

Audi FIS Alpine Ski World Cup 2025/26 – Men's Super G Garmisch

Partenkirchen stat sheet

Milano Cortino Olympic Games stats

- **Franjo von Allmen (SUI/Head)** won both Olympic speed races, becoming the first ever athlete to accomplish that. Both Downhill and Super G have been held at the Olympic Games since Calgary 1988. This is also the first time one nation was able to win both speed races at one Games.
- **Franjo von Allmen's (Head)** victory was the first Olympic Super G gold for Switzerland. Von Allmen, 24 years old, became the third-youngest men's Olympic Super G winner after Kjetil Andre Aamodt (NOR), who won in Val d'Isere 1992 at the age of 20, and Franck Piccard (FRA), claiming his Olympic Super G gold in Calgary 1988 at the age of 23.
- **Franjo von Allmen (SUI/Head)** won his third Milano Cortina Olympic gold in the Team Combined event with **Tanguy Nef (SUI/Atomic)**, making it three-for-three for him. Von Allmen is now on par with **Alberto Tomba (ITA)**, **Matthias Mayer (AUT)**, **Jean Claude Killy (FRA)** and **Anton Sailer (AUT)** with three Olympic Gold medals each. Only **Kjetil Andre Aamodt (NOR)** has more – four. Sailer and Killy, just like von Allmen, claimed three gold medals during one Games, Cortina d'Ampezzo 1956 and Grenoble 1968 respectively.
- **Ryan Cochran-Siegle (USA/Head)** claimed the Olympic Super G silver medal for the second time in a row. USA, while never earning an Olympic Super G gold, have five runner-up results now: **Ryan Cochran-Siegle (2026, 2022)**, **Andrew Weibrecht (2014)**, **Bode Miller (2010)** and **Tommy Moe (1994)**.
- The Olympic season World Cup leader in both speed disciplines **Marco Odermatt (SUI/Stöckli)** finished fourth in the Olympic Downhill, claimed a bronze in Super G and a silver in the Team Combined event.

Previous SG race stats – Kitzbuehel

- **Marco Odermatt (SUI/Stöckli)** won the sixth race of the Audi FIS World Cup Super G season in Kitzbuehel (AUT) on 23 January - becoming the first athlete to win more than one SG race in the 2025/26 season. **Franjo von Allmen (SUI/Head)** finished second for his third successive World Cup Super G podium. **Stefan Babinsky (AUT/Head)** ended third, his second career World Cup podium finish, and second in a row.
- **Marco Odermatt (SUI/Stöckli)** claimed his 17th career World Cup Super G victory in Kitzbuehel, joining **Aksel Lund Svindal (NOR)** and **Renate Götschl (AUT)** in fourth place on the all-time list of World Cup Super G wins, men and women. **Lindsey Vonn (USA, Head)** currently leads this list with 28 Super G victories.

- This win also saw **Marco Odermatt (SUI/Stöckli)** join **Aksel Lund Svindal (NOR)** in second place on the men's all-time World Cup Super G winners list. He is now only seven victories behind **Hermann Maier (AUT)** who leads the men's field with 24 wins.
- **Marco Odermatt (SUI/Stöckli)** became the first athlete to win more than one World Cup Super G race in the 2025/26 season. He also has the most podiums on par with **Franjo von Allmen (SUI/Head)** at three each.
- Only two athletes have finished inside the top ten of every World Cup Super G race this season; **Marco Odermatt (SUI/Stöckli)** and **Stefan Rogentin (SUI/Fischer)**.
- **Franjo von Allmen (SUI/Head)** has stepped on a podium of the three last World Cup Super G races. He has a total of six podiums, including one win, in just 20 World Cup Super G career starts.
- Swiss skiers have recorded a 1-2 during three consecutive Super G World Cup seasons: **Marco Odermatt (Stöckli)** and **Franjo von Allmen (Head)** in 2025/26, **Marco Odermatt (Stöckli)** and **Alexis Monney (Stöckli)** in Crans Montana 2024/25; and **Stefan Rogentin (SUI/Fischer)** and **Loic Meillard (Rossignol)** in Saalbach 2023/24.
- **Stefan Babinsky's (AUT/Head)** first Alpine World Cup podium place in Wengen was followed by another one a week later in Kitzbuehel. In his previous 93 Alpine World Cup starts Babinsky had recorded three 4th-place finishes, all in Super G (Cortina d'Ampezzo and Aspen in 2022/23 and Copper Mountain in 2025/26).
- The reigning three-time World Cup Super G champion **Marco Odermatt (SUI/Stoeckli)** leads this season's standings with 425 points, ahead of **Vincent Kriechmayr (AUT/Head, 267)** in second and **Stefan Babinsky (AUT/Head, 243)** in third.

Garmisch Partenkirchen Super G stats

- Garmisch Partenkirchen will host a men's World Cup Super G race for the 22nd time. The first race here took place during the 1982/83 season. Last time Garmisch Partenkirchen Super G was on the World Cup calendar in the 2023/24 season.
- Garmisch Partenkirchen held a Super G doubleheader in the 2023/24 season. **Nils Allegre (FRA/Salomon)** won the first race, earning his first career World Cup win, ahead of **Guglielmo Bosca (ITA/Head)** in second for his first career World Cup podium and **Loic Meillard (Rossignol)** in 3rd.
- **Marco Odermatt (SUI/Stoeckli)** won the second race of the 2023/24 doubleheader - becoming just the second Swiss skier to win a Garmisch Partenkirchen Super G after Peter Luscher (1982/83). **Raphael Haaser (AUT/Atomic)** finished second - one of five second place finishes in Super G for the Austrian, who is yet to win a World Cup Super G. **Franjo von Allmen (SUI/Head)** ended 3rd - which was the first career World Cup Super G podium for him.

