

FACTS & FIGURES – Men's Super G in Crans Montana

- **Marco Odermatt (SUI/Stöckli)** has won 14 World Cup Super G races and can become the third man to win 15. The others to have done so are Hermann Maier (AUT, 24) and Aksel Lund Svindal (NOR, 17).
- Odermatt, who already has 26 World Cup wins in Giant Slalom, can become the fifth man to win 15+ World Cup races in two disciplines, after Ingemar Stenmark (SWE: 46 GS, 40 SL), Alberto Tomba (ITA: 35 SL, 15 GS), Hermann Maier (AUT: 24 SG, 15 DH) and Marcel Hirscher (AUT/NED: 32 SL, 31 GS).
- Odermatt can become the first man or woman to achieve this feat with a Super G / Giant Slalom combination. Maier just missed out, with 14 GS victories.
- Odermatt has 24 World Cup Super G podiums and can become the fourth man to reach 25, after Maier (38), Svindal (30) and Kjetil Jansrud (NOR, 26). Odermatt is currently tied on 24 with Aleksander Aamodt Kilde (NOR/Atomic) and Stephan Eberharter (AUT).
- Odermatt has finished inside the top seven in his last 21 World Cup Super G races dating back to March 2022, making the podium in 17 of them.
- Only one of his 14 World Cup Super G wins has come on home snow in Switzerland – in Wengen in January 2022.
- **Vincent Kriechmayr (AUT/Head)** currently sits in second place in the Super G standings behind Odermatt, with second-place finishes in Bormio and Wengen.
- Kriechmayr has won nine World Cup Super G races and can become the sixth man to win 10, behind Maier (24), Svindal (17), Odermatt (14), Jansrud (13) and Pirmin Zurbriggen (SUI, 11).
- Entering the weekend, Kriechmayr has nine career World Cup victories in both Downhill and Super G. With an extra win in each discipline, he would become the 11th man to achieve the 'double-double' of double-figure (10+) wins in two disciplines.
- He would be the fourth man to do the speed double-double after Maier (24 SG, 15 DH), Svindal (17 SG, 14 DH) and Zurbriggen (10 SG, 10 DH).
- **Stefan Rogentin (SUI/Fischer)** has finished third in the last two World Cup Super G races. He can become the first man to finish third in three straight Super G races in men's World Cup history.
- Rogentin's only career World Cup win came in Super G, at the World Cup finals in Saalbach last season.
- **Fredrik Moeller (NOR/Atomic)** is one of the four different winners in the five World Cup Super G races so far this season. He won in Bormio in December.
- Even with that victory, Moeller entered the weekend with only three top-10 finishes in all disciplines in 29 starts in his World Cup career (all in Super G). The other two were both fourth-placed finishes.
- His best World Cup result in any race on Swiss snow entering the weekend was 13th, in the Wengen Super G last month.
- Swiss rising star **Franjo von Allmen (SUI/Head)** won the Super G in Wengen last month, his only World Cup victory. Wengen is the only Swiss resort in which he has competed at World Cup level before this weekend.

- Von Allmen has three career World Cup Super G top-five finishes, and two of them have come in the last two races in Wengen and Kitzbühel.
- **Mattia Casse (ITA/Rossignol)**, like von Allmen and Moeller, has only won one World Cup race in his career and it was a Super G this season.
- Casse has three Super G top-10 results this season and can make it four or more for the first time since 2019/20, when he did it five times.
- This will be the fifth men's World Cup Super G race held in Crans Montana and first since back-to-back races were held in February 2012.
- **Adrien Theaux (FRA/Salomon)** celebrated his last Super-G podium here in Crans-Montana in 2012, finishing 2nd. This is his last podium in this discipline.
- With three Super G races to go this season, the standings behind Odermatt are very tight. The Swiss star leads on 341 points, but only seven points separate second (Kriechmayr, 222) from fifth (Casse, 215).
- Four Swiss racers currently sit in the top eight of the standings.
