

Audi FIS Alpine Ski World Cup 2025/26 - Women's Downhill Val d'Isere stat sheet

Previous Downhill races

- In Downhill only, Lindsey Vonn (USA/Head) made her 126th World Cup start last weekend, surpassing Renate Goetschl (AUT) (125) for most women's DH starts. The only other active women's skiers with 90 or more DH starts are Lara Gut-Behrami (SUI/Head) on 123, Ilka Stuhec (SLO/Kaestle) on 102, Elena Curtoni (ITA/Head) on 92 and Priska Ming-Nufer (SUI/Kaestle) on 90. Ming-Nufer has made the most women's DH starts of the previous 10 years (2015/16 to last weekend) with 77.
- Lindsey Vonn's (USA/Head) victory in the first race in St. Moritz last week was seven years and 273 days since her previous World Cup victory (DH) in Are in 2017/18, and made her the oldest women's or men's skier to win an Alpine World Cup race at age 41 years and 55 days.
- Lindsey Vonn's (USA/Head) winning time in the first race in St. Moritz was 0.98s, which is the third-biggest winning gap for a women's or men's Downhill race since 2016/17. Sofia Goggia (ITA/Atomic) owns the two biggest gaps in that time (1.47s in 2021/22, and 1.10s in 2017/18) but Vonn still owns the top four biggest DH winning gaps this century.
- Lindsey Vonn (USA/Head) now has 83 World Cup wins, edging closer to Ingemar Stenmark (SWE) in second place on 86. Last week's races also saw Vonn surpass Marcel Hirscher (NED/Van Deer) (138) for World Cup podiums, moving to 140, which is third-highest behind Mikaela Shiffrin (USA/Atomic) (160) and Stenmark (155).
- Emma Aicher's (GER/Head) win in the second race in St. Moritz was her third World Cup win, and makes her the youngest winner (22) of a women's or men's race so far this season. The win also saw Germany (125) overtake France (124) into fourth position for women's World Cup Downhill podiums, behind Austria (351), Switzerland (276) and USA (159).
- Sofia Goggia's (ITA/Atomic) third-place finish in the second race in St. Moritz saw her move to 38 women's Downhill podiums, overtaking Maria Walliser (SUI) (37) into fourth place behind Lindsey Vonn (USA/Head) (68), Renate Goetschl (AUT) (59) and Annemarie Moser-Proell (AUT) (54).
- Romane Miradoli (FRA/Dynastar) finished sixth in the first Downhill race in St. Moritz, which was her best result in 40 DH starts since a fifth-place finish in Cortina d'Ampezzo in 2018/19.

Val d'Isere stats

- Val d'Isere has hosted 35 women's Downhill World Cup races. The first, in 1970, was won by 1968
 Olympic DH silver medallist, Isabelle Mir (FRA). The most recent was won by Jasmine Flury
 (SUI/Kaestle) in 2023/24.
- Lindsey Vonn (USA/Head) has seven World Cup wins in Val d'Isere, equal-highest for women and men alongside Marcel Hirscher (NED/Van Deer) and Marie-Therese Nadig (SUI). A win for Vonn will make her the most successful World Cup skier in Val d'Isere across all events.
- Lindsey Vonn (USA/Head) has 10 podiums in Val d'Isere, second-highest for women and men behind Marcel Hirscher (NED/Van Deer) on 15. Sofia Goggia (ITA/Atomic) is in equal-third with nine, alongside Annemarie Moser-Proell (AUT) and Marie-Therese Nadig (SUI).

- In Downhill, Lindsey Vonn (USA/Head) has the most wins for women and men in Val d'Isere with four. The other active women's skiers who have won a DH race in Val d'Isere are Sofia Goggia (ITA/Atomic) (2), Lara Gut-Behrami (SUI/Head) (2), Corinne Suter (SUI/Head) (1), Jasmine Flury (SUI/Kaestle) (1) and Ilka Stuhec (SLO/Kaestle) (1).
- **Switzerland** has 99 women's World Cup Downhill wins. A win for a Swiss skier will see **Switzerland** become the second nation, after **Austria** (126), to win 100 women's DH races.
- Sofia Goggia (ITA/Atomic) has won 19 World Cup Downhill races and can become the fourth woman to win 20 or more, following Lindsey Vonn (USA/Head) (44), Annemarie Moser-Proell (AUT) (36) and Renate Goetschl (AUT) (24).
- Sofia Goggia (ITA/Atomic) has made 38 Downhill podiums, which is equal-seventh for women and men alongside Stephan Eberharter (AUT). A podium in Val d'Isere for Goggia will see her move into outright seventh for women's and men's DH podiums on 39.
- Emma Aicher (GER/Head) can become the first German woman to win two World Cup Downhill races in a row since 2013, when Maria Hoefl-Riesch (GER) won consecutive DHs in Lake Louise.
- Cornelia Huetter (AUT/Head) is on nine World Cup wins. Her next victory will see her become the 11th Austrian women's skier to record double figure World Cup wins across all disciplines. Since Huetter made her first Downhill podium in 2013/14, she is Austria's most successful women's DH skier with four wins among 18 podiums in that time.
- If **Valerie Grenier (CAN/Rossignol)** makes the podium, she will move from equal 9th to equal 7th for all-time Canadian women's World Cup podiums. **Grenier** has one Downhill podium, a third in **Cortina D'Ampezzo** in 2023/24.
- Mirjam Puchner (AUT/Atomic), who claimed her ninth podium last week, needs one more podium to become the 32nd Austrian women's Alpine skier to make 10 or more World Cup podiums.
- **Breezy Johnson (USA/Atomic)** made her 100th World Cup start last week. **Johnson** has made eight podiums in her career, all DH, which is fifth-highest for **USA** women's DH skiers.
- Laura Pirovano (ITA/Head) has 115 World Cup starts but is yet to make a podium, with a best result of fourth achieved in Downhill on three occasions, most recently in **St. Anton** last season.
- **Kira Weidle-Winkelmann (GER/Rossignol)** has six Downhill podiums in 71 World Cup starts. Her last podium (third) came 20 DH races ago in 2022/23 in **Cortina d'Ampezzo**, which is her longest DH streak without a podium to date.