- **Hermann Maier (AUT)** and **Christoph Gruber (AUT)** have the best record in the Garmisch Partenkirchen Super G with three wins each. Maier had claimed the most podiums (five). No other skier has managed to win here more than once.
- Team Austria has the most wins in the Garmisch Partenkirchen Super G – 10. Switzerland, France, Italy and Liechtenstein have two wins each.
- Austria and Switzerland are the two most successful nations in men’s Super G this season, claiming two wins each - one for **Vincent Kriechmayr (AUT/Head)** and **Marco Schwarz (AUT/Atomic)**; two for **Marco Odermatt (SUI/Stoeckli)** and seven podium finishes each. Austria is narrowly ahead in terms of points won with 1179 against Switzerland’s 1112.
- If an Austrian athlete wins in Garmisch Partenkirchen, it will be team Austria’s 90th World Cup Super G win. Austria comfortably leads the list of the nations with the most Super G wins, 2nd-placed Switzerland only has 53.
- **Marco Odermatt (SUI/Stoeckli)** has finished inside the top 5 in each of the last 10 World Cup Super G races. It’s his second longest career streak. Odermatt holds the all-time longest streak of 19 consecutive World Cup Super G top-5 finishes. If Odermatt manages a top-5 finish in Garmisch Partenkirchen, he will hold two all-time longest streaks of consecutive World Cup Super G top-5 finishes.
- A podium finish for **Vincent Kriechmayr (AUT/Head)** would see him claim 5th place on his own in the all-time World Cup Super G men’s podiums list. Currently, Kriechmayr has 24 World Cup Super G podiums, level with **Stephan Eberharter (AUT)** and **Aleksander Aamodt Kilde (NOR/Atomic)**.
- If **Marco Odermatt (SUI/Stöckli)** wins in Garmisch Partenkirchen, it will be his 18th career World Cup Super G victory, which will see him take the fourth place on his own on the all-time list of World Cup Super G wins, men and women. Currently he is on par with **Aksel Lund Svindal (NOR)** and **Renate Götschl (AUT)**. **Lindsey Vonn (USA, Head)** currently leads this list with 28 Super G victories.
- A single win for **Marco Odermatt (SUI/Stöckli)** this weekend would see him join **Hermann Maier (AUT)** in third place on the men’s all-time World Cup winners list across all disciplines. Currently, Odermatt has 53 World Cup wins, one behind Maier and 33 behind **Ingemar Stenmark (SWE)** who leads the men’s field with 86 wins.
- If **Marco Odermatt (SUI/Stöckli)** finishes on the podium in both Super G and Downhill in Garmisch Partenkirchen he will take the third spot on the list of the most men’s World Cup podiums across all disciplines. Odermat currently has 100 career podium finishes, one behind **Henrik Kristoffersen (NOR/Van Deer)**. **Ingemar Stenmark (SWE)** has the most career podiums - 155.
- **Marco Odermatt (SUI/Stöckli)** has the opportunity in Garmisch Partenkirchen to stretch his record streak of men’s top ten World Cup Super G finishes. The Swiss skier

has finished inside the top ten in his last 30 World Cup Super G races dating back to the race in Courchevel Meribel (FRA) in March 2022. In that time he has claimed 13 wins and 21 podium finishes.

- **Marco Odermatt (SUI/Stöckli)** has the opportunity in Garmisch Partenkirchen to stretch his record streak of men's point-scoring World Cup Super G races. The Swiss skier has been scoring points in his last 48 World Cup Super G races dating back to the race in Lake Louise (CAN) in December 2019.
- A top-three finish for **Franjo von Allmen (SUI/Head)** would be his seventh in his past ten World Cup races. This streak, which includes two wins (in the second of two Val Gardena Downhills and the Crans Montana Downhill), two second places (first of two Val Gardena Downhills and the Kitzbuehel Super G) and two third-place finishes (in the Livigno and Wengen Super G races), all of which came after he failed to reach the podium in his first three World Cup races this season.
- A top-three finish for **Franjo von Allmen (SUI/Head)** would be his fourth World Cup Super G podium in a row. This is a career longest streak for him.
- **Stefan Babinsky (AUT/Head, 243)** could score his third consecutive World Cup Super G podium finish in Garmisch Partenkirchen. Before finishing second in Wengen in January Babinsky had never stepped on a podium in his previous 43 World Cup Super G starts.
- Heading into this weekend, **Giovanni Franzoni (ITA/Rossignol)** is the only skier after **Marco Odermatt (SUI/Stöckli)** to record a World Cup win in both speed disciplines in the current season. Franzoni never had a World Cup victory before the 2025/26 season.
- A win for **Raphael Haaser (AUT/Atomic)** would be his first World Cup success in his 101th start. The 2025 Super G World Championship silver medallist has seven World Cup podiums, all in Super G.
- A top-ten finish for **Stefan Rogentin (Fischer)** would be his 22nd, which will see him take sixth place on his own on the list of the most Swiss men's top-ten World Cup Super G finishes. Now he's on par with **Carlo Janka**. **Didier Cuche** tops that list with 57 top-ten finishes.
- A top-ten finish in Garmisch Partenkirchen for **Mattia Casse (Rossignol)** would be his 21st, which will see him join Peter Runggaldier in fourth place on the list of the most Italian men's top-ten World Cup Super G finishes. **Dominik Paris (Nordica)** is on top of that list with 41 top-ten finishes.
- Team Canada has 99 men's World Cup Super G top-ten finishes. If a Canadian skier finishes in the top ten, Canada will become the eighth nation to reach 100.
