

## Audi FIS Alpine Ski World Cup 2025/26 – Women’s Super G Zauchensee stat sheet

### Previous SG race stats – Val d’Isere

- **Sofia Goggia (ITA/Atomic)** won the second Super G race this season, in **Val d’Isere**, by 0.15s ahead of **Alice Robinson (NZL/Salomon)**, with **Lindsey Vonn (USA/Head)** in third. It was **Goggia’s** first victory since a Downhill win in **Cortina d’Ampezzo** in 2024/25, ending a 22-race winless streak. This was **Goggia’s** longest winless streak since her World Cup debut in 2011 when she contested 60 races before her first win (DH in **Jeongseon**) in 2016/17. Her previous longest winless streak was 16.
- **Sofia Goggia’s (ITA/Atomic)** win in **Val d’Isere** was her eighth Super G win among 21 podiums (38% win-to-podium rate) in 63 SG starts (33% podium-to-race rate), compared to her Downhill record of 19 wins among 38 podiums (50% win-to-podium rate) in 69 starts (55% podium-to-race rate). **Goggia’s** win sees her join **Hilde Gerg (GER)** in equal-eighth place for all-time women’s SG wins (8). **Goggia** also joins **Tina Weirather (LIE)** in equal-ninth for all-time women’s SG podiums (21).
- **Alice Robinson’s (NZL/Salomon)** 2<sup>nd</sup> in **Val d’Isere** was her second Super G podium (in 41 SG starts). **Robinson** won the first SG race this season in **St. Moritz** to become the first women’s or men’s skier from a non-European/North American nation to win a World Cup race in more than one of the four individual events (SL, GS, DH, SG). After her 2<sup>nd</sup> in **Val d’Isere**, **Robinson** joins **Ilka Stuhec (SLO/Kaestle)** and **Mateja Svet (SLO)** on 22 World Cup podiums, which is equal-66<sup>th</sup> all-time for women.
- **Lindsey Vonn’s (USA/Head)** 3<sup>rd</sup> in **Val d’Isere** was her 48<sup>th</sup> Super G podium, which is the most for women and men. As of 11 Jan 2026, **Vonn’s** last of her 28 SG wins came 2949 days ago in 2017/18 in **Val d’Isere**. **Vonn’s** first SG podium (3<sup>rd</sup> in **Lake Louise**) came in 2004, the same year that the four youngest SG competitors in **Val d’Isere** were born: **Sara Thaler (ITA/Rossignol)**, **Garance Meyer (FRA/Dynastar)**, **Allison Mollin (USA/Head)** and **Malorie Blanc (SUI/Atomic)**.
- **Elena Curtoni’s (ITA/Head)** 4<sup>th</sup> in **Val d’Isere** was the third time she has finished 4<sup>th</sup> in the 14 Super G races she has contested since making her last SG podium, a 2<sup>nd</sup> in **Kvitfjell** in 2022/23.
- **Camille Cerutti’s (FRA/Atomic)** 5<sup>th</sup> in **Val d’Isere** was her first top 10 World Cup result. She has made 72 World Cup starts in all disciplines.
- **Ilka Stuhec’s (SLO/Kaestle)** 7<sup>th</sup> in **Val d’Isere** was her best Super G result in the 43 SG races she started since winning the SG in **Val Gardena-Groeden** in 2018/19.
- **Ariane Raedler’s (AUT/Head)** 8<sup>th</sup> in **Val d’Isere** was her fifth top 10 finish in the 10 Super G races she has contested since making her second SG podium last season (3<sup>rd</sup> in **Beaver Creek**). **Raedler’s** first SG podium (3<sup>rd</sup>) came in **Zauchensee** in 2021/22.
- **Mirjam Puchner (AUT/Atomic)** and **Kira Weidle-Winkelmann (GER/Rossignol)** are the only two skiers to have taken part in all 43 Super G races from 2020/21 to **Val d’Isere** this season.

### Zauchensee stats

- **Zauchensee** has hosted 10 women’s World Cup Super G races, most recently in 2023/24 when two SG races were held. The first SG in **Zauchensee** in 1990/91 was won by **Petra Kronberger (AUT)**, a dual gold medallist at the 1992 Olympic Winter Games.

