1 Forward

The FIS Technical Official General Rules is meant to provide TO with guidance on some fundamental FIS rules applicable to their role in FIS. Content covers reimbursement rules, general Technical Official nomination rules, and responsibilities of Technical Delegates in case of severe accidents on the field of play.

They are governed and managed by FIS. Requests for changes and/or adjustments can be made directly to FIS [events@fis-ski.com].

2 Technical Official Insurance

2.1 Accident Insurance

All Technical Officials must have their own accident insurance. If the Technical Official's own insurance does not cover all the costs, FIS has a subsidiary cover in case of an accident for all Technical Officials working for FIS at an event.

2.2 Health Insurance

A general health insurance that covers forced leave in case of illness must be effected by the Technical Official.

3 Reimbursement Rules for Technical Officials

Costs of active engagement, i.e., FIS TO assignments, are normally covered by the local organizing committee of the respective events. As per the rules, each TO receives a per diem reimbursement of 125 CHF (including travel days) and accommodation with full board. Additionally, travel costs are covered up to a maximum of 1000 CHF (for OG, WSC, JWSC, WC) and up to 600 CHF (all other events and education, i.e. TD/Judge Seminars/Updates/Clinics) upon reception of the original receipts (Train 2nd class, Plane Economy class, Car mileage allowance of 0.70 CHF/km including toll/vignette expenses)¹. No other additional costs (i.e., phone, printing, etc) are covered either by FIS or the organizing committee. Expenses need to be claimed using the FIS Expense sheet outlined below.

5 General Technical Official Nomination Policy

For governance reasons, the nomination and selection of any TO for a specific event should follow a transparent nomination policy that is rooted in²:

- language skills, e.g.: English is a prerequisite for all TO but if someone also knows the local language, he/she might be preferred for events at specific levels and/or specific regions.
- the state of education, e.g.: if someone is using all education opportunities including demonstrating being active as TO (national and/or international), he/she might be preferred for specific events.
- the quality of demonstrated work, including skills and personality, e.g.: if someone has a strong and positive record of work provided by different stakeholders, he/she might be preferred for specific events.
- the geographical location of residence and/or travel options, e.g.: the proximity of a TO to the event and/or the conditions of travel might be a criterion why he/she is preferred for a specific event.
- the availability, e.g.: the availability of a TO for a specific event might be a criterion why he/she is preferred for a specific event

² Justified exemptions can be applied and are in the discretion of the disciplines sub committee

- f) the general behaviour on the field of play that is grounded in the Code of Conduct, e.g., breaches of the Code of Conduct on the Field Play might be a reason why a TO is NOT selected for specific events.

The role-specific nomination/assignment policies and selection processes for the respective disciplines are outlined in the ICR.

To ensure the alignment with the general rules, the disciplines are requested to send a first draft of the assignments to the Sport Department (events@fis-ski.com) before it is finalized in the committee.

6 TD Guidelines in the Event of Serious Accidents

One of the goals of FIS is to provide reliable data on injury trends in international skiing and snowboarding at the competition level. Specific objectives include:

- Monitoring injury patterns in all FIS disciplines
- Monitoring trends in injury risk with time
- Providing potential background data for in-depth studies of the causes of injury for particular injury types in specific disciplines, e.g. knee and head injuries in alpine skiing, snowboarding and freestyle skiing.

The overall goal of FIS is to support a reduction in injury rates which may include changes in rules and regulations, equipment or coaching techniques based on data provided.

For this purpose, a reportable injury is defined as **an injury that occurs during competition or official training and requires attention by medical personnel.**

For a solid evidence base, a detailed Injury Report is necessary. The TD plays an important role in registering (severe) incidents, but he/she is **NOT** responsible in registering medical details.

Roles and Responsibilities of the TD

- Indicate in the TD report, that a (severe) incident happened during the event. He/she needs to specify:
 - o The stakeholder group affected (i.e., athlete, official, LOC etc)
 - o If an athlete and/or official, indicate the country/NSA
 - o Contact details of either the NSA or LOC (LOC staff)
 - o If available, contact details from the medical staff treating the patient on site
 - o The evacuation of the patient (walking, transport with a sledge, transport by helicopter)
- Check whether tapes or videos were taken of the injury by team coaching staff or others and provide information on contact details to obtain a copy of the injury videotape.
- Make notes about the incident as detailed as possible and think of anything that might be useful to reconstruct the incident (i.e., where did it happen, when did it happen, the weather conditions, who was involved etc)

It is **NOT** the duty of the TD to register any medical or other sensitive data nor to question anyone about these data. This will be done by the respective departments within FIS in a second step with a validated Injury Registration Form.
