

Audi FIS Alpine Ski World Cup 2025/26 – Women’s Slalom Are stat sheet

2026 Olympic Winter Games Milano-Cortina SL stats

- **Mikaela Shiffrin’s (USA/Atomic)** Slalom gold made her the first **USA** women’s or men’s Alpine skier to win three Olympic gold medals, surpassing **Ted Ligety** and **Andrea Mead-Lawrence** (two each). For medals of any colour among **USA** Alpine skiers, **Shiffrin** is in equal-second place with four alongside **Julia Mancuso** and behind leader **Bode Miller** (6). **Shiffrin** is the sixth woman from any nation to reach three Olympic gold medals. Only **Janica Kostelic (CRO)** has more (4).
- **Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic)** now owns the record for the largest gap between two Olympic Alpine skiing gold medals in the same event, with 12 years separating her first SL gold at Sochi 2014 from her win in Milano-Cortina. The previous record was 10 years, set by **Kjetil Andre Aamodt (NOR)** in Super G (1992 and 2002).
- **Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic)** is the second women’s or men’s skier to win two Olympic Slalom gold medals, after **Vreni Schneider (SUI)** (1988, 1994). **Shiffrin’s** 1.50s win in Milano-Cortina is the biggest women’s Slalom winning margin since **Schneider’s** 1.68s win at Calgary 1988.
- **Camille Rast’s (SUI/Head)** silver in Slalom was her first Olympic medal at age 26 years and 224 days, making her the second-youngest women’s medallist in Milano-Cortina behind 22-year-old **Emma Aicher (GER/Head)**. **Rast’s** medal made **Switzerland** the only nation to have won a women’s SL medal at each of the past three Games, following **Wendy Holdener’s** 2018 silver and 2022 bronze.
- **Anna Swenn Larsson’s (SWE/Head)** bronze was her first Olympic medal at age 34 years and 245 days, making her the second-oldest women’s medallist in Milano-Cortina behind 35-year-old **Federica Brignone (ITA/Rossignol)**. **Swenn Larsson** is the third Swedish woman to win an Olympic SL medal after **Frida Hansdotter** (2018) and **Anja Paerson** (2002, 2006), and the sixth Swedish woman to win an Olympic medal in any Alpine skiing discipline.

Are stats

- **Are** has hosted 24 World Cup women’s Slalom races since 1989/90. The first was won by 1988 Olympic SL champion **Vreni Schneider (SUI)**, who is one of six women to have won twice there, among whom two are active skiers - **Petra Vlhova (SVK/Rossignol)** (2015/16, 2020/21) and **Katharina Liensberger (AUT/Rossignol)** (2020/21, 2021/22).
- **Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic)** is the only skier to have won more than twice in **Are** with six wins: 2012/12, 2013/14, 2014/15, 2017/18, 2022/23 and 2023/24. **Shiffrin’s** win in 2012/13 at age 17 made her the youngest women’s SL winner in **Are**, while her 1.58s win ahead of **Wendy Holdener (SUI/Head)** in 2017/18 is the biggest winning margin.
- Only one Swedish woman has won the Slalom race in **Are** – **Maria Pietilae-Holmner** in 2014/15. **Anna Swenn Larsson (SWE/Head)** has one podium there, a 3rd in 2022/23, which is the most recent top-3 finish for **Sweden** in **Are**. **Cornelia Oehlund (SWE/Head)** has trained at the Are Alpine Ski Club since age 10 when her family moved there. **Oehlund** has taken part in three Slalom races in **Are** with a best result of 10th in 2022/23 and most recently 13th in 2024/25. **Oehlun** posted the third-fastest first run in the Slalom in Milano-Cortina, but did not finish her second run.

