom World Cup races, including the most recent race in Courchevel.
- The win in Courchevel meant Ljutic joins Shiffrin and Petra Vlhova (SVK/Rossignol) as the only woman to win three out of four World Cup Slaloms since Marlies Schild (AUT) in 2012.

- Wendy Holdener (SUI/Head) won the silver medal in the Slalom at the 2025 Alpine Ski World Championships earlier this month.
- Holdener won the most recent World Cup Slalom to be held at Sestriere, in December 2022. She finished third in a Slalom here in December 2016.
- She has 38 World Cup Slalom podiums but just two victories.
- This season she has finished twice three times.
- Holdener's 38 World Cup Slalom podiums place her sixth on the women's all-time list. The top 10 skiers on that list all have at least 14 Slalom victories except Holdener, who has only two.
- Katharina Liensberger (AUT/Rossignol) is Austria's top-ranked women's Slalom skier this season, after finishing inside the top-nine in all seven races. Within that she has two podium places (2nd in Levi and 3rd in Semmering).
- Liensberger won the bronze medal in the Slalom at the 2025 Alpine Ski World Championships earlier this month.
- Her last World Cup Slalom win came in March 2022.
- Lena Dürr (GER/Head) has won just one World Cup Slalom race in her career, in Spindleruv Mlyn in January 2023 but she has 15 podium finishes to her name, including three this season.
- Anna Swenn Larsson (SWE/Head) has two Slalom World Cup podium finishes this season and two career victories (February 2024 and November 2022).
- Sara Hector (SWE/Head) The reigning Olympic GS champion recorded her first Slalom World Cup podium in January 2024 and has grabbed two more since, including the most recent World Cup Slaloms at Courchevel and Flachau.
