

## FACTS & FIGURES - Men's Downhill World Cup Finals, Sun Valley

- Men's Downhill Crystal Globe 2024/25 season standings: 1. Marco Odermatt (605); 2. Franjo von Allmen (522); 3. Alexis Monney (327); 4. Miha Hrobat (320); 5. James Crawford (270); 6. Dominik Paris (262).
- **Swiss dominance this season**: Swiss skiers have twice swept the World Cup Downhill podium this season (Crans-Montana and Kvitfjell) and in total they have claimed 17/24 possible podium finishes and only in Kitzbühel, when Monney finished 2nd, have they had fewer than two skiers on the podium.
- This is the first time the men will race a World Cup Downhill in Sun Valley.
- Marco Odermatt (SUI/Stöckli) will win his second career Downhill Crystal Globe, and second crown in a row, if he finishes ahead of teammate von Allmen in Sun Valley.
- Odermatt's lead of 83 points means that if von Allmen wins the final Downhill of the season in Sun Valley, Odermatt will still take the Crystal Globe as long as he finishes inside the top 14.
- The 2023 World Cup Finals in Soldeu was the last time Odermatt finished outside the top 14 in a World Cup race (he came 15th that day).
- In the 16 World Cup Downhills since then, Odermatt has won four times and claimed an additional eight podium finishes.
- Already crowned the Overall, Super G and Giant Slalom Crystal Globe winner this season, Odermatt is chasing a fourth Crystal Globe for the second season in succession.
- With 12 Globes so far, Odermatt is already the fourth most successful men's skier of all time. Marcel Hirscher with 20, leads the way.
- Were he to win in Sun Valley, it would mark the first time in his career that Odermatt has won three World Cup Downhills in a single season.
- Having started the season with just one top-10 Downhill finish to his name
   Franjo von Allmen (SUI/Head) ends it with a chance to usurp Odermatt and claim his first Crystal Globe.
- As above, von Allmen is 83 points behind his teammate meaning he has to win in Sun Valley and hope Odermatt finishes 15th or below to snatch the Globe.
- In his past eight Downhills, the 23-year-old has won three (two World Cups, including the most recent race in Kvitfjell and World Championship gold in Saalbach) finished 2nd three times, 4th once and 9th.
- Von Allmen (Crans Montana and Kvitfjell) and Odermatt (Val Gardena and Wengen) are the only two Downhillers to win twice this season.
- Alexis Monney (SUI/Stöckli) currently sits 3rd in the Downhill standings, with a lead of seven points over Hrobat. Monney's previous best finish in a discipline standings was 20th in last season's Downhill standings.
- Prior to his victory in Bormio in December 2024, Monney had never finished higher than 8th in his previous 23 career World Cup Downhill races.
- Since then he has claimed a 2nd (Kitzbühel) and a 3rd (Crans Montana) plus a bronze in the World Championship Downhill in Saalbach.

- Stefan Rogentin (SUI/Fischer) finished 3rd in both the recent Kvitfjell Downhills, his only two World Cup Downhill podiums in 56 races.
- Previous to those performances, Rogentin's best World Cup Downhill finish was 8th in Wengen in 2022.
- Rogentin is the fifth Swiss racer to finish on a World Cup Downhill podium so far.
- Teammate Justin Murisier (SUI/Head) is the other Swiss skier to have reached a Downhill podium this season, winning the opening race in Beaver Creek.
- Since that victory, his first ever World Cup win, the 33-year-old has a best finish of 6th (in Bormio).
- **Dominik Paris (ITA/Nordica)** may represent the biggest obstacle to more Swiss success. The Italian veteran was near his best in Kvitfjell, winning the opening Downhill, the 19th of his career, plus winning the Super G and finishing 6th in the second Downhill of the weekend.
- One more Downhill win would take Paris into 2nd on his own in the list of all-time men's World Cup Downhill winners. Franz Klammer (AUT) leads the way with 25 wins. Paris is currently tied with Peter Müller (SUI) in joint second.
- James Crawford (CAN/Head) is the only other non-Swiss racer to have won a men's Downhill this season, having triumphed in Kitzbühel. That was his first ever World Cup win.
- Crawford has good recent form, having finished 2nd in the Super G in Kvitfjell.
- Currently 5th on 270 points, Crawford does have an outside chance of overhauling Hrobat (currently 4th, 320 points) and Monney (3rd, 327 points) to finish inside the top-three of a Crystal Globe race for the first time in his career.
- **Miha Hrobat (SLO/Atomic)** who is currently just seven points behind third-placed Monney in the Crystal Globe rankings, has never finished better than 22nd (last season's Downhill) in a season-long standings race.
- Hrobat started the season without a single top-five World Cup finish to his name, but now has two; coming 3rd in Wengen and 3rd in the opening Downhill in Beaver Creek.
- He also finished 4th in the most recent Downhill in Kvitfjell and 3rd in the Super G a day later.
- Vincent Kriechmayr (AUT/Head) is currently 11th in the Downhill standings, 15 points behind Nils Allegre (FRA/Salomon). The Austrian has not finished outside the top-10 in the season standings since the 2016/17 season.
- The Austrian, who won Downhill silver at the 2025 World Championships, has a
  best result of 4th in a Downhill World Cup this season. The last time he failed to
  claim at least one Downhill podium finish in a season was back in 2016/17.