- **Katharina Truppe (AUT/Voelkl)** won the last Slalom race held in **Are** in 2024/25 by 0.05s ahead of **Katharina Liensberger (AUT/Rossignol)**, with **Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic)** in third. It was **Truppe's** first ever World Cup win in any discipline.
- **Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic)** leads for women's Slalom podiums in **Are** (9), followed by **Anja Paerson (SWE)** (5), then **Frida Hansdotter (SWE)** and **Katharina Liensberger (AUT/Rossignol)** (4 each), and **Wendy Holdener (SUI/Head)** (3).
- **Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic)** has never finished outside the top 10 in 12 Slalom races in **Are**. Next best is **Wendy Holdener (SUI/Head)** with nine top-10 SL finishes there, also from 12 races. **Anna Swenn Larsson (SWE/Head)** has seven from 11 SL starts in **Are**, which is equal-fourth highest.
- **Mikaela Shiffrin's (USA/Atomic)** victory in **Spindleruv Mlyn** guaranteed her ninth Slalom globe, which is the most in any event by any skier, surpassing **Lindsey Vonn's (USA/Head)** eight Downhill globes and **Ingemar Stenmark's (SWE)** eight Giant Slalom and eight SL titles.
- The five skiers ranked 2nd to 6th in the Slalom globe standings all have a mathematical chance of finishing second depending on their results in **Are**. If **Camille Rast (SUI/Head)** finishes in the Top 2 in **Are**, she will guarantee second place. If **Rast** finishes third, **Wendy Holdener (SUI/Head)** must win to keep the race for second place alive. The nine skiers ranked 2nd to 10th in the Slalom standings all have a mathematical chance of finishing third in the SL globe depending on their results in **Are**.
- If **Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic)** wins in **Are**, she will equal the record for most Slalom wins in a season (8) that she already shares (2018/19) with **Janica Kostelic (CRO)** (2000/01). **Shiffrin's** win in **Spindleruv Mlyn** was the fourth time **Shiffrin** has won seven SL races in a season (2017/18, 2018/19, 2023/24). **Vreni Schneider (SUI)** is the only other skier to have done so more than once.
- If **Camille Rast (SUI/Head)** makes the podium, she will move from equal-sixth (8) among Swiss women for Slalom podiums to equal-fifth (9) alongside **Michelle Gisin (SUI/Salomon)**. **Rast** is the only skier besides **Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic)** to have won a women's Slalom race so far this season.
- If **Wendy Holdener (SUI/Head)** wins, she will become the oldest skier representing **Switzerland** to win a women's World Cup Slalom race at age 32 (**Vreni Schneider** holds the current record of age 30). **Holdener's** last World Cup win came in SL in **Sestriere** in 2022.
- If **Lara Colturi (ALB/Blizzard)** wins, she will be 19 years and 120 days as of 15 Mar 2026, which would make her the youngest women's SL winner since **Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic)** won in **Lenzerheide** in 2013/14 at age 19 years and 2 days. It would also be a first World Cup win for **Colturi** and **Albania**.
- If **Anna Swenn Larsson (SWE/Head)** makes the podium, she will be the 29th woman (and fourth from **Sweden**) to reach 15 World Cup Slalom podiums.
- If **Paula Moltzan (USA/Rossignol)** makes the podium, she will become the 14th **USA** woman to reach 10 World Cup podiums across all disciplines, joining speed racer **Breezy Johnson (USA/Atomic)** who was the 13th. The 12 **USA** women above **Moltzan** and **Johnson** have all won at least one World Cup race, while **Moltzan** and **Johnson** are yet to win their first World Cup race.
- If **Emma Aicher (GER/Head)** or **Lena Duerr (GER/Head)** win, **Germany** will become the 10th nation to reach 30 women's and men's Slalom wins. If **Aicher** wins, she will become the third German woman (alongside **Hilde Gerg** and **Maria Hoefl-Riesch**) to win World Cup races in DH, SG and SL.

- **Lena Duerr (GER/Head)** and **Paula Moltzan (USA/Rossignol)** are the only two women to have taken part in all 64 Slalom races from 2019/20 to **Spindleruv Mlyn** in 2026.
- For World Cup starts across all disciplines: **Lena Duerr (GER/Head)** will make her 250th; **Katharina Huber (AUT/Voelkl)** her 140th; and **Melanie Meillard (SUI/Rossignol)** her 120th in **Are**. For Slalom starts, **Ana Bucik Jogan (SLO/Salomon)** will make her 110th in **Are**.
