

Audi FIS Alpine Ski World Cup 2025/26 -

Men's Super G Val Gardena Südtirol stat sheet

- Saslong course, located above Val Gardena on the Langkofel mountain in the Dolomites, first hosted a World Cup Super G in December 1983. A total of 23 Super G World Cup races have been held there to date.
- Val Gardena will feature a speed triple header this year. A sprint Downhill race will take
 place on Thursday, 18 December. The Super G will follow on Friday, 19 December, and
 the classic Downhill will top things off on Saturday, 20 December.
- This is not the first time Val Gardena is hosting such a triple header there was one in 2023/24, when Bryce Bennett (USA/Fischer) won the sprint Downhill, Vincent Kriechmayr (AUT/Head) was first in the Super G and Dominik Paris (ITA/Nordica) topped the podium in the second Downhill of the weekend.
- This will be the third Super G race of the 2025/26 World Cup season. Vincent Kriechmayr (AUT/Head) leads the World Cup standings after two events with 180 points, ahead of Marco Odermatt (SUI/Stöckli, 145) in 2nd and Fredrik Moeller (NOR/Atomic, 125) in 3rd.
- Marco Odermatt (SUI/Stöckli) leads the overall Cup standings after the Val d'Isere weekend with 505 points. Henrik Kristoffersen (NOR/Van Deer, 302) is second, Timon Haugan (NOR/Van Deer, 281) is in third place.
- Vincent Kriechmayr (AUT/Head) won the second race of the season in Beaver Creek on
 5 December, ahead of Fredrik Moeller (NOR/Atomic) in 2nd and Raphael Haaser (AUT/Atomic) in 3rd.
- Vincent Kriechmayr (AUT/Head) and Raphael Haaser (AUT/Atomic) have made the podium in both 2025/26 Super G World Cup races. Two Austrians have also featured on the podium of the last Super G of the 2024/25 season, which makes it three in a row. Lukas Feurstein (AUT/Head) was the winner in Sun Valley, Raphael Haaser was 2nd.
- The win in Beaver Creek allowed Vincent Kriechmayr (AUT/Head) to join Michaela Dorfmeister in equal third place on the all-time list of Austrian World Cup Super G athletes, men or women, with 10 wins both. Hermann Maier heads the list with 24 Super G World Cup victories, Renate Goetschl is second with 17.
- Vincent Kriechmayr's (AUT/Head) podium finish in Beaver Creek allowed him to join Stephan Eberharter in equal second place on the all-time list of Austrian men's World Cup Super G skiers at 24 podium finishes both. Hermann Maier heads the list with 38 Super G World Cup podium finishes.
- After Beaver Creek Vincent Kriechmayr (AUT/Head) is sitting in the undisputed second place on the all-time list of Austrian World Cup Super G athletes, men or women, with



60 top-10 finishes. **Renate Goetschl** heads the list with 71 Super G World Cup top 10s. Kriechmayr's result is also the men's Super G all-time leading record.

- Fredrik Moeller (NOR/Atomic) claimed his second career Super G World Cup podium in Beaver Creek. His maiden career win came last season in Bormio Super G. Moeller now has one win, two podiums and five top-5 finishes in 14 Super G World Cup starts.
- Raphael Haaser (AUT/Atomic) claimed his 7th career World Cup Super G podium in Beaver Creek, third one in a row. He is yet to find his first win, but has five top-5 finishes (including three podiums) in his past six Super G races.
- **Dominik Paris (ITA/Nordica)** finished 4th in Beaver Creek to move into 10th place on his own in the all-time list of men's World Cup Super G top-10 finishes. He is already the most successful Italian men's World Cup Super G athlete with 39 World Cup top 10s, 17 podiums and five wins.
- Marco Odermatt (SUI/Stöckli) has the opportunity to stretch his record streak of men's top-10 World Cup Super G finishes. The Swiss skier has finished inside the top 10 in his last 26 World Cup Super G races dating back to the race in Courchevel Meribel in March 2022. In that time he has claimed 12 wins and 19 podium finishes.
- A win for Marco Odermatt (SUI/Stöckli) would see him join Aksel Lund Svindal (NOR) in second place on the men's all-time World Cup Super G winners list. Currently, Odermatt has 16 Super G World Cup wins, one behind Svindal and eight behind Hermann Maier (AUT) who leads the field with 24 wins.
- Mattia Casse (ITA/Rossignol) won his first ever World Cup race at the last Val Gardena Super G in 2024/25. Jared Goldberg (USA/Rossignol) was 2nd, Marco Odermatt (SUI/Stöckli) – 3rd.
- Aksel Lund Svindal (NOR) has five wins in Val Gardena World Cup Super G races, no other athlete has more than two.
- Vincent Kriechmayr (AUT/Head) and Aleksander Aamodt Kilde (NOR/Atomic) have the most wins (2) in Val Gardena Super G's among active athletes. Kriechmayr won in 2019/20 and 2023/24, Kilde in 2020/21 and 2021/22.
- Norway is the most successful nation in Val Gardena Super G history, having claimed 10 wins to date. Austria has five, Switzerland four.
- Three Norwegian athletes lead the list of the most podiums in Val Gardena Super G history, **Kjetil Jansrud (7)**, **Aksel Lund Svindal (5)** and **Aleksander Aamodt Kilde (4)**.
- Marco Odermatt (SUI/Stöckli) is chasing his first ever Super G victory in Val Gardena. He only had one top-10 finish in his first four starts here, but the last two saw him finish 3rd in 2023/24 and 2024/25.
