

FACTS & FIGURES – Women's Downhill in Cortina d'Ampezzo

- Sofia Goggia (ITA/Atomic) can win her 4th World Cup race in Cortina d'Ampezzo (all Downhill, after 2018, 2022 and 2023). She has won four or more World Cup races in two other resorts, Crans Montana (4) and Lake Louise (5).
- In her last eight World Cup downhill races in Cortina, Goggia has been on the podium every time she has finished the race six podiums and two DNFs.
- Goggia can win her 26th World Cup race in all disciplines, which would draw her level with Michela Figini (SUI) and Tina Maze (SLO) in equal 16th place on the women's all-time list.
- Goggia is aiming for her first Downhill win of the season. She has won at least one World Cup downhill in each of the last four seasons, after going winless in 2019/20.
- Goggia recorded DNFs in both races last weekend in St. Anton. If she doesn't finish the Cortina Downhill, she will have three consecutive World Cup DNFs for the third time in her career and first time since January 2018.
- Federica Brignone (ITA/Rossignol), winner of the last Downhill in St. Anton, can win her 31st World Cup race in all disciplines, which would tie her for equal 11th on the women's all-time list with Petra Vlhova (SVK/Rossignol) and Erika Hess (SUI).
- Brignone can win her 4th World Cup race in a single season for the 4th time in her career. She previously achieved four or more wins in 2019/20 (5), 2021/22 (4) and 2023/24 (6).
- Brignone can win a World Cup race on home snow for the first time in nearly four years, since she won a Super G race in Val di Fassa in February 2021.
 Three of her 30 World Cup wins have come in Italy.
- Brignone can reach the podium in Cortina d'Ampezzo for the first time at World Cup or world championship level. In 23 World Cup races and five world championships races, her best result is 4th in a World Cup Super G race in January 2022. She only has five top-10 results in those 28 races.
- Lindsey Vonn (USA/Head) can win her 13th World Cup race in Cortina d'Ampezzo, and 7th in Downhill. In 20 World Cup Downhill races in Cortina, Vonn has six wins and six other podiums.
- Vonn can win her first World Cup race since claiming the Are Downhill on 14 March 2018. Her last win in Cortina came in Downhill on 20 January 2018.
- Vonn's last three races before her retirement were all in Cortina: her last race until her comeback last month was a DNF in a Super G on 20 January 2019.
- Vonn, 40, can smash the record as the oldest winner of a women's World Cup race, currently held by 34-year-old Brignone. Vonn was the oldest winner of a women's World Cup Downhill race at age 33 until Brignone's victory last weekend in St. Anton.
- Lara Gut-Behrami (SUI/Head) can win her 46th World Cup race in all disciplines to equal Renate Goetschl (AUT) in 5th place on the women's all-time list.

- Gut-Behrami can win her 14th World Cup Downhill race to move past Marie-Therese Nadig (SUI) and tie Maria Walliser (SUI) in equal 7th place on the women's all-time list.
- Gut-Behrami can win her 5th World Cup race in all disciplines in Cortina to make it her most successful venue. She has also won four times in Crans Montana, Switzerland and Garmisch-Partenkirchen, Germany. Including her two world championship triumphs in Super G and Giant Slalom in Cortina in 2021, Gut-Behrami has won six major races in the Italian resort.
- Conny Hütter (AUT/Head) won the Beaver Creek Downhill in December and can win multiple World Cup Downhill races in one season for the first time.
- Hütter also won the St. Moritz Super G in December and can win three World Cup races in all disciplines in one season for the first time.
- Hütter can win a World Cup race on Italian snow for the first time. Only two of her 30 World Cup podiums have come in Italy, including one in Cortina (a runner-up finish in Super G in 2023).
- Ester Ledecka (CZE/Kaestle) was third in the last Downhill in St. Anton and can make back-to-back World Cup Downhill podiums for the second time, and first time since she made three in a row in January and February 2022. The last time she finished third in a Downhill prior to last week, in Cortina in January 2022, she won the next Downhill in Crans Montana the following month.
- Malorie Blanc (SUI/Atomic) reached the podium in the first World Cup Downhill race of her career last weekend in St. Anton at age 21 years and 5 days, emulating her teammate Gut-Behrami, who famously made the podium in her first World Cup Downhill race at age 16-281 in 2008. If Blanc wins on Saturday at age 21-012, or if she wins any World Cup Downhill race this season, she will achieve her first Downhill victory at a younger age than Gut-Behrami, who won her first Downhill at age 21-231 in 2012.