- **Lara Gut-Behrami (SUI/Head)** is the only skier to have won more than one Super G race in **Zauchensee** (2010/11 and the second race in 2023/24). The first made **Gut-Behrami** the youngest SG winner in **Zauchensee** at age 19, and the second the oldest at age 32. Skiers who are older than **Gut-Behrami** this weekend and could break her record include **Lindsey Vonn (USA/Head)**, **Sofia Goggia (ITA/Atomic)**, **Cornelia Huetter (AUT/Head)** and others.
- Active skiers with a single Super G win in **Zauchensee** are **Cornelia Huetter (AUT/Head)** in 2023/24, **Federica Brignone (ITA/Rossignol)** in 2021/22, and **Lindsey Vonn (USA/Head)** in 2015/16.
- **Cornelia Huetter (AUT/Head)** is the most recent **Austrian** winner in **Zauchensee** (2023/24), following **Alexandra Meissnitzer (2004/05)**, **Michaela Dorfmeister (2001/02)**, **Renate Goetschl (1999/00)** and **Petra Kronberger (1990/91)**. **Austria** boasts five of the ten women's SG winners in **Zauchensee**.
- For Super G podiums in **Zauchensee**, **Lara Gut-Behrami (SUI/Head)** has the most with four, followed by **Cornelia Huetter (AUT/Head)** on three (1<sup>st</sup> in 2023/24, 2<sup>nd</sup> in 2023/24, 3<sup>rd</sup> in 2015/16). **Lindsey Vonn (USA/Head)** and **Alexandra Meissnitzer (AUT)** have two each. **Vonn's** win in 2015/16 followed a 2<sup>nd</sup> in 2010/11.
- If **Sofia Goggia's (ITA/Atomic)** wins she will move from equal-eighth for women's Super G wins alongside **Hilde Gerg (GER)** to outright eighth. **Goggia's** next SG podium will see her move from equal-ninth (21) for women with **Tina Weirather (LIE)** to equal-eighth (22) with **Anna Veith (AUT)**.
- **Cornelia Huetter (AUT/Head)** and **Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic)** both have five Super G wins, which is equal-13<sup>th</sup> for women. A win for **Huetter** will see her move to equal-12<sup>th</sup> alongside **Marina Kiehl (FRG)**. **Huetter** is one of three skiers, alongside **Lara Gut-Behrami (SUI/Head)** and **Federica Brignone (ITA/Rossignol)** to have won at least one Super G in each of the past four seasons.
- **Corinne Suter (SUI/Head)** could make her return from injury in **Zauchensee**. Her last Super G race came in March in **Sun Valley**, where she finished 15<sup>th</sup>. **Suter** has nine SG podiums, needing one more to become the 25<sup>th</sup> woman (and third from **Switzerland**) to reach 10.
- **Kajsa Vickhoff Lie (NOR/ Head)** will make her 50<sup>th</sup> Super G start in **Zauchensee**. **Lie** is on five World Cup SG podiums, which is second best for **Norway** women behind **Ragnhild Mowinckel (NOR)** on seven. **Lie** is yet to win an SG race, with five SG podiums including 2<sup>nd</sup> in **Zauchensee** in 2023/24.
- **Joana Haehlen (SUI/Atomic)** will make her 160<sup>th</sup> World Cup start across all events in **Zauchensee**, while **Stephanie Brunner (AUT/Head)** will make her 150<sup>th</sup>. For only Super G starts, **Jacqueline Wiles (USA/Rossignol)** will make her 60<sup>th</sup> while three skiers will make their 40<sup>th</sup> – **Laura Pirovano (ITA/Head)**, **Jasmina Suter (SUI/Stoeckl)** and **Valerie Grenier (CAN/Rossignol)**.
- **Canada** and **Sweden** both have 11 women's and men's Super G wins, which is equal ninth. The next nation to win will move to outright ninth.
- **Norway** has 17 women's Super G podiums, which is 12<sup>th</sup> highest. The next SG podium will see **Norway** match **Canada** with 18 in equal-11<sup>th</sup> position.
- **Italy** has 98 women's Super G podiums, which is fifth best. If two Italians finish on the podium in **Zauchensee**, **Italy** will become the fourth nation after **Austria** (237), **Switzerland** (123), and **Germany** (101) to reach 100.
